Appointments are being repeatedly made for reasons which are definitely not educational. The Hon'ble Minister for Education is continually interfering with me in the administration of my Department to such an extent that most of my time now-a-days is spent in writing protest on Secretariat files against orders passed by the Hon'ble Minister on matters which, in my opinion, do not properly come within the Minister's province at all. - (d)—The iron, member is referred to rule 116 at page 186 of the Assam Land Revenue Manual, Volume I, laying down the principles generally followed in making appointments of Mauzadars.

Settlement of lands in Nowgong

Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKER JEE asked:

Total

- *12. Will Government be pleased to state—
 - (a) How many acres of cultivable waste lands are there in the district of Nowgong?
 - (b) How many acres out of these are available for ordinary settlement?

- (c) How many applications were received for the settlement of these lands from the people of the Surma Valley in 1941?
- (d) Whether it is a fact that a large number of people of village Mangram under the Karimganj subdivision applied for lands in Nowgong district through one Maulavi Sarafat Ali Choudhury in 1941?
- (e) If so, what action Government has taken on this?
- (/) What was the acreage that was prayed for in the said application for settlement and on behalf of how many families the application was made?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA

- 12. (a) From the figures given by the then Deputy Commissioner at the time of the Line Commission's enquiries in 1938 and the annual returns showing subsequent settlement it has been calculated that there are roughly 2,00,000 acres of cultivable waste land in Nowgong, two-thirds of which lie scattered in cadastral villages and will be required in due course for extension of cultivation in those villages.
- (b) All were available, though normally the extra land in cadastral villages would mostly be reserved for the people of those villages. 21,000 acres have now been included in the Development Scheme for which special rules have recently been published.
 - (e)- -3,481 up to 31st March 1941.
 - (d)-Yes in August 1941.
- (e)-Government directed the Deputy Commissioner, Nowgong to entertain these applications along with those already received and consider them when settling lands under the Development Scheme.
- (f)—The application was sent in original to the Deputy Commissioner and it has not been thought advisable to recall it for the purpose of eliciting this information and so possibly interfere with the process of settlement which may have already begun.
- Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA: May I enquire whether Mr. Marar in his report on the Line Committee estimated that only 62,000 acres of land was available in Nowgong? I am reading Sir, from page 17, Volume II of the Report.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: Then that appeared in a Govern-

ment publication.

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA: But the Hon'ble Minister is

stating that it is 2 lakhs acres. Which is correct, Sir?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: May I point out, Sir, that it was probably because the figure referred to by

Mr. Marar was in bigger blocks?

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA: No, Sir, he has calculated all the available land there and has come to this conclusion. He said "The net area available comes to only 62,000 acres; even out of this a large area in Hojai and Namati is completely allotted." If that area is deducted, the figure will be less than 62,000 acres and this was accepted by the Committee as a whole.

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: As a member of the Line System Enquiry Committee, my impression is, so far as I remember.....

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA: This is the report, Sir, I am

"The Deputy Commissioner had gone carefully into the question before our arrival and after excluding the area in Mikir Hills and small patches of waste land still available in fully settled cadastral villages in the rest of the district and the area occupied by reserves, swamps, roads, etc.. he calculated that not more than 62,000 acres was available for extension of cultivation in large blocks in the rest of the district. Some 83 per cent, of the available cultivable land has been taken up and the majority of the Committee endorse his opinion that there is not much room for extension of immigrant settlement in the district".

Now the Hon'ble Minister said that land available in Nowgong is two lakhs acres but from the Report it appears that only 62,000 acres are available and even out of that some portion in Hojai and Namati is completely allotted, and so this area of two lakhs acres is not available. The

question is, Sir, whether this figure is correct or that is correct?

The Hon ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA I will reply to this simple question. Both the statements are correct. The figure 62,000 acres is in large blocks, but I am giving the entire area available. As I have detailed in my reply, Sir, that land in cadastral villages is mostly reserved for people of those villages and therefore Mr. Marar probably only gave the area of the bigger blocks.

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA: If I read from the beginning, it will be clear. He has calculated all lands. It seems I shall have to read

the whole paragraph—

"The total area of the district is 3,699 sq. miles, the plains portion con-

sists of 1,590 sq. miles"

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: I think there are some other questions on this subject, which raised specific points. I think it will be better for the hon, member to put his supplementaries when those questions come up. It seems that he is starting a discussion about the whole matter: I cannot allow that.

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA: If those questions do not come

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: I think they are all coming up.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: May I know whether this two lakhs acres of waste land includes forest reserves, game reserves, and grazing reserves?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: No. Sir.

Srijut PURNA CHANDRA SARMA: Does it include village grazing reserves?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: No, Sir.

Srijut PURNA CHANDRA SARMA: Are not the village grazing reserves included in the village cadastral area?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: It is included in the cadastral area and shown as reserved for village grazing purposes,

Condition of people of Koliabor

Srijut PURNA CHANDRA SARMA asked:

*13. (a) Are Government aware about the starving condition of the majority of people of Koliabor in the district of Nowgong?

(b) Will time inment be pleased to state whether any reports have

been received from the Deputy Commissioner in this regard?

[6] If so, will Government be pleased to state when the said reports

were received and what steps have been taken since?

(d) Will Government be pleased to state if it is a fact that the local officials sent their reports about the condition of the people of Koliabor long ago ?

Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA The replied:

- 13. (a) Government received copies on 11th October 1941 of resolutions passed in a meeting of the Koliabor Pyot Sabha which had been forwarded by the Sabha to the Deputy Commissioner, alleging distress in the locality.
 - (E) 100

(c) Does not wise.

Srijut PURNA CHANDRA SARMA: Did Government enquire whether the Deputy Commissioner took any steps after those resolutions were passed ?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: As I have already replied, Sir, the Sabha approached the Deputy Commissioner direct, and he is expected to take all necessary action. If he thought that the statements in the petition were correct, he would have forwarded his recommendations to the Government.

Srijut PURNA CHANDRA SARMA: Was not the attention of Government drawn to those resolutions, and copies of the same sent to

them?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Government is awaiting the report of the Deputy Commissioner. received a copy of those resolutions on the 11th October 1941; only 19 days have clapsed since then.

Srijut PURNA CHANDRA SARMA: Is 11th October only 19

days from to-day?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA:

I am sorry I made a slip; one month nineteen days.

[Starred questions Nos. 14-17 standing in the name of Babu Bipin Behari Das, No. 18 standing in the name of Mr. Arun Kumar Chanda and No. 19 standing in the name of Maulavi Abdul Bari Chaudhury were not put and answered as the questioners were absent.]

Flood in the Barpeta subdivision

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS asked:

- *20. Will the Hon'ble Minister-in-charge of Revenue be pleased to state-
 - (a) Whether he got any information from the local members of the Assam Legislative Assembly of the Barpeta subdivision regarding the last flood in the Barpeta subdivision and the distress of the people caused by it?

(b) If so, will he be pleased to state what steps have been taken to redress the grievances and distress of the people of that place?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

20. (a)—Yes.

(b)-Enquiry is being made by the local officers but no final report has yet been received.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: Have Government given any direc tion to the local officers there to enquire into the conditions of raiyats in the Government land only, and not of those in the nist khiraj land?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: We have made no such distinction. We have asked the Subdivisional Officer to enquire and report about the conditions of the raisats in general.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: I asked local officers to enquire into the condition of the raiyats in the nisf-khiraj land, but they told me

frankly that they would do so only when instructed by Government.

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Government has not instructed the Subdivisional Officer, Barpeta, to make any distinction between the Government tenants and the tenants of the landlords. We want a report about the conditions of tenants in general.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: Will Government give direction to enquire about the conditions of rayats in the nisf-khiraj land?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA:
We will await the main the misf-khiraj land? We will await the report of the Sul divisional Officer. If we find that he has not enquired into the condition of the nisf-khiraj tenants, the occasion will probably then arise to instruct him.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: Cannot Covernment believe me when I say that they are not enquiring into the condition of raiyals in the

ni f-khiraj land?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: No question of belief or disbelief arises. The report is imminent, and we

will take action, if necessary, after receipt of the same. Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: Are Government aware that in certain localities of the Barpeta subdivision famine is imminent, and this will be felt from the month of I

be felt from the month of January next?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: We have not got any such information as yet; we are awaiting the report

of the Subdivisional Officer.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: I am putting this question for the information of Government. Morcover, Sir, the mauzadars are pressing the raiyats for land revenue. Some sale warrants are going to be issued for arrears of revenue.

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: It seems that the hon. member is not seeking information, but is supplying

the same.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: But he wants to know whether

Government is making any enquiry.

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Yes, Sir, we have asked the Subdivisional Officer to enquire and we are awaiting his report awaiting his report.

[Starred questions Nos. 21-22 standing respectively in the names of Maulavi Abdul Bari Chaudhury and Mr. Arun Kumar Chanda were not

put and answered as the questioners were absent.]

Revenue Sheristadar of Nowgong

Maulavi MUHAMMAD AMIRUDDIN asked:

- 3. (a) Is it a fact that the Revenue Sheristadar of the Nowgong district is soon going on leave preparatory to retirement?
 - (b) If so, will Government be pleased to state—
 - (i) Whether the vacancy, so arising will be locally filled up by promotion of any other competent and experienced clerk?
 - (ii) If not, why not ?

(iii) Whether Government propose to make it a point or principle to make local appointment in such vacancies in future all over the province, as far as practicable?

(c) Will Government be pleased to state whether they propose to issue immediate instructions to the district authority of Nowgong to make local appointment with respect to the proposed vacancy in place of the said local sheristadar from amongst the competent and experienced clerks of the Deputy Commissioner's Office?

The Hon'ble Khan Bahadur Maulavi SAYIDUR RAHMAN replied:

3. (a)—Government have no information.

(b) (i) and (ii) and (c)—The power of appointing the Revenue Sheristadar and the Head Clerk in the offices of Deputy Commissioners lies with and is exercised by the Commissioner who is in a position to know the comparative merits of clerks in district offices and in his own office. Government do not propose to fetter his discretion by giving him any specific direction in this case, if a vacancy should arise but will forward to him a copy of the questions and replies for his information and guidance.

(b) (iii)—It is the policy of Government that where an experienced and competent clerk is available in the district office fit for promotion to one of the two selected posts mentioned above, he should be chosen to fill the vacancy: this policy has been followed in the past and will be followed in future.

Loss by Bhogdoi flood

Srijut DEBESWAR SARMAH asked:

The Hon'ble Khan Bahadue Maulavi SAYIDUR RAHMAN replied:

- 9. (d) Government are aware that there was a breach in the right bund of the Bhogdoi river at a distance of 2 miles west of the Bhogdoi bridge on the Jagannath Barna Road in the Sarucharai Mauza on or about 16th June 1941. The water inundated the courtyards and some houses of the neighbouring villages including the paddy fields. Fortunately, as the water subsided soon, there is no cause for anxiety at present and the people have taken to cultivation. This year's distress and loss have been less than in the less than in the previous years.
- (b) A thorough enquiry was made by the Sub-Deputy Collector, Jorhat Circle, and after consultation with him and the Chairman, Local Board, Jorhat, gratuitous relief to the extent of Rs. 100 (one hundred only) was granted from the standing fund of the Jorhat Flood Relief Committee. Further Agricultural loan of Rs. 500 (five hundred only) has been issued through the Sub-Deputy Collector for purchase of seeds and seedlings.
- (c)- As soon as the information of fever in some villages was received the Chairman and the Civil Surgeon were directed by the Deputy Commissioner to depute a doctor at once, and accordingly the Epidemic Doctor of Jorhat Local Board visited the villages and rendered medical help to the needy persons during the months of July and August. A copy of the statement showing the prevalence and treatment of diseases supplied by the Civil Surgeon is placed on the Library table.

It will appear from the above that adequate medical aid has already been rendered to the people suffering in consequence of the flood.

tune time to consider the reduction of rates of electric current.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Have Government asked each of the Electric Supply Companies Gauhati and Dibrugarh whether they can reduce their charges ?

They The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI:

have not asked, but they think that the time is not opportune.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Do I understand that

Government do not even feel the necessity of making an enquiry?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: Government think that thes cannot reasonably ask the Companies to reduce the charges because of the exceptional circumstances when the prices of fuel and other things have gone up.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Cannot Government

During the regime of Sir Gurunath Bewoor we tried for the settlement, but he insisted on certain specific amount which was not acceptable to the Carrying Company. After he had left, we again re-opened the question and there were discussions between the Post Master General, the Secretary of the Provincial Transport Authority and the Carrying Company. Here also they came to a deadlock. Ultimately, this Government has again addressed the Government of the Carrying Company. ment of India making a specific suggestion to them, and we are awaiting their reply.

At present, there is no such figure.

Establishment of a Subdivision at Nalbari

Srijut RABI CHANDRA KACHARI asked:

- 55. Is it a fact that Barkshetri Mauza Sanmilan held at Mukalmua under the presidency of the Hon'ble the Prime Minister passed a resolution urging the early establishment of a Subdivision at Nalbari?
- 56. Are Government aware that the people of Nalbari side are keen for a separate Local Board for development of the interior rural areas?
- 57. Is it a fact that the Hon'ble Prime Minister in reply to addresses presented in the public meetings held at Nalbari, Kamarkuchi and in 1938 stated that Government would gradually raise Nalbari into a Subdivision?
- 58. Is it a fact that other Hon'ble Ministers also expressed similar wishes in their visits to Nalbari side from time to time?
- 59. Do Government propose to establish a separate Local Board at Nalbari as a step towards creating a Subdivision there?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

55.—Yes.

56.—Government are aware that this may be so.

57 & 58.—The need for a new Subdivision at Nalbari has long been recognised by Government. The proposal stands in abeyance for the present owing to financial stringency.

59.—No. In view of Section 3 of the Assam Local Self-Government Act, the creation of a Subdivision comes first.

Land Settlement in the district of Nowgong Maulavi MUHAMMAD AMIRUDDIN asked:

60 Will Concernment be pleased to state-

- Whether an area of about 200 bighas of lands in the Mowamari village of the Khatwal Mouza in the district of Nowgong was included in the annual pattas in favour of one Srijut Mohendra Nath Hazarika, Khatwal Mouzadar and another Srijut Surendra Nath Hazarika—Pleader of the Nowgong Bar and own brother of the said Mouzadar and another Babu Labaunya Ch. Kundu—an immigrant brying in the Nowgong Town?
- 16 Whether the said Mowamari village is closed to immigrants?
- (c) How could the immigrant Babu Labannya Ch. Kundu living 15 or 16 miles away from that village get a patta in that closed village without cultivating the land for even a single day.
- What areas of lands does each of the said persons hold in the Khatwal, Lawkhoa, Kasomari and Nij-shahar Mouzas either in their own names or in the names of their closest family members (father, brother or son)?
- (c) Whether the said area of 200 bighas was cleared and cultivated by the immigrants and whether they dug a ditch in the castern side of the lands so as to demarcate the grazing Reserve?
- (f) Whether the petitions of the said three gentlemen were filed before or after the enforcement of Settlement Rule 16 in this district?
 - (g) Whether the cultivation of the area and its possession by the immigrants had been suppressed by the Land Records Staff under the official pressure of the Sub-Deputy Collector?
 - (h) Whether Government propose to ask the Deputy Commissioner to make a thorough enquiry personally into the matter and recognise the claims of the actual occupants in the light of the Government instructions on the Line System?

(i) Whether the annual patta of Srijut Surendra Nath Hazarika is now under report for conversion into periodic by the Sub-Deputy Collector?

(j) Whether immediate instructions to the Deputy Commissioner will be issued for immediate enquiry into the matters and for disallowing conversion till these questions are decided upon?

(k) Whether the Sub-Deputy Collector of the Samaguri Circle who has long ago completed the usual duration of his three years' service in the said circle will be immediately transferred therefrom?

The Hon'ble Khan Bahadur Maulavi SAYIDUR RAHMAN replied:

60. (a)—These three gentlemen hold a total area of 121 Bighas 1 Katha 9 Lessas and not 200 bighas in annual patta in this Mowamari village of which an area of 16 Bighas 1 Katha 15 Lessas only has been converted into periodic in this year as described below:

Srijut Mohendra Nath Hazarika 49 Bighas 8 lessas in annual patta No. 27 and 44 Bighas 3 Kathas 2 Lessas in annual No. 41.

Srijut Surendra Nath Hazarika, Pleader, 16 Bighas I Katha 15 Lessas in dag No. 2 which has been recently converted into periodic Babu Labannya Chandra Kundu, 11 Bighas I Katha 4 Lessas in dag No. 31 in annual patta.

(b)—Yes.

Chandra Kundu was not settled with him out of any Government waste land. It originally belonged to one Abu Hussain who defaulted payment of land revenue. This land was given to him by the Deputy Commissioner as far back as 1937 on payment of arrears as he holds a domicile certificate.

(d)—The areas of lands held by each of these persons are shown in

the list below (A & B).

(e)—The said area 121 Bighas 1 Katha 9 Lessas (not 200 bighas) has not been cleared and cultivated by the immigrants and they have not dug a ditch in the eastern side of the lands. It is Srijut Mohendra Nath Hazarika, who has dug a ditch in the castern side of the lands so as to demarcate the grazing reserve on this side.

- (f On the total area 121 Bighas 1 Katha 9 Lessas noted in reply to (c) above. Neput Mahembia Nath Hazarika and Swendra Nath Hazarika together have got an area of 65 Bighas 2 Kathas 3 Lessas by transfer from the original owner Gunadakanta Bhuyan for a big sum. This area was lyang maste and available for settlement since 1933-34, has been held in undisputed and exclusive possession of Srijut Mohendra Nath Hazarika at a considerable cost since a few months before the enforcement of the said Settlement Rule 16 and no other waste land petition was received for this area and none else possessed it. So this area was settled with Srijut Mohendra Nath Hazarika according to Settlement Rules 9 and 15.
- (g) It is a laise allegation. The immigrants have not cultivated and possessed this area
- Mohendra Nath Hazatika is best entitled to the settlement of this area of 44 Bighas 3 Kathas 2 Lessas on the basis of actual possession and for priority of his application. No further personal enquiry by the Deputy Commissioner is necessary.
- (i) The area to Bighas I Katha 15 Lessas in dag No. 2 standing in the name of Sujint Surendra Nath Hazarika which was obtained by transfer as noted in reply to par above has been already converted into periodic as it complied with all the conditions of Rule 105 of Land Records Manual for such conversion.
- (j) This area of to Bighas I Katha 15 Lessas has already been converted into periodic in the settlement dowl for 1941-42 and Government do not see any reason to revise the dowl when the settlement was made according to the rules. The circumstances revealed do not call for any personal enquiry by the Deputy Commissioner.

(k)—There is no rigid rule for the tenure of the post. At present there is shortage of officers, which often makes it undesirable to carry out changes merely on account of the period an officer has been posted in one

station.

Hydro-electric Scheme in Assam

Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKERJEE asked:

61. Will Government be pleased to state whether they propose to prepare a Hydro-electric Scheme for the Province of Assam in the near future?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

61.—The subject has been before Government since the Report of Mr. Blenkinsop in 1923 but no definite proposal has emerged. The question will be taken up as soon as funds allow. Present Electrical Adviser to Government has also interested himself and submitted notes about Hydroelectric Schemes for the Province.

Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKERJEE: In the reply I find that the question will be taken up as soon as funds allow. May I enquire from the Hon'ble Minister whether they have made any estimate and if so, how

much fund will be required for this purpose ?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: There is only one scheme about which a mere rough estimate was made and that scheme was made in collaboration with the Government of Bengal in order to utilise the water power from the Garo Hills flowing towards Mymensingh. Our Electrical Adviser discussed this matter with the Bengal Electrical Adviser. They tentatively came to the confusion that the scheme could be proceeded with and the expenditure was in the neighbourhood of a crore of rupees. Ultimately Bengal refused to collaborate.

Mr. F. W. BLENNERHASSETT: May I enquire, Sir, what Government has meant by the words 'taken up'?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: That is to utilise the water power of the hills in the Province.

Mr. F. W. BLENNERHASSETT: Have the schemes they propose

to take up been properly surveyed?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Mr. Blenkinsop was put on special duty and as I have already mentioned, he has put up certain schemes?

W. BLENNERHASSETT: Is it not a fact that the figures, which Mr. Blenkinsop gave, no longer apply and that a re-survey

is required for the purpose?

The Hon'ble Maualvi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: That is to a certain extent correct, Sir. Our present Electrical Adviser has considered some of those; some cannot be utilised at all and some have already been made nugatory by the establishment of private electrical concerns in the towns concerned.

W. BLENNERHASSETT: Is it a fact that since these schemes were submitted by Mr. Blenkinsop three at least have become obsolete and that one by itself could almost electrify the whole province?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA:

This is correct, Sir.

Mr. F. W. BLENNERHASSETT: In view of that fact, is it not possible for Government to institute steps to have a survey and estimate

made of the project which appears to me a very very imperative duty?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA:

At present it is useless to spend money in re-surveying when we know that

there is no possibility of financing the scheme.

Mr. A. WHITTAKER: In so far as this is likely to be a productive expenditure, would it not be one of those very few cases for borrowing which would be justified for this class of work?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Yes, Sir. But at the present moment we are indebted to the tune of half a ADITYA: Do Government think it crore of rupees.

Babu RABINDRA NATH

is a losing proposition to borrow money?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: I said that we were already indebted to the tune of half a crore of rupees. NATH ADITYA: If this stands as a busi-Babu RABINDRA

ness proposition, is there any harm to borrow money?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: We are not prepared to borrow money and it is doubtful whether the financier will advance money on the security of provincial revenues when we are already indebted to the extent of half a crore of rupees.

Mr. F. W. BLENNERHASSETT: Will Government be prepared to institute an enquire unto the matter with a view to surveying the possibili-ties of the scheme so as to be ready to avail ourselves of post-war industrial depression and things of that sort, when we may expect materials to

become cheaper than at present?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: The suggestion will be considered. At the present moment we are handicapped by the fact that our only Electrical Adviser is also the Chairman of the Board of Technical Recruitment for the war and his time is fully taken up by this work, but as soon as he finds a little leisure I will ask him to look into the scheme

Babu RABINDRA NATH ADITYA: Would not the pressure that is now put on the Government exchequer by the flood be much relieved if the Hydro Electric project is taken up?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: That is a hypothetical question, Sir.

Methods of Census classification

Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA asked:

- 62. Will Government be pleased to enquire and state-
- (a) The number of Hindus amongst the population shown as "Tribes" in the last Census?
- (b) Whether the method adopted in Assam for Census operations changing religion to community was made imperative by the form of the franchise?
- (c) If so, why some of the important heads of franchise such as Indian Christians, European Planting, etc. were not taken into consideration at the recent Census?
- (d) Whether this Assam method was adopted in other provinces of India?
- (e) Whether they have since received public representations challenging the method of census operations and correctness of the Census figures?

(f) If so, has Government taken any steps to reclassify the population

on the basis of religion?

(g) Whether Government is aware that many tribal people are not satisfied with the method of classification and resent the fact of their being not included as Hindus?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

62. (a)—Figures are not available at present.

(b)—The original intention was to classify the population by religions as well as by communities. But funds were found to be inadequate for the double classification by the Government of India who ordered only the classification by communities, which was the more important for fran-

c)—The census returns were never intended to be equivalent to electoral rolls, and it was not thought necessary to extract separate figures for Indian

Christians or European Planters.

- (d)—Government has no information,
- (e)-Yes.
- (f)-No. The methods of chasilication are prescribed by the Government of India, not by the Provincial Government.
- (g)-Government are not aware of any resentment of the Tribal people over the census classification and they have not received any complaint from the tribal people so far.
- Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA: In reply to question No.62(a) the Government says, 'figures are not available' May I ask Government whether they are going to make any attempt to find out the figure of the Hindus under the head 'Tribes'?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: There has been a very large number of questions on the census and I have tried to reply as fully as possible. My replies would come during this session and if my hon, friend waits till then, he will find my replies. I may inform the House that re-classification is a matter for the Central Government and not for the Provincial Government.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: May I know, Sir, whether any attempt is being made by the Provincial Government independent of the Central Government?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: No, Sir, we cannot go beyond what the Central Government direct us to do.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: In answer to Question No. 62(a) it has been stated that the figures are not available at present. Now what is the implication of the phrase 'at present'?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: As the figures stand from the census there might be some complaints to the Central Government. If the Central Government orders then we will start re-classification.

Will the Government of Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Assam be pleased to approach the Central authorities for instructions to re-classify this population according to religions as well as communities as demanded by the public?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: The representation of the Hindu community is already before the Central

Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA: Whether any attempt is being

made by the Provincial Government in this connection?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: No, Sir.

(Here the clock struck 12 noon).

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: We shall continue up to 12.5. The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: The Government of India may say to us, 'you may start this enumeration at your own expense'. The provincial finances do not admit of taking any more liability in the present juncture when we are faced with heavy deficit. Therefore we are awaiting the orders of the Central Government. If they order, the expense will be borne by them.

Do not Government con-Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA:

sider the expenditure justified?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: It may be justified but we are unable to bear any further burden.

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA: In the reply, Sir, it is stated that the original intention was to classify the population by religions as well as by communities. May we know, Sir, what is meant by 'community'?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAM IAD SAADULLA: So far as the Hindus and Muslims are concerned they are a community in themselves, but as regards the Tribals they are a community irrespective of whether they are Hindus, Animists or Christians.

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA: In the case of the Hindus, is that a religion?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Yes, Sir, it is a religion.

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA: Is it not a fact that all the Hindus returned as Hindus in the census were not classified as Hindus under the community head?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saivid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Yes, Sir, my friend is quite correct; those tribes who returned themselves as Hindus have been included as such (i.e. tribals).

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: Order, order. Further supplementary questions will be taken up to-morrow.

We shall now take up adjournment motion.

Adjournment motion on the death of several persons in the flood-affected areas in the district of Sylhet

Mr. A. WHITTAKER: On a point of information, Sir, is it possible for us to receive copies of adjournment motions before they are actually moved?

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: The hon, members know that the notices of adjournment motions are received even up to the last minute of 11 a.m., and it sometimes becomes impossible to prepare copies for all the Of course, notices of these motions were received to-day from 9-10 a. m., up to 10-36 a.m., but it was not possible to have as many copies as there are hon, members in this House, before the sitting commenced.

Mr. A. WHITTAKER: In view of the fact that typed copies are circulated, would it not be just as easy to type on stencil as to type on a type-

writer?

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: It takes more time. We generally supply copies only to the Hon'ble Ministers and the movers of the motions. I shall consider how far copies can be supplied to hon. members.

Mr. A. WHITTAKER: Thank you, Sir.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: Mr. Mookerjee may now ask for leave to make the adjourment motion he has tabled.

Srijut GOPINATH BARDOLOI: Before this motion of adjournment is moved we would like to take up another important matter which we have discussed this morning with the Leader of the House, namely, certain condolence resolutions.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: I was only conforming to the rules. Just after question time leave for adjournment motions should be asked. So I was asking Mr. Mookerjee to proceed and then I shall see what I can do

with regard to the other motions. We have got as many as 11 adjustment motions. I am afraid, it will not be possible for me to complex all these motions to-day. I just asked Mr. Mookerjee to ask for the leave of the House with regard to his motion and then I shall consider whether other motions should be taken up.

Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKERJEE: Mr. Speaker, Sir, I beg leave

of the House to move-

"That this Assembly do now adjourn to discuss a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, the situation arising in the district of Sylhet due to the callous and negligent conduct of the Government culminas ting in the death of several persons, e.g., Bharat Chandra Das of Sukchar, Yasin Ulla of Jatrapasha in the subdivision of Habiganj and Abdul Hakim of Fatepur, Bidur Dhooly of Balirkuna in the subdivision of Maulavi Bazar-all these being flood affected areas in the district of Syllict"

Sir, it is well known to all members of this House that the districts of Sylhet and Cachar are suffering a great deal due to flood. This point was discussed on the floor of this House during the last session and we were given to understand that our Government would take all possible care so that the people of the flood-affected areas can save then lives. But

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: The hon, member has at this stage

only to show how his motion is in order.

Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKERJEE: Sir, this motion is in order because it is a matter of recent occurrence, because the deaths have taken place after the last session of the Assembly and I have taken the first possible opportunity and it is a matter of urgent public importance in this that people are dying of starvation. So, Sir, I think that I shall obtain the leave

of the House to move my motion.

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Sir, I oppose this motion on various grounds. In the first place, although we now find from the speech of my hon. friend that he wants to connect these deaths with the question of starvation due to flood damages, he has not put his motion in the form in which his idea could be conveyed. simply says that he wants to discuss the situation arising in the district of simply due to the callous and negligent conduct of the Government culmiby the deaths he has referred to now. Condolence motions

The Hon'bie Maglaci Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Mr. Speaker, Sir, before we pass on to the other items on the agenda to-day, I have got a melancholy duty of referring in this House of Legislature on the death of six persons who in their respective spheres were an ornament to the country.

In the first place, it pains my heart to refer to the death of the great sage, the great poet Rabindra Nath Tagore, although belated, as this malancholy event took place some six months ago. We still fall in line with the great Republic of China in mourning the loss of this great sage, poet and philosopher of India as the Chinese Republic, as reported in the press,

have condoled only a couple of days ago. I need not detain the House in giving the accounts of one whose name is a household word throughout India, nay in greater parts of the civilized world. In him, we had a poet of great lyrical beauty, a masterly prose writer, whose song drew the praise of all civilized world and a translation of one of his book was responsible in drawing the first Nobel Prize on him in India. In politics, he did not dabble much : but his clear insight on human psychology made him to get the title of 'Gurudeva' even from that saint apostle of politics, Mahatma Gandhi. He was no less a humanitarian and educationist and his Viswavarati is a standing monument of his past activities. In his loss, not merely India has lost a masterly mind but the world is poorer by the demise of a great man.

Next, I refer to the recent death of His Highness the Maharaja of Manipur, the only Ruling Chief in the Province of Assam. As a Ruling Chief, this Legislature has no connection with him but the genial and amiable nature of the Maharaja and his sportsman-like spirit, who continued to play cricket till about 10 years only whose love for his motherland, meaning the province of Assam, was so great that he in his public speech said that he may be the ruling prince of Manipur but after all he is a citizen of Assam, had endeared him to the people of the Province. He breathed his last, as everyone knows, at Navadwip, the place of pilgrimage for him, because that is the sacred place of Baishnavites. We mourn his loss on account of his various qualities of head and heart that I have already enumerated. My relation with him was personal and I remember with great pleasure the various occasions when I opposed him in the cricket field at Shillong.

I have, Sir, to place before the House the sad death of Lord Willingdon, who everyone knows was a very popular Governor in two provinces of India—a unique occurrence in India and who later on Viceroy and the Governor-General of India. It was in his time that the Simon Commission came up to India to draw up the scheme of the present constitution, and, therefore it is meet and proper that this Legislature should

Next Sir, I have to place on record our sense of grief and sorrow at the untimely death of the late Babu Suresh Chandra Das, a member of the Upper House. Those who have come in contact with him knew that he was a perfect gentleman in the true sense of the torrow to fall terms. was a perfect gentleman in the true sense of the term. After the full term of administrative work, he thought it fit to give the rest of his life to the cause of the public and was one of the very experienced, sound and sane

councillors of the Upper House.

Next, Sir, I am to condole the death of one of the brilliant products of Sylhet, I refer to late Mr. Gurusaday Dutta with whom I had the opportunity of coming into contact. Although he was a native of the province of Assam hailing from the district of Sylhet, his official life was mainly run in the neighbouring province of Bengal. His name will go down to posterity on account of his being the founder and leader of the Bratachari movement— a movement which sought to bring and brought a ray of sun shine on the labourers of our countryside. This achievement of giving joy to the labourers of the countryside will keep his memory alive and fresh.

The last one, Sir, that I have got to mention is the sudden death of the late Raja of Sidli who was one of the premier Zaminders of the district of Goalpara. Although he retired from Assam and settled in Calcutta, he took a lively interest for the betterment of the province as a whole, the district in particular and especially his own tenantry. But in this case let me "ring out the old and ring in the new." We congratulate our worthy colleague here the new Raja of Siddli-Raja Ajit Narayan Dev.

I hope, Sir, that this house will accept a motion from me that we do condole on the deaths of the personages I have ennumerated and that this Legislature's expression of condolence be conveyed to the bereaved families.

hon, members on this side of the House, I desire to associate myself wholeheartedly with the resolution of condolence which has been moved by the Hon'ble Leader of the House

The sense of arrepetable loss at the death of the revered Gurudev, a personality who had inspired the whole of India with the high ideals which he had preached, which he had lived and which he had worked upon, will be shared, I am vare, by all sections of the House. Poet Rabindranath, to my mind, was one of the greatest creative geniuses that lived in any time. In the field of literature, he was an artist of a kind and an order which has seldom been attained by any of the living writers of the day. Whatever he touched he rendered divine, whatever he wrote was elenations and the ordinary ing and inspiring. The art was not confined to the catering of the ordinary mind, he always clevated things to a level which drew out the Divine in man. It is for this teason that he was universally acclaimed as the Gurudey. He was verily a teacher of mankind. In the field of art—I mean painting the same expression of the Divine was also there, and the artists who could appreciate his paintings laid stress on the fact that there also he had tried to draw humanity to an elevation which was not to be found in the common run of artists. But his greater contribution was, I think, in the domain of work for humanity. It was he who by his writings, by his speeches and by his actions had converted the service of the poor into the service of God in man. In his writings one would read that very great principle, tiz., that the service of God is service of the poor. It is he who enunciated what we call the service of the Daridra Narayan; and what is more, he had actually tried to work out this ideal in his Asram at Santiniketan. I would not take up the time of the House by describing the manifold activities that the fold activities that are going on there, but I can tell the House that the whole object of that institution has been, on the one hand, to raise humanity to the Land institution has been, on the other hand to serve the humanity to the level of the Divine, and on the other hand, to serve the poor in the manner in which it is practicable. The loss of such a personality can seldom be exaggerated. We feel that not merely India nay the world is poorer to day on account of this great less. I should consider it a privilege for this House to be able to associate with the condolence on the death of such a mighty and great soul.

I also associate myself with the condolence in regard to the Maharaja of Manipur. It may not be unknown to many hon, members of this House that the relationship of Assam with Manipur is a historical fact. The Maharaja by his contact with the people of Assam had sustained and maintained that spirit. We are really sorry to have to condole his death.

Then, Sir, reference has been made to the death of Mr. Guru Saday Dutt, who was an inhabitant of Sylhet. He was also an idealist of a kind; he had tried to organise certain movement by which he wanted to bring joy to the life of villagers. He had himself done enough to raise the condition of the poor sisters in India. In all these matters, as I said, Sir, he had tried to follow an ideal. Although a man of Service he has done enough for the community to deserve approbation and our good-will. We are really sorry to lose him.

Then, Sir, I associate myself with the condolence on the deaths of Babu Suresh Chandra Das and Raja of Sidli. We have members in this House

who are related to these deceased persons. The amiability of Babu Suresh Chandra Das was well-known to the members of this House. Any one who

had come in his contact could not but like him

So far as Raja of Sidli is concerned, I am proud to be able to tell this House that he was a self-made man, so to say. Descending, as he did, from a great family he had in him something of the maker of a kingdom, the maker of a race; although at the time when he had come to his inheritance, his inheritance was not quite as worthy as it should have been, he raised it to such a prominent position as to be able to secure an abiding place among the ranks of the Rajas in this part of the country, I mean Bengaand Assam. We sympathise with the present Raja who is with us here. We are glad to be able to share his grief and sympathise with his sorrow.

Then, Sir, regarding Lord Willingdon, he was undoubtedly a great administrator. We had surely differed in outlook with him over many things but that does not mean that we should not pay homage to his memory at

his death.

We associate with this condolence resolution whole-heartedly and desire that as a mark of respect for these great men, the House should adjourn, as the Hon'ble Leader of the House has already announced, as soon as we finish

Dr. Rabindranath Tagore was no doubt a great patriot, a saint and a sage. Nearly more than half a century he was the great source from which the intellectual, æsthetic, social and political life of India received ceaseless inspiration and nourishment in every direction. His was such a creative imagination that what he touched he embellished. Never was found to be such versatality an active gift, in anyone within living memory, as in Dr. Rabindranath Tagore. In poetry, in literature, in music and in art he has left such treasures which will be of immense value not only to the people of this generation, but also to generations to come and not only to the people of this goneration, but also to generations to come and not only to the people of this country, but also to the people of the whole world. Indeed, he can be claimed as the pride of humanity and as a gem, who shone and radiated brilliance in diverse directions. By what he wrote and spoke he really tried to instil in us the manly spirit of courage and justice; and we all know how on occasions when discordant notes were struck in the social and political life of India, his was the trumpet voice which rang with fine and soul stirring tones. Certainly we are poorer to-day by the death of such and sour surring tones. Certainly we all his life to uplift the condition of a man. He not only strove unceasingly all his life to uplift the condition of the people of India, but he strove all his life to place such ideals before the whole world to follow as would usher in a better and a happier world to live in. By his death we feel desolate to-day; but we tope that his spirit will be working in us and lead us to such activities as are necessary to bring in days of happiness and prosperity to our country.

By the death of the late Manaraja of Manipur, this Province has indeed lost a great wellwisher and a friend. Although I was not personally acquainted with him I had a friend. inted with him, I had occasion to know of many of his noble deeds. was really the ruler of that part of Indian India in the neighbourhood of this province which is inhabited by people of a very ancient race of whom we read even in the Mahabharata. As the Hon'ble Premier has said, the late

Maharaja was a greatly religious man and from what I learnt about him from time to time I got the conviction that he was really a ruler who always thought of the good of his people and o the good of this province also. In mourning his death, we really mourn the loss of a scion of an ancient line of ruling princes in India.

Lord Willingdon, whose death has been mentioned in this condolence motion, was no doubt considered to be a strong ruler, but all the same, he served India in several capacities. He was twice Governor of two Provinces and he retired from India as Viceroy and Governor-General of India Although we had differences of opinion in respect of the manner of his administration, as the Leader of the Opposition has said, we do feel that he was one who also thought of the good of India and it is said that he also differed with many of the Buttshers with regard to the manner in which India's independence should be helped. He had his own ideas and those ideas were certainly to elevate the lot of the Indian people.

Then, coming to speak of the death of late Babu Suresh Chandra Das, I really feel that by his death I have sustained a great personal loss. I had such intimate and personal relations with him that I had opportunities to know of the qualities of head and heart that he possessed. Although he was a member of the Provincial Executive Service for the best part of his life, yet, I may say that in discharging his duties as a member of that Service he was one who never compromised with his conscience. I know of several occasions when he acted according to his own conscience, although necessities of the acted according to his own conscience, although necessities of the acted according to his own conscience. By his sities of the administration pulled him in a different direction. death the Province has certainly lost a devoted public man and an earnest

worker for the cause of the country.

The late Mr. Gurusaday Dutta, was indeed a great man in the sense that he was a real patriot who always thought of the good of his own country. He was a member of the Indian Civil Service and of him it can be said that he was a man of great independence of character. The Bratachari Movement and the Soraj Nalini Association which he started are the real monuments which he raised to his own memory and we all know what These two many and energy he spent for the growth of these two institutions. These two movements really show what a real patriot he was. Certainly, India is poorer to-day by the death of such a man.

Then, about the late Raja Abhoy Narayan Deb. Although I was not acquainted with him, I know that he was really a true scion of an old family and by his death, certainly this Province has lost one, who was one of the premier noble men of the Province. I share the grief of his heir, the hon. Raja Ajit Narayan Deb our colleague in this House and on behalf

of the House I offer sincere condolences to him.

I would like that, to show our respect to the memory of those personalities, hon. members should rise in their seats and remain silent for two

The final accounts of the year, however, show that receipts amounted to Trs. 9,22,26 and charges to Trs. 8,97,55, thus resulting in a surplus closing balance of Trs.24,71. This difference in the closing balance was due to better results under two of the principal revenue heads namely "Taxes on Income other than Corporation Tax" (Trs.22,65) and "Forests" (Trs.3,20), partly counterbalanced by decreases under "Land Revenue", "Provincial Excise" and "Civil Works". On the whole, the excess of expenditure charged to revenue over revenue which was estimated at Trs.2,96 in the revised turned into an excess of revenue over expenditure amounting to Trs.17,44.

I. Customs (-Trs.91).-Owing to the decrease in this

Government's share of the export duty on jute.

IV. Taxes on Income (+Trs.22,65).—Due to larger receipts from the Assam Agricultural Income-tax than was anticipated in the revised as a result of tea gardens making advance payments on account of 1940-41 before assessments were compeleted, in addition to payments for 1939-40,

VII. Land Revenue (-Trs.3,00).—The decrease is mainly due to fall in collections under 'Temporarily-Settled Estates'.

The amount of arrear collections due had also fallen.

VIII. Provincial Excise (-Trs. 56).-Due to fall in the con-

sumption of country spirit.

X. Forests (+Trs.3,20).—Owing to increased demand for timber for war supply and also due to increased prices for the sale of timber as a result of the war.

XXXIX. Civil Works (—Trs.6,57).—Due to smaller subvention from the Central Road Development account as a result of restrictions imposed by the Central Government owing to the war.

Capital and Debt heads (+Trs.59,07).—Receipts and expenditure under these heads are of a fluctuating nature and accurate estimates are not possible. An increase or decrease in receipt is followed by a similar increase or decrease in expenditure.

50. Civil Works (- Trs. 5.70).—Due to smaller expenditure on works financed from the petrol tax and other Central Government grants as a result of restrictions placed by India on such expenditure owing to the War.

55. Superannuation allowances and pensions: Trs.88. Due to smaller charges drawn in England owing to the death of

certain pensioners.

IV-1941-42

4. Prospects for 1941-42.—The total provincial revenue receipts for the first half year amounted Trs.1,31,03 as compared with Trs.1,38,76 during the corresponding period of 1940-41. The decrease of Trs.4,73 during the current year is due to less collection of Agricultural Income-tax (Trs.5,56), owing to late assessment of tax during the first part of the year, Land Revenue (Trs.1,57) owing to floods, Provincial Excise (Trs.1,57) due to fall in the consumption of country spirit and Stamps (Trs.1,05) due to establishment of more Debt Conciliation Boards, counterbalanced by an increase of Trs.5,13 under "Forests" as a result of War demands. It is not impossible at this stage to say accurately what the actual position at the end of the year will be, but the total revenue is likely to be lower than estimated in the original budget by about 3 lakhs.

The expenditure under revenue heads during the first half of the year amounted to Trs.1,51,82 against Trs.1,41,82 during the corresponding period of last year. The variation between the two years' actuals is the result of variations under different heads and due to the drawal of two months' pay in the month of September 1941 owing to the Puja vacation continuing till the 6th October 1941.

In a final of for the current year a sum of Trs.50 was provided for countrois relief and Trs.50 for agricultural luan lap to yest the demands in the flood-affected parts of Sylher and to har and some parts of the Assam Valley a sum of Tr 1.70 has already been sanctioned for gratuitious relief and 11 5 70 has agricultural loans. Another 2 lakhs are likely to be needed for each of these purposes to meet the requirements of the rest of the year. Owing to rise in prices of foodstuff as a result of War, Government have sanctioned grain compensation allowance of one anna per rupee to all Government servants drawing a pay of less than Rs.30 a month and a sum of about the 2,00 will be required for this purpose during the content year. A sum of Trs. 2,00 will also be required to Cally our thood damage repairs to Public Works Department roads. There is likely to be some increased expenditure under certain other heads due to various reasons, but it is difficult to estimate accurately what the increase will amount to.

It is thus apprehended that the revenue deficit of Trs.11,89 estimated in the original budget will be increased to about Rs. I laklis.
