THE ASSEMBLY met in the Assembly Chamber, Shillong, at 11 a.m., on Tuesday, the 13th September 1938.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

STARRED QUESTIONS (to which oral answers were given)

questions Nos.212-216 standing in the name of (a) Starred Mr. Baidyanath Mookerjee were not called and answered as the questioner was absent.

(b) Starred questions Nos.217-221 standing in the name of Srijut Siddhi Nath Sarma were not called and answered as the questioner was absent.

(c) Starred question No.222 standing in the name of Babu Rabindra Nath Aditya was not called and answered as the questioner was absent.

Assam Premier's speech at Silchar re taxation policy of Government

Srijut OMEO KUMAR DAS asked:

*223. (a) Has the attention of Government been drawn to a news item under the caption "Assam Premier at Silchar" which appeared in the

Statesman (Assam edition), dated the 13th August, 1938?

(b) Is it a fact that the Hon'ble the Chief Minister discussed in course of his speech at Silchar the Congress proposal for 50 per cent. reduction of land revenue and also regarding an enquiry into the taxation policy of Government so as to distribute the incidence of taxation on an equitable basis?

*224. (a) Is the Hon'ble the Chief Minister aware that the Congress proposal for taxing agricultural income is for those having an income of Rs.2,000 and over and does not affect the general agriculturists who are

admittedly poor?

(b) If so, what did the Hon'ble the Chief Minister mean in saying that "in the poor province of Assam the agriculturists could not make both ends meet and it would be simply taking away from them small favours already granted to them if the Government imposed such a tax on agriculture" as reported in the said paper?

(c) Will Government be pleased to state whether they have any information as regards the number of agriculturists having an income of

Rs.2,000 and over in this Province?

*225. Will Government be pleased to state—(a) Whether the Hon'ble Chief Minister said in course of his speech at Silchar, as reported in the Statesman of the 13th August, 1938, that "as regards the tea gardens, they were already overtaxed"?

(b) If so, what was the basis for such a statement by the Hon'ble

Chief Minister?

*226. Will Government be pleased to state whether the Hon'ble the Chief Minister calculated the incidence of taxation on the tea gardens before making the above statement?

*227. (a) Will the Hon'ble the Chief Minister be pleased to state whether he stated as reported in the Statesman of the 13th August, that "there was a cry for fifty per cent. remission of revenue, and he was ready to hand over administration to anybody who would be able to manage the affairs of

the Government after granting such a remission"?

(b) If so, does the Hon'ble the Chief Minister propose to make that offer on the floor of this House and see if anybody comes forward to manage the affairs of Government after granting 50 per cent. remission?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

223. (a)—Government has seen the article.

(b)—No, the Chief Minister did not discuss the Congress proposal for 50 per cent. or its other taxation proposals.

224. (a)—Government have not seen any Congress proposal for taxing

agricultural income over Rs.2,000 in Assam.

(b)—The speech was in Bengali and he referred to the Mirashdar class of agriculturists in the Surma Valley who are not "admittedly poor".

(c)—Government have not made any enquiry throughout the province to find out the number of such agriculturists, but they have materials with them for a certain district to say that the number is not insignificant.

225. (a)—No, the Chief Minister never made any such statement.

(b)—Does not arise.

226.—Does not arise.

227.(a) & (b)—In his speech at Silchar which was in the vernacular the Hon'ble Chief Minister pointed out that as land revenue brings in very nearly half the provincial receipts, fifty per cent. reduction in land revenue will make the administration impossible without further taxation, and that if the 50 per cent. reduction resolution had been carried, he would have resigned making room for others. He finds himself in good company, as the newspaper reports, that when his party people pressed the Hon'ble Premier of United Provinces for reduction of 50 per cent in rent, he replied that administration would be impossible and that he would resign if that is carried. If a 50 per cent. reduction in land revenue is carried in the House, inspite of his reasoned opposition, he is prepared to resign.

Separate ward for female in-door patients in the Barpeta Civil Hospital

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS asked:

*228. (a) Are Government aware that there is no separate ward for female in-door patients in the Barpeta Civil Hospital and that the said patients are greatly inconvenienced therefor?

(b) If so, do Government propose to remove this long-felt want

and make necessary provisions for the same at an early date?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied:

228. (a)—There is no separate ward for female in-door patients at Barpeta. But there are two rooms which are utilised for female patients when necessity arises. (b)—Does not arise.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS asked: The question No.228(b) is "If so, do Government propose to remove this long felt want and make necessary provisions for the same at an early date?" The answer is Does not arise. Do not Government think any necessity that there should be any separate room for the female patients?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: I have already said in the reply that there are two rooms which are utilised for female patients

when necessity arises.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: Is it sufficient for the female patients of the gentle class?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: According to the

report, I can say that it is sufficient for the present.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: Do Government know that the ladies of gentle class never go there for inconvenience sake?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: What is the question,

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: Will the hon. member please repeat the question?

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: The answer given by Government is that there are two rooms and one is used for the female patients.

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: No Sir. Two rooms

are used for semale patients.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: The rooms are always used by the ordinary patients. If any lady of the higher class goes there, she cannot remain there for inconvenience sake as it is just adjacent to the male ward.

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: Ladies of the higher class generally do not go to a small hospital like this. Moreover, Sir, I would like to point out to the hon. members that this is a Local Board hospital and it is their concern to make better provision for the ladies of the higher class.

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: This is the only hospital where operation is made. There is no other private hospital where operation can be performed. Recently one lady of the higher class went there but for inconvenience sake she could not remain there, and she has been transferred to Gauhati.

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: What is the question? Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: The question is that there is only one room for the female patient and all sorts of female patients huddle up there. If any gentle lady goes there, she feels inconvenience, for want of accommodations. Recently one lady of the gentle class went there and was operated but for various inconveniences she has been transferred to Gauhati.

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: We have no inform-

ation about that Sir.

Amount of agricultural loan issued in the Barpeta Subdivision

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS asked:

*229. Will Government be pleased to state the amount of Agricultural loans issued in the Barpeta subdivision but not realised, if any, in the previous year and whether any prayer has been made by the people for the same this year?

*230. Has the attention of Government been drawn to articles Howli mauza Rayat Hitasadhini Sabha' and Kalbari Ryat Sabha in the 'Assam Sevok' in its issues dated 24th July, 1938 and 7th August, 1938 respecivtely and the article 'Locusts and drought damage in Barpeta' in the Times of Assam in its issue, dated 9th July, 1938 praying for agricultural loans?

*231. Will Government be pleased to state the amount of total Agricultural loans sanctioned for the subdivision of Barpeta in the current year?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

229.—Government have no information of the subdivisional figures. The entire amount of agricultural loans, both principal and interest outstanding in the district of Kamrup on the 20th May, 1937 have been remitted. Government did not sanction any agricultural loans for Barpeta subdivision in the previous year, but they have received many representation from the people for issue of agricultural loans this year.

230.—Government have seen the articles.

(After a pause the next question was called).

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: I want to put a question with reference to question 230.

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI: Are we to go, Sir, to the downward course?

Srijut GHANASHYAM DAS: This is an allied question Sir.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: No. The next question has been

Srijut MAHI CHANDRA BORA: Is it a fact that special amount

has been drawn up for special localities?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI: The amount mentioned has been sanctioned by Government and certainly the Deputy Commissioner will utilise it for the benefit of the areas affected.

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

231.—Rupees 15,000.

Scale of pay of the officers of the Forest Department

Khan Bahadur Maulavi SAYIDUR RAHMAN asked:

*232.(a) Is it a fact that Forest Rangers, Deputy Rangers and the

Foresters are still getting graded pay and not the time scale of pay?

(b) Is it a fact that the members of the Indian Forest Service, the Assam Forest Service, Forest guards and the Ministerial staff get time scale of pay?

(c) If so, why the same has been so long denied to Forest Rangers,

Deputy Rangers and Foresters?

- *233.(a) Is it a fact that the Forest Enquiry Committee of 1929 recommended time scale of pay for Forest Rangers from Rs. 100-5/1-150-10/1-200-10/1-280 ?
- (b) Is it a fact that in spite of the recommendations, the scale was reduced to grade scale from Rs. 75 to Rs. 200 and some posts in all the grades were retrenched?

(c) Is it a fact that many Forest Rangers have had no increment

or promotion since 1930?

*234.(a) Are Government aware that the graded scale of pay is causing hardship and discontent amongst the Forest subordinates?

(b) If so, what steps do Government propose to take to redress this hardship?

*235.(a) Is it a fact that there are some posts lying vacant in the Assam

Forest Service for some years?

(b) If so, will Government be pleased to state the number and the date since when such posts are lying vacant?

*236. Do Government propose to fill up the vacancies in the Assam Forest Service by promoting deserving Forest Rangers at an early date?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

232. (a)—Yes.

(b)—Yes.

(c)—In view of the peculiarly difficult conditions under which these officers have to serve, Government considered it desirable to provide a means of promptly rewarding good work, for which purpose the system of promotion by grades is more suitable than the time scale system. The matter will again be examined.

233. (a)—Yes. (b)—Yes. This scale is intended for those who enter the Government service after 20th August, 1931.

(c)—It is not a fact. Since July, 1930 every Ranger has received an increased grade pay.

234. (a)—Government have no information to that effect.

(b)—Does not arise.

235. (a)—Yes.

(b)—Three—Two since 1932 and one since 1935.

236.—Government are awaiting findings of the Retrenchment Committee and publication of the rules for the new Assam Forest Service, Class I.

Breaches in the Desang Bund between the Trunk Road and the Desaugmukh

Srijut BHUBAN CHANDRA GOGOI asked:

*237. Are Government aware that there were at least 12 breaches in Desang Bund between the Trunk Road and the Desangmukh, i.e., within a space of 10 miles?

*238. Are Government aware that there have been annual breaches in

this bund?

*239. Will Government be pleased to state what steps have been taken

for the repair of these breaches?

*240. Do Government propose to consider the question of widening this bund and to make it cartable, and save the people from the constant havoc of the flood?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA

237.—Government are informed that 11 breaches occurred in 7 miles of the bund.

238.—This does not accord with the reports received by Government.

239.—All the breaches have been temporarily repaired. Permanent repairs will be taken up in cold weather.

240.—No. It is not understood how the widening of the bund can

minimise the havoc caused by flood.

Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKERJEE**: Sir, to-day I was late only by half a minute and that was not my fault. I was detained at the gate on some unavoidable reasons. Will you kindly take up the starred questions that are standing in my name?

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: I am sorry, when I have framed a rule

this should not be relaxed.

Maulavi BADARUDDIN AHMED: Are Government aware that the Inspecting Officer visited those two schools and recommended for grantin-aid?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: The papers have not

been placed before me yet, Sir.

Srijut MAHADEV SARMA: May I know what are the basis for

Government to consider for giving aid to such schools?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: There are various First of all, self-help, secondly, enrolment, thirdly, efficiency of factors, Sir. the staff, and so on.

Do not Government take into Srijut MAHADEV SARMA: account the number of schools in a subdivision for the purpose of giving

grants-in-aid?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: No, that cannot be taken as the only criterion, because there may be several schools in the subdivision which are perfunctorily managed.

Srijut MAHADEV SARMA: Do Government consider the fact that

in certain backward places education is badly needed?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: Yes, Government are always anxious to help the backward people.

Srijut KRISHNA NATH SARMA: Has the entire amount sanc-

tioned last year been distributed by this time?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: Yes, the entire amount has been distributed.

Number of students in High Schools of Assam

Babu BALARAM SIRCAR asked:

191. Will the Hon'ble Minister in charge of Education be pleased to state-

(a) The total number of students in Government as well as Govern-

ment aided high schools separately in Assam?

(b) The total number of students in Government and aided Middle English schools separately in Assam?

(c) The total number of students belonging to (i) caste Hindus (ii) Muhammadans (iii) Scheduled caste (iv) Tribal and others in the said schools?

(d) The total number of students of the said communities enjoying

full free and half free studentships?

(e) The basis of granting free and half free studentships to the students of different communities?

192. Will the Hon'ble Minister in charge of Education be pleased to state-

(a) Whether there is any provision for the free studentships of the scheduled caste students in secondary educational institutions?

(b) If so, what is the percentage?

(c) If not, do Government propose to consider the poverty of the scheduled caste students and make such provision for them?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

191. (a)—Government High Schools—10,631.

Government Aided High Schools-18,204.

(b)—Government Middle English Schools—1,810. Government Aided Middle English Schools-16,156.

(c) and (d)—The information is not available.

(e)—The hon. member is referred to the rules in Part I, section 22 of the Education Department Rules and Orders—a copy of which is available in the Assembly Library.

192. (a)—There is no special provision but they can participate in the 5 per cent. reserved for "other pupils" under rule 2 of the rules referred

to above.

(b)—Does not arise.

(c)—The whole question of giving adequate educational facilities to scheduled castes and tribal people is at present under the consideration of Government.

Appointment in the Assam School Service

Babu KARUNA SINDHU ROY asked:

193. (a) Will Government please state whether more persons were recommended after 1st April for appointment in the Assam School Service by the Public Service Commission, than those mentioned in the statement laid on the table, in answer to my starred question No.107, in the last February-March Session of the Assembly?

(b) If so, will Government please state whether all the persons recommended have been actually appointed by the Director of Public

Instruction?

(c) If not, why not?

194. Will Government please state if the Director of Public Instruction is competent to ignore the recommendations of the Public Service Commission?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

193. (a)—Yes. The Public Service Commission was consulted in two

more cases.

(b) and (c)—Yes, except in one case where commitments previous to the inauguration of Provincial Autonomy and the Constitution of Public Service Commission made it difficult to give effect immediately to the Public Service Commission's recommendation.

194.—The Director of Public Instruction, Assam, is not competent to

ignore the recommendations of the Public Service Commission.

Improvement of Agriculture in Mankachar

Maulana ABDUL HAMID KHAN asked:

195. Will Government be pleased to state what steps taken by the Agricultural Department for the improvement of agriculture in the Mankachar area during the year 1936-37?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

195.—Rabi crop seeds were distributed for demonstration purposes.

Annual damage of agricultural crops in the Dhubri South Bank areas due to flood.

Maulana ABDUL HAMID KHAN asked:

196. Will the Hon'ble Minister in charge be pleased to state-

(a) Whether Government are aware that the Dhubri South Bank areas are subject to annual flood and in consequence the agricultural crops of the locality are damaged every year?

(b) If so, what steps Government propose to take to meet the situa-

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

196. (a)—Yes, to some extent.

(b)—It is impossible to train a river like Brahmaputra and make the riperian tracts absolutely safe for agricultural operations. But the general question of improving agricultural holdings is under the consideration of Government.

Cattle mortality in Sunamgani

Babu KARUNA SINDHU ROY asked:

197. Will Government please state-

(1) The total number of cattle died of epidemic diseases?

(2) The number of cattle attacked with epidemic diseases?

(3) The number of cattle cured after being attacked by such diseases? (4) The number of cattle cured being treated by Veterinary

Surgeons?

(5) The number of cattle died after being treated by Veterinary Surgeons from 1st March 1938 up till now in the Sunamganj subdivision?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

197.—It is presumed that the question refer to Sunamganj subdivision. (1)—8,812.

(2) and (3)—Reliable figures are not available.

(4)—24,735.

(5)—Reliable figures are not available.

Question re Babu Jyotish Chandra Das, late a Lecturer, Murarichand College Babu KARUNA SINDHU ROY asked:

198. (a) Is it a fact that Babu Jyotish Chandra Das, Lecturer, Murarichand College, Sylhet, whose services were dispensed with in connection with activities arising out of the Civil Disobedience Movement (vide questions and answers Nos.318-331 in the February-March Session of the Assembly, 1938) has not been re-instated by Government?

(b) If not, will Government please state the facts on account of

which he was not re-instated?

199. (a) Are Government aware that Babu Jyotish Chandra Das, Lecturer, Murarichand College, sent an application dated 21st March 1931 for re-instatement after the Gandhi-Irwin pact?

(b) If so, what was the reply given by Government?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

198. (a)—The reply is in the affirmative.

(b)—The hon, member is referred to the answers to question 34(a) published in the Gazette dated the 23rd March 1932, wherein the facts asked for were fully stated. They were once more repeated in connection with reply to questions referred to by the hon. member in his question No.198(a) above.

199. (a)—A representation appears to have been received but its con-

tents are not available.

(b)—Government are not in a position to answer as the relevant papers have been destroyed.

Works done by the Rural Reconstruction Officer

Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKERJEE asked:

200. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) What work the Rural Reconstruction Officer in the Agricultural Department has done up-to-date?

(b) What staff and establishment he has? (c) How many centres has he opened?

(d) What are the names of these districts?

(e) How far they are from the district and subdivisional headquarters, and what are the means of communications to reach them?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

- 200. (a)—The Rural Reconstruction Officer, who has since reverted to his substantive post of Deputy Director of Agriculture, has prepared a scheme after a considering processary after a considerable amount of touring in the province for collecting necessary
- (b)—One clerk and two peons till the date of his reversion. Since the reversion, he was given the assistance of a lower division clerk till 2nd August 1039 August 1938.

(c)—None.

(d) and (e)—Do not arise. Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKERJEE: When is the Government

going to give effect to the scheme prepared by the Special Officer? The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: It is expected that the students will be in training after the pujas, and from the beginning of the next year the scheme will be in operation.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: Under the present rules which have come into force, it is not the Secretary who is to call out the number of questions, but it is the Speaker himself. Therefore I shall call out the numbers from now.

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: May I know, Sir, whether under the present rules, supplementaries are allowed on unstarred questions?

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: Yes, that amendment was carried.

(b)—Both Deputy Commissioners and Sub-Deputy Collectors examine the accounts of Mauzadars in course of their tours but they have no time to scrutinise all entries in the numerous registers. Collections are also watched in Mauzadars' weekly returns.

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHUDHURI*: We had to ask for the Commissioner's opinion because some of the forms are required in such small quantities that it may not require reprinting.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR*: Does the decision lie with

the Commissioner?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: The deci-

sion lies with Government.

Srjiut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR*: May we not demand that all the forms that are used in the Assam Valley, big or small, should be

printed in Assamese?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI*: That assurance has already been given, but we thought that we could do without printing the forms in Assamese which were not used in large quantities, but the principle has been accepted and efforts are being made to give effect

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR*: Will Government give effect to this principle in its entirety?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI*: Yes, Sir. The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

305.(a)—On the bas's of the population of the more important distinct communities.

(b)—It was long considered that the Muhammadan community should of its own wish be treated as a single entity. Demands have however recently been voiced by the Muhammadans of either valley, the Scheduled Castes of either valley and the Tribal people of the plains, that they should have separate recognition. Government are sudying the means of giving effect to these demands.

(c)—The domiciled Hindus have been separately recognized because in matter of language and social custom they form a distinct community from the indigenous peoples of the Province and have on several occasions urged such recognition. There is no such clear-cut distinction between the indigenous and domiciled Muslims.

(d)—The tea garden labour people not living in the gardens who reported themselves as Hindus during last census have not been excluded from the Hindus.

(e)—The labour population of the tea gardens, Indian Christians, Buddhists, Hindus residing in the Naga, Lushai and Khasi and Jaintia Hills, Sikhs, and various minor elements which do not fall within items 1 to 7 of the statement.

Khan Bahadur Maulavi SAYIDUR RAHMAN*: I am going to rise for a point of order, Sir, and ask for your ruling. I find in the Hindusthan Times of yesterday that these questions and answers have already to published there. We want to know from you whether it is permissible to publish this without the questions being put here.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: The hon, member will please remember the ruling that I gave in one of the last sessions with regard to the

unstarred questions that when the answers are laid down on the table the questions are considered to have been answered. It is only for putting supplementary questions that they are taken up from day to day are called That is done to give opportunities to put supplementary questions arising out of the answers given. Of course when the answers are laid on the table they are taken as being in possession of the Members.

Maulavi MUHAMMAD AMJAD ALI: When the answers are on

the table of the Members may we not take it as put?

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: As soon as the answers to unstarred questions are put on the table they are taken as put.

Maulavi MUHAMMAD AMJAD ALI: Is it not then open to the

members to put supplementaries?

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: In regard to that I have made it a principle that the member in whose name the question stand should remain present in the House. Of course, the member putting the question has got the first right to put the supplementaries and when one or two members stand up in addition to the member putting the question hon. members might have noticed that I call upon the questioner first to put his supplementaries. That principle I have drawn from the analogy of the rule that when a member remains absent in regard to starred questions those questions are not called. That is for the convenience of the House and also for the purpose of ensuring the presence of all the members at the time when questions are called out.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR*: With respect to unstarred questions, the presence of the questioner, I think, should not be insisted upon. Because the questions are supposed to be answered here. In case of the starred questions, if the questioner is absent the question is not answered at all. In the other case, however, they are answered and I think, Sir, that any other member that likes to ask supplementaries should be allowed to do so. I think probably, Sir, it would be better if the Members are given an opportunity to put further questions as long as the questions are held to put and answered, when the answers are laid on the table.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: With regard to unstarred question, hon. members would have noticed that I do not call out the questions where the questioner is absent. As I have already explained, his presence is necessary in order to give a right to the other members. I myself consider it to be his duty, I mean duty to the House, and to the other members. If the hon, members desire it, I may consider the question again. But at

present I am not advised to relax the rule I have followed.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: May we request you to

kindly reconsider the matter, Sir.

Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA: Does the Hon'ble Chief Minister think that the Punjabees, Nepalese, Marwaries and Bengalees, etc., all these form one community?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Does

the question relate to the domiciled Hindus?

Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA: Yes, it relates to answers to (c).

The Hon'ole Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: From the answer it will be seen that the domiciled Hindus have been separately recognised because in matter of language and social custom they form a distinct community.

Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA: Does the Hon'ble Chief Minister be-

lieve that they have a common language and social custom?

^{*} Speech not corrected.

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: No, Sir. But the numbers of the separate entities are so small that they cannot be put into separate distinct groups. As the hon. member may find in reply to (4), the small groups such as the Indian Christians, Buddhist, Hindus residing in the Naga, Lushai and Khasi and Jaintia Hills, Sikhs have been lumped in one column which is known as "others".

Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA: Is it not a fact that some of these communities, the domiciled people are more akin in their language and customs to the Assamese or Bengalees than the Marwaries and Punjabees?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: I

am not aware of that.

Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKERJEE: The reply I find is "There is no such clear-cut distinction between the indigenous and domiciled Muslims ". Why is this difference so far as the Hindus are concerned?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: I

have already answered that.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: May I ask in this connection whether the Sikh community who have adopted Assamese as their language

are treated as Assamese or as emigrants?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: My hon. friend has tabled a series of questions on the point and they will be replied to later on. But I can tell him that if he is referring to the Sikh community who have settled down for the last 100 years at Nowgong and who for all intents and purposes adopted the Assamese language, they are

Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA: Does not the Hon'ble Chief Minister know that the domiciled Bengalee Hindu is more akin to a Sylheti Hindu

than to a Punjabee or a Marwari?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: As my hon. friend knows Hindus of the two valleys are shown separately. The Hindu dumiciled in the Assam Valley although he may be speaking the same language as a Sylhet Hindu would not be shown as Sylheti because

he is resident in the Assam Valley.

Maulavi ABDUR RAHMAN: With reference to (b), it has been said "It was long considered that the Muhammadan community should of its own wish be treated as a single entity. Demands have however recently been voiced by the Muhammadans of either valley, the Scheduled castes of either valley, and the Tribal people of the plains that they should have separate recognition. Government are studying the means of giving effect to these demands". May I know from the Hon'ble Chief Minister whether the Government is considering the question as early as possible?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Yes, Sir.

Staff for educating fruit-growers in the methods of fruit preserva-

Mr. BAIDYANATH MOOKERJEE asked:

306. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) Whether it is a fact that the province of Assam is well-known as a producer of huge quantities of oranges, pine-apples and (b) Whether it is a fact that for want of knowledge of the art of canning and methods of preservation, fruit-growers are forced to dispose of their produce at nominal prices and are further handicapped by the shortness of the fruit season?

(c) Whether there is any staff competent to educate fruit-growers

in the methods of fruit-preservation, canning, etc. ?

(d) If not, do Government propose to give necessary training to some young men and retain their services under the Department of Agriculture?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

306.(a)—Yes. (b)—Yes, the producers are forced to dispose of their fruits as quickly as possible as there are no canning or preserving industries. Steps have however been taken to dispose of pine-apples at Calcutta at a better price and it may be continued for oranges also if the pine-apple scheme proves successful.

(e)—No. (d)—The point raised will be considered.

Lands under the Karaibari estates

Maulana ABDUL HAMID KHAN asked:

307. Will Government be pleased to state-

(a) Whether Government are aware that the lands under the Karaibari estates in Goalpara have deteriorated due

earthquake?

(b) Whether Government are aware that rupees 3 to 6 per bigha as rent and local rates upto two and half annas per rupee, are realised from the cultivating raisats of the affected areas of the Karaibari estate to their extreme hardships?

308. Are Government aware that Kalapani within the Karaibari estate

is a malarial place and has no road or dispensary?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

307. (a)—It is admitted that the lands deteriorated at the time of the earthquake but there has been gradual recoupment during the last seven

years by silt deposit.

(b)—The Zeminders realise from annas 14 to Re.1-8 for agricultural land and Rs.3 to Rs.5 per bigha for homestead lands and anna 1-3 as local rate per rupee. The Jotedars realise generally from their under-tenants double the rates of the Zeminders as rent. One bigha of the Perganah is equivalent to 1 bigha 17 khatha 13 chattaks in standard measurements by difference between the Zeminders' bigha the Jotedars' bigha. If calculated in standard measurement, the rate rent to the Jotedars is annas 7-6 and annas 12-9 per bigha in respect agricultural lands.

208—There is no Local B. measurement and there is no difference between the Zeminders' bigha and of

308.—There is no Local Board road to Kalapani from Diara or Mankachar and there is no dispensary also. The nearest dispensary is Mankachar which is about 6 miles away. It is reported to be fairly

malarial.

Co-operative Societies under orders of liquidation

Maulana ABDUL HAMID KHAN asked:

309. Are Government aware that disaffection prevails amongst the people of the Dhubri South Bank owing to the fact that a large number of Cooperative Societies of the areas, under the Central Bank, Dhubri, are under orders of liquidation?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

309.—It is a fact that there are s me societies at present under process of liquidation in the Dhubri South Bank and several petitions from members of some of those societies praying for remission of their ind vidual dues have been disposed of according to the merit of each case. It is neither unnatural nor unusual for the members of those societies to be dissatisfied when they are called upon to pay their respective quota of contribution for liquidation of the society's debt. But it is not a fact that dissatisfaction prevails generally amongst the people of the South Bank where 10 new societies have been started after 16th November 1936 against only 2 in the North Bank and as a matter of fact the demand for more societies in that locality could not be met on account of the cautious policy pursued by the Department mainly for want of suitable financing agency.

Restoration of the Executive Engineer's office at Golaghat Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA asked:

310. (a) Are Government aware of the demand of the public of Golaghat for the restoration of the Executive Engineer's office at Golaghat?

(b) If so, do Government propose to shift the same to Golaghat?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

He organized the Nizpat Vegetable and Fruit Growers' Co-operative Society and the Gangpar Dhumkar Samabaya Bayan Samiti in 1936-37 and the Sylhet Women Co-operative Thrift and Home Savings Society, Limited, and a special type society under the name of the Karimganj Co-operative Execution of Awards Union, Limited, in 1937-38.

Maulavi ABDUR RAHMAN: With reference to (b), Sir, may I know whether the Registrar visited any rural society in the subdivision of Habiganj? Is it not a fact from the list submitted that he did not go into the interior to visit any of the rural societies?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: That is evident, Sir, from the list given.

Maulavi ABDUR RAHMAN: May I know, Sir, why he did not visit these societies?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: The area under his jurisdiction, Sir, is the entire province of Assam and it would not be possible for him to go to every locality where there is a co-operative society?

Maulavi ABDUR RAHMAN: Is it not possible when there are so many officers of the department?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: That is undoubtedly the case. But the department is under-staffed.

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

331.(a)—Twenty-three days.
(b)—Five days in the interior of Karimganj and 3 days in the

interor of North Sylhet and 3 days in the interior of Maulvibazar.

(c)—The Assistant Registrar of Co-operative Societies spent 10, 9 and 3 days in rural areas of Habiganj, Sunamganj and Maulvibazar respectively.

(d)—No limit has been fixed for the touring of the Assistant Regis-

trars.

332.(a)—Yes.

Grant to Tezpur Local Board for Primary Education

Srijut OMEO KUMAR DAS asked:

333. Are Government aware that the grant to the Tezpur Local Board for Primary Education is not adequate?

334. Are Government aware that there is a large population of Backward people in the Tezpur subdivision, who are illiterate?

335. Do Government propose to encourage Primary Education amongst these people?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

333.—This is the best that Government have been able to do so far in view of their responsibilities in other matters and to other Boards.

335.—Certainly. Progress in this direction depends on the formulation of a Primary Education scheme which is under consideration.

Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA: May I know whether this primary education will be free and compulsory—I mean the one under the consideration of the Government?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: That will be free, but as

regards compulsion the question is being seriously examined.

Increase in number of Assam Ministers

Srijut MAHI CHANDRA BORA asked:

336. Has the attention of the Government been drawn to the Press statement published in the Times of Assam dated the 2nd July 1938, under the head line "Increase in number of Assam Ministers: Government contradict press news"?

337. Are Government aware that the said communiqué has caused widespread discontent in the press and amongst the Journalists of Assam for

its tone and insobriety of temper?

338. Is it a fact that it was stated in the communiqué—"It is deplorable that Nationalist newspapers can be used by malefactors for their insi-dious purposes against their political opponents"?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

336.—Yes.

337.—Government have seen criticisms of the communiqué in some journals of the province but have no information as to its effect upon the journalists. They deny that the communiqué showed "insobriety of temper".

338.—Yes. The Editor of the paper which first published the "news"

apologised for appearance of untrue statements in his journal.

Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA: May we know, Sir, to which question the latter part of the answer to question 338 relates, viz., "The editor of the paper which form a little statements in his journal." of the paper which first published the 'news' apologised for appearance of untrue statements in his journal "?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: The trend of the question is, Sir, that the particular sentence is being con-

demned. So I have replied as I have done.

The question did not ask for that Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA: information but still it has been volunteered.

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: I

have already said 'yes' to the question. I did not deny it.

Srijut MAHI CHANDRA BORA: Will the Hon'ble Minister be pleased to state whether there is a special department of the Government by which such communiques issued?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA:

There is no special department, Sir.

Srijut MAHI CHANDRA BORA: Under whose authority are such

communiques are issued?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Under the orders of Government the respective Secretary drafts and puts up to the Government Member concerned and that is published.

Srijut MAHI CHANDRA BORA: Do Government consider them-

selves political opponents of the nationalist newspapers?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: No, Sir. But they have every right to criticize if such papers are used for a particular purpose.

Staff of the Assam Legislative Council

Khan Bahadur Maulayi KERAMAT ALI asked:

339. (a) Is it a fact that the Assistants in the office of the Assam Legisla. tive Council were not allowed to avail the holiday on account of the King Emperor's Birthday in June last?

(b) If so, why?

(c) Are Government aware that the present staff is inadequate to cope with the work in that office?

steps to increase the (d) If so, do Government propose to take staff?

The Hon'ble Babu AKSHAY KUMAR DAS replied:

339. (a) & (b)—The Assistants were not ordered to attend office on the holiday, but they chose to come in order to pull down the arrears or to attend to urgent work.

(c) & (d)—The question has been kept pending till the recom-

mendations of the Retrenchment Committee are out.

Rural indebtedness in Habigani

Bahu SHIBENDRA CHANDRA BISWAS asked:

340. Are Government aware that the rural population of the subdivision of Habiganj are labouring under the heavy pressure of indebtedness?

341. Do Government propose to issue general orders prohibiting institution of fresh suits in the Civil Courts for the realisation of debts and for staying the existing money-decree being put into execution forthwith till the Assam Money-Lenders Act as amended, comes into operation or Debt Conciliation Board are established?

The Hon'ble Babu AKSHAY KUMAR DAS replied:

340.—Government have no information to show that the pressure of indebtedness, which is admitted to exist, is any worse in Habigani than elsewhere in the Province.

341.—Government have no power by executive action to prohibit the institution of suits. A Bill will be placed before the Legislature at this session providing for postponement of the execution of decrees in certain circumstances, and the possibility of extending the system of Conciliation Boards engages their attention.

Babu SHIBENDRA CHANDRA BISWAS: In view of the fact that the passing of the Bill will take some time and in the mean time fresh suits will be instituted in the civil courts for realisation of debts and existing money decrees will be put into execution forthwith, is the Government prepared to undertake any remedial measures to stop them?

The Hon'ble Babu AKSHAY KUMAR DAS: In the mean time Government cannot take any step until the Bill that has been introduced in the Assembly is passed.

Uncivil action of the Head Assistant, Revenue Department

Babu SHIBENDRA CHANDRA BISWAS asked:

342. Are Government aware that the Head Assistant, Revenue Department of the Government of Assam turned out a Muhammadan clerk of the Governor's Secretariat from the room of the Revenue Department?

343. Is it a fact that the said clerk went to the Revenue Department in connection with his official duties?

344. Will Government be pleased to state (a) whether there is any rule in the Secretariat that a clerk of a Department cannot enter into the room of another Department even on official duties?

(b) If not, do Government propose to take necessary disciplinary action against the said Head Assistant for turning out the said Muhamma-

345. Will Government be pleased to state (a) whether this fact was brought to the notice of the authorities? (b) If so, what action was taken against the offending Head Assistant? (c) If not, why not?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

342-345.—This was a trivial incident in which the Head Assistant considered that the clerk concerned was not following the regular procedure

and asked him to leave and to obtain such papers as were wanted on a proper requisition. It was due to an internal arrangement about looking into files of the different Secretariats. When the matter was reported it was adequately dealt with by the responsible officer, the Chief Secretary, who absolved the Head Assistant concerned from any wrong or uncivil action.

Inclusion of Assamese in the Indian Civil Service Examination

349. Will Government be pleased to state-

(e) Whether it is a fact that boat-hire for service of processes, both Civil and Criminal, within the Municipal limits of the town of Goalpara too, where no boat is necessary for service of any

such processes, is also charged and realised?

- (f) The total amount of boat-hire actually realised for processes during the last fifteen years, 1922-1937 at the Goalpara Civil Station? (Figures year by year may be given and then the total.)
 - (g) The total amount of expenditure, out of the money thus realised?
 - (h) Whether there has been any accumulation out of the funds left undisbursed?
 - (i) If so, what is the amount?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

349. (a)—Yes.

(b)—Yes.

(c)-Not hitherto.

- (d)—A list has been prepared this year. A copy of it, on approval of the District Judge, will be sent to the Secretary, Bar Association, Goalpara.
- (e)—Yes, as some portions of the town within the Municipal area go under water during the rains and use of boats occasionally becomes necessary.

351. (a) Is it a fact that Maulavi Amjad Ali, M.L.A., submitted a representation on 4th January 1938 to the Hon'ble the Chief Minister stating

the facts detailed on those resolutions?

(b) If so, will Government be pleased to state the steps since taken to remedy the same?

352. Will Government be pleased to state—

(b) Whether Government is aware that the gap on the road shall have to be crossed by the buses over bamboo bridges in fair

353. Do Government propose to give effect to that resolution? probable cost for the construction of the bridge?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

350 and 351. (a)—The replies are in the affirmative.

(b)—The question of taking over the Jogighopa ferry by the Public Works Department and to run it by a steam boat is under the consideration of Government.

352. (a) and (b)—Yes.

(c)—The hon, member is referred to the Public Works Department Notification No.178-C.F., dated the 29th November 1937, containing the schedule of tolls, copy of which is placed on the Library Table. Half the rates specified therein are levied when the crossing is by means of a cold weather bridge.

(d) and (e)—Such a resolution was received and the hon. member also personally represented this matter to Hon'ble Minister.

As suspension of tolls in one ferry will be taken as a prece-

dent, the prayer cannot be granted.

354. (a) and (b)—Government have received no complaints.

(c)—The Assembly's representatives on the Assam-Bengal Railway Advisory Committee, are the best persons to move in the matter.

Assamese Computors Subordinates in the Public Works and Department

Srijut HALADHAR BHUYAN asked:

355. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) The actual number of Assamese Computors and Assamese subordinates in the Public Works Department at present?

(b) If there are none in the Department, why so?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

355. (a)—There are no Assamese Computors but there are twenty-nine Assamese subordinates in the Public Works Department.

(b)—There were no qualified Assamese candidates for the posts of Computors when vacancies were filled up.

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied :

356.—Yes, after receipt of the question.

357.(a)—Yes.

357.(b) & 358.—Government did not deprive the Board of its right to elect a Chairman and Vice-Chairman. The Board failed to elect them within the time prescribed by rule, and Government had to take action under section 12 B of the Assam Local Self-Government Act. Government do not agree with the hon member that the action taken was against the principle of democracy and the spirit of Local Self-Government.

Treatment under the Homeopathic System

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA asked:

359. Are Government aware that a large section of the people of this Province favour the system of Homeopathic treatment in preference to allopathic and other kind of treatment specially in case of diseases of the children?

360. Are Government aware that ordinarily the treatment under the Homeopathic system is less expensive than any other recognised system of

treatment?

361. Are Government aware that a large number of people die every year without any treatment for want of proper medical aid as they cannot afford to purchase costly allopathic medicines or procure medical aid on account of their poverty?

362. Are Government aware that a few medical practitioners both allopathic and Homeopathic, in the town of Gauhati started a Homeopathic

College last year?

363. Are Government aware that there is no Homeopathic College in Assam and students from Assam are to get their training in Calcutta which

is very expensive?

364. Will Government be pleased to state whether Government has received a petition from the Principal of the Homeopathic College, Gauhati, praying for Rs. 1,000 as non-recurring grant and Rs. 250 as recurring grant in aid of the Institution?

365. Do Government propose to consider the case of the petitioner and sanction a non-recurring and a recurring grant in aid of the said institution?

366. Do Government propose to introduce Homeopathic system of treatment which has received State recognition in the Central Assembly in the province as it is less expensive and popular among a large section of the poor inhabitants of Assam?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied:

359.—Government have no reason to think that the section of people preferring Homeopathy to other systems is large.

360.—Homeopathic doses are smaller than allopathic doses and to that extent the former may be less expensive than the latter. Government have

no information about other systems of treatment.

361.—It is possible that some people who are not within reach of charitable dispensaries—whether maintained by Government, local bodies or private persons—or of private practitioners following any of the systems of treatment die without proper treatment.

362.—Yes.

363.—Ycs.

365.—Not until they are in funds and are satisfied from the work done

in the College that it merits help.

366—Government do not propose to patronise this system until they are satisfied that it has an adequate scientific basis, that the institutions in which it is taught have a curriculum covering all the fundamental feature of the human body and the physiology of the human system and that the students are examined by a well-qualified body of examiners.

Cattle epidemic and mortality of cattle

Srijut SIDDHI NATH SARMA asked:

367. Will Government be pleased to state whether Government have received reports from the various parts of Assam about serious outbreak of cattle epidemic and high mortality of cattle from rinderpest and other cattle diseases during the last few months?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

367.—The reply is in the affirmative.

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

(b) Whether the appointment was made by a Local Board or by a Municipal Board of the subdivision?

(c) If so, will Government he pleased to state the name of that Local Board or the Municipal Board and the name of its Chairman?

(d) If not, whether the appointment was made by Government? (e) If so, will Government be pleased to state the name of the officer appointing the teacher referred to above?

372. Is it a fact that the Chairmen of Local and Municipal Boards,

pality?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied:

375. (a)—The Dag in question adjoins the 'hatkhola' land covered by dag Nos. 1889 and 1890. Near one end of it there is a masonary pillar said to have been erected by the Municipality.

(b)—Yes, on a portion of it. The reply to the second part of the

question is also in the affirmative.

(c)—Government understand that there was a serai on some portion of the dag but have no definite information about its exact site.

(d)—Yes. At the time of his visit no one could tell him when and by whom the North-Eastern pillar was built.

(e)—The Municipal Board had no claim on this dag 1888. It had never been vested in the Board. This dag was recorded as "Sarkari". The portion settled with the persons referred to did not have Municipal Stalls, and the Municipality did not spend any money in this portion as they have done in the portion east of it. This portion is in the western corner adjoining the land settled with some one else on periodic lease. The other portions applied for by others fall either on or between pieces of land improved or used by the Municipality and do not form a contiguous plot.

(f)—The reply to the first part of the question is in the negative. A road separates it from the Hatkhola (Municipal market). So far as the second part is concerned Government have recently received a copy of a resolution said to have been passed in a public meeting resenting the

(g)—Government are not satisfied that the Board or the public have

any reasonable grounds for a grievance.

428. Are Government aware that great hardship was caused to the people by making each pattadar pay one rupee for the Anti-Tuberculosis

Fund?

429. Are Government aware that Srijut Ratnakar Deva Sarma of the Sarabari Mauza was made to pay rupee one to the Anti-Tuberculosis Fund?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied:

427.—The total collection so far made by 18 out of 23 mauzadars comes to Rs.1,161-14-0. A sum of Rs 150-10-0 was collected by the mauzadar of Sarabari.

428.—Government understand that there are over 4,000 pattadars in Sarabari mauza, and that the number of subscribers was 404 and that only 31 persons paid subscription at rupee 1 each. Subscriptions varied from one anna to a rupee and no hardship seems involved.

429.—It appears that Srijut Ratnakar Deva Sarma paid rupee one. Whether it was paid willingly or not, it has not been possible to ascertain.

Subdivisional Officer of Sibsagar

Srijut DEBESWAR SARMAH asked:

430. Will Government be pleased to state for how long the present Subdivisional Officer has been at Sibsagar altogether as Subdivisional Officer and what are the reasons for keeping this officer so long in that particular place?

431. Are Government aware that the retention of one officer for a long time in one place is conducive towards formation of cliques and party fac-

tions and also for favouritism and other forms of corruptions?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA

replied:

- 430.—The Officer was posted at Sibsagar as a Subdivisional Officer in 1929 and was there for about two years and eight months. He has again been posted there since March 1937 to date. He has been Subdivisional Officer, Sibsagar, altogether a little over four years and one month, his posting being on each occasion determined by the requirements of the public service at the time.
- 431.—Government are not prepared to commit themselves to such a general proposition.

Babu Behari Lal Dutta, an externee from Bengal

Babu KARUNA SINDHU ROY asked:

432.(a) Is it a fact that Behari Lal Datta, an externee from Bengal at present residing under post office Tilagaon in the South Sylhet subdivision, applied to Government for allowing him facility to study Ayurvedic Medicine at Calcutta?

(b) If so, will Government be pleased to state whether Government corresponded with the Bengal Government to that effect?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

432.(a)—No such application was received.

(b)—Does not arise.

Case re milkmen of Sunamganj

Babu KARUNA SINDHU ROY asked:

433.(a) Has the attention of Government been drawn to the correspondence published in the Janasakti, dated the 15th June 1938, under the heading " মাক্ষাৰ বাৰ বৰদাৰী" (b) If so, has any enquiry been made by Government?

434. Is it a fact that Mr. Ghose, the third Magistrate of Sunamganj once threw away all the milk of some of the Sunamganj milkmen into the river and fined some of them heavily?

435. Is it a fact that the judgment in the aforesaid case was upset by

an upper court?

436. Do Government propose to enquire about the doings of the aforesaid Magistrate and take necessary steps?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

433.(a)—Yes. (b)—Yes.

434.—Some adulterated milk declared to be unfit for human consumption was thrown into the river and the milkmen fined.

435.—In some cases appeals were filed, some of which succeeded and

others failed.

436. The executive Government has no legal power of interference with the judicial discretion of the Magistrate.

Services in Assam Police Reserve Force

Srijut JOGESCHANDRA GOHAIN asked:

437. Is it a fact that according to Circular No.4, dated 28th June 1937, issued by the Inspector-General of Police, Assam, certain low class people, such as Damais, Sarkies, Lohars, Kamis, etc., are not allowed to join services in the Assam Police. services in the Assam Police Reserve Force and those who are already in the service, are not eligible for promotion to the next higher rank?

438. (a) Will Government be pleased to state whether due to the above circular, Head Constables Kaviraj Kami and Dilman Damai, both of Dibrugarh Police Reserve Force, were not promoted to the next

higher rank when vacancies occurred?

(b) If so, do Government propose to revise its above decision?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

437.—The answer to the first part of the question is that the circular forbids the recruitment of Gurkhas except of the fighting castes. The answer to the latter part is in the negative. 438. (a)—No.

(b)—Does not arise.

Discovery of oil-fields in North Lakhimpur

Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA asked:

439. Are Government aware that oil-fields have been discovered in the North Lakhimpur subdivision by the Mining experts of the Assam Oil Company and of other concerns?

440. Will Government be pleased to state —

- (a) Whether any of them has applied for any prospective license or any such license has been granted to any of them?
- (b) If so, will Government be pleased to lay on the table the terms of the license or the proposed terms on which the license has been applied for?
- 441. (a) Do Government propose to impose a higher rate of royalty or revenue on the proposed lease than on those in Digboi?
 - (b) If so, at what rate?
 (c) If not, why not?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

439.—Government have no information.

440. (a)—No.

(b)—Does not arise.

Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA: Have the Government received any application?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI: Not yet. If there be any application it will come in due course to the Government.

Srijut SARVESWAR BARUA: Do not the Government consider it

a matter of great importance from the point of view of revenue?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI: Certainly if any one wants any license or lease he will apply to the Government.

441. (a) (b) & (c)—Do not arise.

Grant of license for cement manufacture

Babu SHIBENDRA CHANDRA BISWAS asked:

- 442. Are Government aware that many people make remarks against the Hon'ble the Revenue Minister in connection with the grant of license for cement manufacture?
- 443. (a) Are Government aware that the Janasakti of Sylhet and the Assamiya made very strong comments against the Hon'ble the Revenue Minister in connection with the cement license?
 - (b) If not, do Government propose to notice these comments?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA

442.—No.

443. (a)—Yes. (b)—No.

Grant of license for cement manufacture

Maulavi ASHRAFUDDIN MD. CHAUDHURY asked:

444. Will Government be pleased to state what revenue the Government of Assam expects to derive by granting the cement license?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

444. As the terms of the lease have not yet been agreed on finally, and are still under correspondence, Government are unable to disclose the terms in fairness to the Company, nor are they able to say how much revenue they expect to receive till the Company accept their conditions.

Amount sanctioned for Agricultural loan

Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA asked:

445. Will Government be pleased to state-

- (a) The amount sanctioned originally for agricultural loan for the Golaghat subdivision for the year 1938-39 and the amount sanctioned after the floods of June-July of this year?

 (b) The approximate number of persons of the various mauzas of
- the Golaghat subdivision affected by the floods of this year?

(c) The amount spent on account of gratuitous relief of these flood affected people?

(d) The amount outstanding against the names of the flood affected people of Bokakhat, Mohura, Rungamatty, Dergaon and Messamora in this year and of Kacharighat, Athgaon and Chilladhary in the year 1937?

(e) Whether they propose to remit the outstanding agricultural

loans of these flood stricken people?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

445. (a)—Government sanctioned nothing for Golaghat subdivision separately; but for the whole district of Sibsagar they sanctioned Rs.6,000 for agricultural loans on the 13th June 1938 i.e., before the flood, and Rs.9,000 on the 19th August 1938 after the flood. The actual distribution is made by the Deputy Commissioner,

(b)—The information is not available in the reports received.

(c)—A sum of Rs.17,000 has been sanctioned from public revenues for gratuitous relief for the whole district of Sibsagar. The amount actually spent is not available.

(d)—Government have no information.
(e)—This will no doubt be considered in due course by the local officers after necessary enquiry.

Fuel Reserve of Woodmari

Srijut BEPIN CHANDRA MEDHI asked:

446. Are Government aware that the Fuel Reserve of Woodmari village in Kalaigaon Mouza is not at all beneficial to the surrounding locality?

447. (a) Are Government aware of a petition dated the 4th March 1937, by which the villagers prayed for the deforestation of the said reserve?

(b) If so, will Government be pleased to state whether any enquiry was made as to the truth of the grievances mentioned in the petition?

448. Are Government aware that this reserve is the abode of wild animals such as elephants, tigers, bears, boars, etc., who destroy crops and domestic animals everyday?

449. Do Government propose to enquire about it and pass an order for the deforestation of the said reserve?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

- 446.—The hon. member probably refers to the Noanadi Reserve. The Reserve is beneficial to the local population and will become increasingly so as settlement in khas land proceeds.
 - 447. (a)—Yes.
- (b)—An enquiry was made on the 26th June 1937. Only three of the fifty persons signing the petition took the trouble to attend the enquiry. After careful consideration of the report submitted the petition was rejected. The petitioners have the right to cut thatching grass in certain areas of the Reserve.

448.—There are many other areas within the subdivision which harbour

these animals, including uncleared land in the vicinity.

449.—The enquiry has shown that there is no justification for disforesta-

Abolition of Dhantola country liquor shop

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR asked:

- 450. (a) Will the Hon'ble Minister in charge of the Excise Department be pleased to refer to the reply given by Government to my question No.828 asked in the August session 1937 of the Assembly and to state whether Government have decided to abolish the Dhantola country liquor shop in the district of Kamrup?
 - (b) If so, from what time the shop is going to be discontinued?
- (c) If not, do Government propose to discontinue the same from the expiry of the existing settlement and satisfy the demand of the people of the locality?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

450. (a), (b) and (c)—Government have already decided to close the shop on the expiry of the current settlement, viz., 31st March 1939.

Thuramukh Opium and Ganja shops

Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA asked:

451. Is it a fact that Thuramukh Opium and Ganja shops were settled with one Dambu Borgohain and that his brother Kirti Borgohain is a lessee of Nichogola Opium shop and that they are joint family members?

452. Is it the rule with the Government that when suitable tenderers are found, Excise shops should not be settled with members of the same

453. Is it a fact that Buralikson Country spirit shop was settled with one Bhagaban Das, son-in-law of late Thakurdas, and that Bhagaban Das is an outsider and a new man to Assam?

454. Is it a fact that many Assamese people tendered for the same Buralikson Country spirit shop and that their claims for settlement were

rejected?

455. Is it a fact that the said Bhagaban Das was only a sales-man for a few months before the death of late Thakurdas who was the lessee of the said Buralikson Country spirit shop?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

451.—The reply to the first part of the question is in the affirmative. As regards the second part, Government understand that Kirti Borgohain is a step-brother and does not belong to the joint family.

452.—Under the existing rule, opium shops are not to be settled with members of the same joint family. An attempt was made to adopt this

principle in the settlement this year of ganja and liquor shops. Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA: Is it the principle of the Government not to settle excise shops with members of the same family or members of the joint family?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: Yes.

Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA: Then what is the meaning of the reply 'that an attempt was made to adopt this principle in the settlement this year of ganja and liquor shops'? Do I understand that they have not adopted this principle as yet?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: When a new principle

is accepted it cannot be accepted wholesale at once. Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA: If there are shops settled in the names of two members in the same family and if I bring a specific instance of that, will Government consider the desirability of cancelling one of

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: Certainly attempts will be made to do that.

453.—Yes. Bhagaban Das is not a new comer to Assam.

454.—No Assamese tendered for the shop.

455.—Yes, but before that he was associated with late Thakurdas in the business in many parts of Assam for several years.

Government servants: whether they can remain as a member of any Local Board

Maulavi MABARAK ALI asked:

456. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) Whether a salaried Government servant either temporary or

permanent can be a member of any Local Body?

(b) Whether a salaried Government servant either temporary or permanent can remain as a member of any Local Body, though he was not a Government servant at the time of election?

Musawir, a member of the Karimganj Local Board, has recently been appointed as a Sub-Inspector of Schools at Silchar?

(b) If so, will Government be pleased to state whether he has

resigned his seat as a member of the said Local Board?

(c) If not, why not? 458. Will Government be pleased to state whether he has attended any meeting of the Board after his appointment as a Sub-Inspector of Schools?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied:

456. (a) and (b)—No salaried Government servant can be or remain an elected member of a Local Board.

Baker RABINGER LATE

457. (a)—Yes. (b)—Yes.

(c)—Does not arise.

458.—It is reported that the Sub-Inspector of Schools did not attend any meeting of the Board.

Amount of Local Rates realised from the Fee Simple Grants and other tea lands

Srijut JOGESCHANDRA GOHAIN asked:

459. Will Government be pleased to state-

(a) The amount of Local Rates realised from the Fee Simple Grants and other tea lands (exclusive of the amount meant for Tea Cess Road Fund), subdivision by subdivision for the last 3 years in the Lakhimpur, Sibsagar, Nowgong and Darrang districts?

(b) The amount of Local Rates realised from other raiyats in the above 4 districts, subdivision by subdivision for the last 3

vears?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

459.(a) and (b)—It is difficult to supply the information within the time available.

Recruiting centres for the Assam Rifles

460. Will Government be pleased to state-

(a) The number of recruiting centres for the Assam Rifles?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

460.(a) and (b)—There are no recruiting centres in Assam, Local recruitment is done in the districts by recruiting parties. Recruitment of Nepalis is done through the Recruiting Officer and his assistants at Kuraghat and Ghoom.

(c)—Thirty-seven and half per cent. excluding the hill tribes.
(d)—1935 ... 4.91 per cent.

1936 7·54 1937 17·56

(e)—The question is not understood. The Assamese riflemen get the same training as other classes in the Assam Rifles.

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied:

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

471.—Government are aware that the company were negotiating for purchase of a plot of permanently-settled land in this neighbourhood from its proprietor.

472.—No: all the tenants but two had agreed to accept the compensation offered to vacate their land at the time an enquiry was made, three months ago, these two had not reached an agreement. There was no evi-

dence of force being used.

473. 474 & 475.—The lease has not yet been finally approved and signed by the company. Until this is done Government are unable to state publicly the terms of the contract.

478. (a)—Hon'ble Minister, Agriculture, visited the flood-affected area

(b) Whether the Commissioner was phoned up by the Hon'ble

(c) If so, what is his offence for which he has been made to retire? (d) Whether he made any remark against the Hon'ble the Reve-

nue Minister?

(e) If so, whether the Hon'ble Minister considered this remark to be defamatory?

(f) What was the offending remark made by the clerk?

(g) Whether this remark was made in a private place? (h) If not, where and under what circumstances the remark was made?

501. Will Government be pleased to state—

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

499-501.—Attention is invited to the reply given to similar unstarred questions (Nos. 492-497) asked by Babu Harendra Narayan Chaudhuri in this Session of the Assembly.

" Creteways" over the Barpeta-Simaluguri Road

(b) If so, will Government be pleased to state the principle

505. Will Government be pleased to state whether Government propose to do away with the Reserves or curtail them materially by allowing Mymensinghia encroachers to remain in their places of encroachment?

506. (a) Is it a fact that the immigrants of the neighbouring villages of the closed and Reserved areas in the Paka Mauza of the Barpeta Subdivision

are now encroaching upon them?

(b) If so, do Government propose to take immediate steps to evict them forthwith?

(c) If not, why not?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied :

505.—Government have not yet come to a decision.

506.—(a), (b) & (c) Government have no information whether there are any encroachments of later date than the 1st April 1937. The information has been called for.

Nature of work done by the Inspectors and the Demonstrators of Agricultural Department

Babu LALIT MOHAN KAR asked:

507. Will Government be pleased to state the nature of work done by the Inspectors and the Demonstrators of the Agricultural Department stationed at Subdivisional headquarters?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

507.—It is not possible to summarise the variety of work done by the Agricultural Inspectors and Demonstrators in reply to a question. Their activities whether stationed at Subdivisional or District headquarters consist chiefly of-

(i) organisation and supervision of demonstration,

(ii) submission of crop forecasts,

(iii) introduction and sale of improved varieties of seeds and implements.

(iv) collection of samples of seeds and plants, and

(v) inspection of cultivators' fields and helping them with necessary advice and guidance.

Permanently-settled estates in the district of Sylhet

Babu LALIT MOHAN KAR asked:

508. Will Government be pleased to state in a tabular form—

(a) The total area of land covered by the permanently-settled estates in the district of Sylhet?

(b) The average rate or rent per acre of land payable by raiyats to their immediate landlords in the permanently-settled areas in the district of Sylhet?

(c) The average rate of revenue per acre of land payable by the proprietors to Government in the permanently-settled areas in the district of Sylhet?

(d) The total quantity of land lying waste in the permanently-

settled areas in the district of Sylhet? (e) The average rate of rent per acre of land payable by raiyats to Government in the Government khas mahal areas in the dis-

(f) The average rate of rent per acre of land payable by raiyats to their immediate landlords in the permanently-settled areas in the districts of Bengal?

(g) The average rate of revenue per acre of land payable by the proprietors to Government in the permanently-settled areas in the districts of Bengal?

(h) The average rate of rent per acre payable by raiyats to Government in the Government Khas Mahal areas in the

districts of Bengal?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

508. (a)—The total area in 1937-38 is 2,399,768 acres.

(b)—The hon. member is referred to the Notification No.345-R., dated the 28th January 1935, published at pages 188-193 of Part II of the Assam Gazette No.5 of 1935. No other particulars are available.

(c)—About annas 2 and 5 pies.

(d)—The Deputy Commissioner reports that it is not possible to

supply this information without a detailed survey.

(e)—It is not possible to supply any accurate figures as the rates vary in different places of the district. An approximate figure comes to Re.1-3-10 pies.

(f), (g) & (h)—Government have no information.

System of accepting lowest rates of tenders

Srijut HALADHAR BHUYAN asked:

509. Is it a fact that the system of accepting lowest rates of tenders is

not working well in Assam?

510. Is it a fact that many contractors during the period of introduction of the system of accepting lowest rates of tenders could not complete their contracts for the lowest rates and Government had to give works to other persons at higher rates to get the works completed?

511. Are Government aware that the said system stands seriously in

the way of engaging and training indigenous labourers to work?

512. (a) Are Government aware that after the Kopili Flood in Nowgong in 1934, both the then Executive Engineer and the Deputy Commissioner found out and trained up men to do earth work from among the Muhammedans, Lalungs, Kacharies, Mikirs, Koches, Kaibartas and other people of the district of Nowgong, and that these labourers did earth work on the Assam Trunk Road particularly between Jagi Road and Nowgong and constructed the Hojai-Dabaka Road and several other roads in the district by raising earth?

(b) If so, will Government be pleased to state why no earth work was given to these labourers to do for the last 2 or 3 years under the Public

Works Department?

513. Are Government aware that encouragements and opportunities from Government the local labourers of the Khasi and Jaintia Hills have proved themselves to be as efficient and competent as other foreign labourers

doing such works in the plains?

514. If the replies to questions Nos. 512(a) and 513 are in the affirmative, do Government propose to issue orders to the Public Works Department and other Departments to make it a condition while accepting tenders to employ indigenous labourers even paying higher rates if necessary?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

509.—The competitive system of calling for tenders and accepting the

lowest tender as a rule, is working well on the whole in Assam.

510.—Government are aware that in most cases contracts are satisfactorily completed. Where such is not the case, the causes of failure are many, such as, inexperience, financial difficulties, inability to recruit labour, etc., and it cannot be said whether failure in any particular case was due specifically to quoting low rates.

511.—Government do not consider that the system is at fault.

512.(a)—Some contractors had been asked to employ local people on earth work, and the Deputy Commissioner, Nowgong, endeavoured to induce local men to do earth work after the 1934 floods, but the response was very poor. The work of local contractors was behindhand, and had in most cases to be completed through other agencies.

(b)—Government are informed that none of those who worked after

the 1934 floods, came forward again to take up earth work

513.—If the local labourers of the Khasi and Jaintia Hills have proved themselves to be efficient and competent, it is entirely due to their own initiative and effort.

514.—No.

Transfer of an Assistant of the office of Military Secretary to the Civil Secretariat

Srijut KRISHNA NATH SARMAH asked:

515.(a) Is it a fact that an Assistant of the office of the Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor was lately transferred to the Civil Secretariat and placed at the top of the list of Lower Division cadre?

(b) Is it a fact that a similar recruitment was made from the

Comptroller's office in the Upper Division cadre?

(c) Is it a fact that there is a provision to recruit clerks from the

District offices to fill Upper Division posts in the Assam Secretariat? (d) Are Government aware that such practices greatly prejudice the interests of men already serving in the Secretariat, and that such recruitments are made only at the instance of interested parties who deliberately ignore the claims of Secretariat Assistants?

(e) Do Government propose to consider the desirability of putting a stop to such practices to safeguard the prospects of all Assistants of the

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

515. (a)—Yes, but the assistant was placed eighth in the list of Lower Division Assistants on the advice of the Public Service Commission?

(c)—It has been the practice occasionally in the past and the

principle is provided for in the draft revised rules. (d)—The occasional recruitment from outside offices is made for the public interest, which the individual interests of officers must subserve. suggestion in the latter part of the question is not true.

(e)—The reply is in the negative.

Excise Canteens in Tea Gardens in Darrang district

Srijut OMEO KUMAR DAS asked:

516. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) The names of tea gardens in the district of Darrang where excise canteens have been opened this year?

(b) The number of canteens that were in existence in Mangaldai and Tezpur subdivisions last year?

(c) The number of canteens opened this year in those places?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

516.(a), (b) & (c)—There were no canteens anywhere in the district last year nor were any opened this year.

Permanent ministerial posts in Assam Civil and Public Works Department Secretariats

Khan Bahadur Maulavi KERAMAT ALI asked:

517. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) Whether any of the seven permanent ministerial posts in the Assam Civil and the Public Works Department Secretariats to each of which a special pay is attached, are now held by Muslims?

(b) If so, how many?

(c) Whether further temporary posts with special pay have since been created and whether any Muslims appointed to hold any of such posts?

(d) Who guides the "luck" of Secretariat Assistants, particularly Muslim Assistants, in the matter of selection for appoint-

ment to such posts?

(e) Whether Government propose to formulate definite rules for filling these posts so that the Assistants of the various communities may get the benefit?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

517. (a)—Yes.

(b)—One post is held by a Muslim. The special pay attached to

one of the seven posts is personal to the incumbent.

- Some temporary posts were created with special pay in 1937 for adaptation of Laws and Financial Rules. No Muslims were appointed to any of these.
- (d)—The Chief Secretary is the administrative head of the Secretariat, and he makes or proposes to the Hon'ble Chief Minister postings according to the character of the work and the fitness of assistants for it.
- (e)—Government do not consider practicable to apply communal proportions to postings within the departments. The special pay is given on account of the arduous character or special responsibility of the work, which in the case of the permanent posts sometimes involves loss of prospects in respect of advancement in the regular line Such postings are not promotions, as the hon member seems to think.

Appointments made in the vacancies caused by the retirement of Certain Headmasters

Babu RABINDRA NATH ADITYA asked:

518. Will the Hon'ble Minister of Education be pleased to state—

(a) When Babu Tridash Nath Das and Sreejut Rameswar Barua, Headmasters, retired from service?

(c) The reasons for the delay in making selection of the permanent incumbents in their places?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

518. (a)—On the 16th July 1937 and the 16th December 1937 respectively.

(b)—In April and March 1938 respectively.

(c)—Because several cases of promotion were considered simultaneously and there was also a change in the Ministry.

Introduction of the Assamese language as a subject for the M. A. Examination

519. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) Whether there has been any public agitation in the Press or platform about the introduction of the Assamese language as a subject for the M.A. course of the Calcutta University?

(b) If so, will Government be pleased to state whether Government has taken any steps and if so, what steps for the introduction of the Assamese language as a subject for the M.A. Examination?

520. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) If it is a fact that the Calcutta University agreed to introduce the subject for the M.A. Examination on certain terms to be fulfilled by Government?

(b) If so, what are the terms?

(c) Whether Government has fulfilled the terms for the introduction of the subject in the M.A. course?

(d) Whether the Assamese language has not yet been introduced

as a subject for the M.A. course?

If Government propose to undertake measures for the introduction of the subject in the M.A. course of the Calcutta University?

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI replied:

519. & 520.—The Assamese language has now been included by the University as a principal subject for the M.A. degree in Indian vernaculars.

Prince of Wales Technical School at Jorhat

Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA asked:

521. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) What are the different branches of Education in the Prince of Wales Technical School at Jorhat?

(b) The number of students, after completion

of training have been absorbed in Government service or in any firms having Government control, such as, Electric concerns, Railways, Commercial Carrying Companies of Assam?

(c) Whether Government reserve a certain percentage of service in the said concerns for the successful boys of the said school?

(d) If so, what is the percentage?

(e) If not, why not?

(f) Whether any other Provincial Government have given such facilities for their boys coming out successful from Technical Schools in any such firms or companies under their control?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

521. (a)—(1) Wood working class.

(2) Mechanical apprentice class.

(3) Motor mechanic class.

(4) Higher motor mechanic class.

(b)—Government have no information. (c)—No. But the Oil Company at Digboi has agreed to accept our passed students when vacancies occurred.

(d)—Does not arise.

(e)—Because Government have no authority whatsoever recruitment by private concerns but they have pointed out to such concerns the desirability of appointing unemployed trained youths of the province.

(f)—Government have no information but have enquired. Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA: The answer to (c) is "No. But the Oil Company at Digboi has agreed to accept our passed students when vacancies occurred". May I enquire of Government whether the same principle can be adopted by other companies over which Government has some control, for instance the Commercial Carrying Company and other such companies?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURY: in reply to (e) that Government have pointed out to such concerns the desirability of appointing unemployed trained youths of the province.

523. (a) & (b)—A list showing the names and number of honorary correspondents together with a set of rules for their guidance is placed on the library table.

Number of boys received training in Hosiery

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR asked:

524. Will the Hon'ble Minister in charge of the Department of Industry be pleased to state-

(a) The number of boys with their names who have received

training in Hosiery with Government aid?

(b) The number of such trained boys doing Hosiery business?

(c) Whether any such trained boys are getting any Government

aid for doing Hosiery business? 525. Do Government propose to consider the question of opening a Hosiery section in the Government Weaving School at Gauhati?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

- 524. (a)—The following four boys in all received training of whom two of these Nos (1) Provincial Revenues and two from the Williamson Fund. Of these Nos. The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: As soon

as funds are available.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Do the Government realise that the accommodation is very scanty and the students have been put to great inconvenience?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: Govern-

ment understand that that is the position.

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

527.—There are no residential quarters for the Hostel Superintendent but it is not correct to say that the boarders live without proper supervi-

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: May I know who supervises

the boarders?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: The Hostel Superintendent.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Where does he stay, Sir? The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: I understand he stays far from the Hostel.

Srijut GAURI KANFA TALUKDAR: Do not Government think

that the boarders stay there without proper supervision?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: Government do think that the supervision is adequate.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Do not Government think that the Superintendent should stay near the hostel?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: That is

the idea, but that is not possible now.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Do Government propose to remove this defect and provide residential quarters for the Superintendent attached to the Hostel?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI: involves financial consideration for which Government is not in a position to provide the accommodation.

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied: 528.—No, because there are arrangements for effective supervision of the boarders.

Policy of Government re realisation of subscription and donation by local officers

Mr. ARUN KUMAR CHANDA asked:

529. Are Government aware that there is considerable public resentment over the policy of the Government of realisation of subscription and donation by local officers for the funds opened at the instance of Government or encouraged by them?

530. Do Government propose to consult and compare the donations realised at least in the Sylhet district during the last three years from officials and non-officials and ascertain the truth of these allegations?

531. Do Government propose to consider the desirability of stopping such practice in future and leave the work of realisation of such subscriptions and donations entirely to non-official hands?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

529.—No. It is the experience of Government that official backing is generally welcomed both by the organisers of philanthropic funds and by the public who subscribe thereto, no doubt because it secures a ready organisation which is fully subject to supervision, so that administration charges are

530.—No. This would be very laborious besides being inquisitorial. Mr. ARUN KUMAR CHANDA: Are Government aware that there is a rivalry among different officers in the matter of collecting funds which

leads to hardship being imposed on people at large? The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA:

No, Sir, Government is not aware of that fact. Mr. ARUN KUMAR CHANDA: Will Government take it from me that such process of collection has become a process of ingratiation with

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA:

I do not like to challenge the statement of the hon. member. The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA

531.—No. Government are not prepared to refuse their aid and that leir officers for the home are not prepared to refuse their aid and that of their officers for the benefit of suffering humanity when it is asked for.

532. Will Government be pleased to state— (a) Whether it is a fact that the Surma river is being silted up in

many places?

533. Do Government propose to take steps for dredging the river to check floods?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

532. (a)—Government have received no report that the river Surma is silting up in many places.

(b)—Government are advised that the recent floods could not have been influenced by the silting up of the bed of the Surma. 533.—No.

prayed for, in their representations?

536. Will Government be pleased to state the correct figure of income

from the Copying Department for the last three years?

537. Are Government aware of the fact that the Typists and Copyists

get their remuneration only from the sale-proceeds of folios?

538. Do Government propose to consider the desirability of increasing their remunerations by giving them a share from the income of searching fees, urgent fees, court-fees for authentication and applications for copies? 539. Will Government be pleased to state-

(a) The reasons under which the Sub-Registrars, Nazirs and

Comparing Clerks are given fixed salaries?

(b) Whether there is any difference between these employees, and the Typists and Copyists?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

534.—The words quoted referred to the representations of these employees that they should be organized as a regular Government service and granted a time scale of pay and pensions.

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied: 549.—No.

Assistant Registrar of Co-operative Societies, Assam Valley Srijut RAJENDRA NATH BARUA asked:

550. Is it a fact that Babu Khirodebehari Shome, Assistant Registrar of Co-operative Societies, Assam Valley, has recently gone on leave?

551. Is it a fact that Babu Sudhindra Kumar Nandi has been allowed

to officiate in his place?

552. Is it a fact that Babu Sudhindra Kumar Nandi does not understand Assamese?

553. Will Government be pleased to state-

(a) The duties of the Auditor of the Co-operative Societies, Assam, and the special qualification of the present permanent incumbent, if any?

(b) His scale of pay and rate of travelling allowance stating the amount drawn by him in 1937-38 as travelling allowance?

(c) Whether the scale of pay and the rate of travelling allowance is higher than that of an Inspector of Co-operative Societies?

(d) Whether Government propose to abolish this post and increase the post of an Inspector of Co-operative Societies?

The Hon'ble Maulavi ABDUL MATIN CHAUDHURI replied:

553.(a)—The primary duties of the Provincial Auditor of Co-operative Societies are to conduct the original audit of a large number of important co-operative banks and all societies of special type, e.g., Co-operative Stores, Milk Societies and Milk Unions, to super-audit some of the banks of which the original audit is done by the Inspectors and to audit the accounts of societies under liquidation. He is also to make special enquiries whenever ordered by the Registrar. The compilation of the provincial figures for the annual administrative report and assessment of audit fee are also done by him. The present incumbent had some training in Bengal on the audit of the accounts of non-credit societies. Before his appointment in the Department of Co-operative Societies, he was an Assistant Auditor under the Examiner of Local Fund Accounts, Assam.

(b)—His scale of pay is Rs.150—15—27—10—350. He draws travelling allowance at the rate admissible to officers of the second grade with a daily allowance of Rs.3. A sum of Rs.932-4-0 was drawn by him as

travelling allowance during 1937-38.

(c)—Yes. (d)—No.

556. If the answer to question 555 is in the affirmative, do Government propose to consider the desirability of changing this practice?

558. Are Government aware that this Mouzadar and some others harass the people usually after the occasional Local Board and Assembly

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

557. (a)—The general allegation against this Mauzadar is entirely false, and Government regret that the only attachment made by him, against a habitual and wilful defaulter, who was only saved from prosecuagainst a habitual and will delauter, who has only saved from prosecution for obstruction by the leniency of the Mauzadar, should have been made the ground for a general indictment of a Mauzadar against whom no complaints have been received. In this particular case the cycle which was attached on 4th June 1938 but not sold until 20th June 1938 was a very old one; the Mauzadar paid the entire demand before 31st May 1938 without resorting to a single sale case either of movable or immovables.

(b)—Does not arise.

558.—On the contrary, the report of the Deputy Commissioner shows that the Mauzadars who do not help Congress candidates in elections are harassed. Recently also, at a deputation to the Revenue Minister the Mauzadars of Nowgong gave an account of such harassments.

559. (a)—Yes.

(b)—No representation was made to the Head of the Office. (c)—The matter is under consideration.

(d)—Does not arise.

560. (a)—The Head of the Office reports that no complaints have been made.

Srijut MAHI CHANDRA BORA asked:

561. Has the attention of the Hon'ble Minister-in-charge of Police been drawn to the allegations against two police constables published at page 10 in the issue of the Times of Assam dated the 23rd July, 1938, under the caption—"Allegations against two constables—Cinema proprietor roughly

562. (a) Is it a fact that the managing proprietor of Krishna Talkies, Nowgong, submitted a complaint petition against the two constables in the Court of the Senior Extra Assistant Commissioner and the petition was forwarded to the Superintendent of Police for enquiry, and report?

(b) If so, will the Hon'ble Minister be pleased to state (i) The result of the enquiry and the complaint? (ii) The punishment, if any meted out to the constables?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA replied:

561.—Yes. 562. (a)—Yes.

(b) (i)—The complainant withdrew his complaint when it was sent to the Superintendent of Police for enquiry and the Magistrate permitted him to do so. The complainant also requested the Superintendent of departmental enquiry conduct of the Constables was found disorderly. departmental enquiry conduct of the Constables was found disorderly. (ii) Each of the constables was awarded 12 days' punishment drill and a warning was given to tables was awarded 12 days' punishment drill and a warning was given to one of them that his next offence will entail dismissal.

Elevated places of the Langia Reserve in the district of Nowgong Maulavi MUHAMMAD AMIRUDDIN asked:

563. Are Government aware—

(a) That the Langia Reserve is the only elevated place in the North-Western part of the Juria and the North-Eastern part of the Dhing Mauzas of the district of Nowgong?

- (b) That it was formerly the abode of the Nepali graziers and a place of protection against the high floods of the Brahmaputra for immigrants and Nepalis alike?
- (c) That this reserve has saved about 4 thousand cattle of Nepalis and immigrants from being swept away by the recent Brahmaputra flood?
- (d) That about 7 or 8 hundred cattle of Nepalis and immigrants have been swept away by the strong current of the flood from the Batihara khuti, about a mile west of the said Reserve on their way thereto when the water was first rising?
- (e) That the South-Western part of the said Reserve had been already sett'ed with the immigrants some 4 or 5 years ago?
- (f) That the North-Western part of the Reserve which is the most clevated place within a radius of 4 to 5 miles was settled by the Colonisation Officer, Nowgong, with the immigrants this year?
- (g) That a criminal case under section 447, Indian Penal Code, involving as many as 16 accused, is pending in the Court of the Senior Extra Assistant Commissioner, Nowgong, regarding the newly colonised land of the said Reserve?
- (h) That the accused hold 8 annas tickets to be enrolled as colonists?
- (i) If so, why they were not given land in that Reserve?
- (j) That the Colonisation Officer has, excepting only 3 or 4 landless immigrants, settled the elevated part of that Reserve with some 18 immigrants who already hold sufficient landed property standing in their own names or in the names of their kinsmen of the very same family?
- (k) If so, will Government be pleased to state why the Colonisation Officer has settled the highest place of protection against floods with the land-owning immigrants while hundreds of landless people were present before him with their 8 annas tickets of enrolment as new colonists, issued to them before hand?
- 564. Will Government be pleased to state whether the Colonisation Officer settled waste lands previously also with other land-holding people in other reserves?
- 565. Do Government propose to hold an immediate enquiry with some M. L. As. into such state of affairs obtaining in some 10 or 12 reserves so settled by the Colonisation Officer and give relief to the landless, needy people?
- 566. Do Government propose to stop immediately the cultivation of the newly settled areas of the said Langia Reserve by the land-owning people with whom it has been settled pending enquiry and decision thereupon by Government?
- 567. Do Government propose to accommodate elsewhere the colonists of Lahorighat, Bokoni and Mayong mauzas whose lands have been washed away or cut away by the Brahmaputra or whose lands have been found totally unfit for cultivation from the experiences of the recent Brahmaputra flood without any premium?

The Hon'ble Srijut ROHINI KUMAR CHAUDHURI replied:

563. (a)—No. There are many elevated places in the area in question.

(b)—Some Nepali graziers used to live there before it was constituted into a reserve. About immigrants taking shelter in that area, there is no authenticated information available. Some might have squatted there without permission.

(c)—Some cattle were kept there during the floods as in other reserves.

(d)—Government have no information, Batihara khuti is in Darrang district and is about 7 or 8 miles below the Langia Reserve.

(e)—Village Langia has got two sheets (maps). It is not understood which of the two maps is meant by the hon. member by Langia Reserve, if he means sheet No. I, it is not a reserve but a colonisation area since 1933 and there is no reserve there. If he means sheet No. 2 there has

been no encroachment on it, and it is still intact as a reserve.

(f)—In sheet No.1 measuring 1445 bighas which is entirely a colonisation area since 1933, and where there is no reserve, there was a piece of land about 220 bighas in area which could not so long be brought under colonisation. It was, however, settled with 22 immigrants on 24th March 1938, by the Colonisation Officer as he wanted to make the entire area in sheet No. I periodic.

(g)—Yes. Some persons have been charged with taking forcible possession of the lands of the 22 immigrants in a Criminal case.

member is reported to be defending those trespassers in that case.

(h) & (i)—It is not understood what the hon. member means by the word "ticket". If he means the receipt granted to a person who applies for settlement of land in the colonisation area, then holding of such a receipt does not entitle a man to get land, as several people apply for land but only a few get it. There is no obligation on the part of Government to settle land with all holders of such receipts. A sum of annas 8 is realised from each applicant who applies for land in the colonisation area and a receipt is given to him for that eight annas only in token that the application was received.

(j) & (k)—At the time of settlement open enquiry was made regarding people who are eligible for settlement under colonisation rules. No objection was made at the time of settlement or subsequently in this case objecting to all the settlement or subsequently in this case objection. objecting to any particular person having land elsewhere. The Sylhet Town Land Tenancy Bill, 1937 of Babu Karuna Sindhu Roy, M.L.A.—Copies of Bill as amended by the Council laid on the Table

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: The Secretary will now read out a message which has been received from the Assam Legislative Council, in connection with the Sylhet Town Land Tenancy Bill of Babu Karuna Sindhu Roy.

Mr. A K. BARUA (Secretary): Sir, the following message has

been sent by the Secretary, Assam Legislative Council.

"In pursuance of rule 105, Part II of the Assam Legislative Council Rules, I am directed to inform you that the Bill to give protection to certain classes of tenants within the municipal limits of the town of Sylhet,

which was passed by the Assam Legislative Assemby at its meeting held on the 19th February, 1938, was passed by the Assam Legislative Council at its meeting held on the 1st September, 1938 with the following amendments, namely:-

1. For clause 3 of the Bill the following was substituted:—
"It shall come into force on such date as the Provincial Government by notification in the Official Gazette, may appoint in this behalf."

2. In clause 5, the words "before or" were omitted.

3. In clause 6 in items (b) and (c), the words "manufacturing or business" and "and persons who continue in possession after termination of tenancy" respectively were deleted.

4. In clause 7, the words "wholly before, or wholly after, or partly

before and partly" were deleted.

5. In clause 12, the explanation after sub-clause (vii) was omitted. 6. In clause 15, sub-clause (i), for the word "three" the word "six" was substituted.

7. Clause 17 was omitted.

If a man is getting large salary—and we also requirements are the same. If a man is getting a large salary—and we advocate the principle of giving high salaries to capable men—it is not for his stomach that he wants it. Their physical requirements are the same. The principle is that we give more salary to people who are more qualified. This is done by society and not due to

their ph sical requirements. Now, I do not say for a moment that primary school teachers should not get high salaries. But what we have heard we have not heard from a practical point of view, but from an emotional point The resolution says that immediate effect should be given to this resolution But we have to see that if immediate effect is to be given to this resolution, over three lakhs of rupees is to be provided to give them necessary increment. If we look from the practical point of view this recommendation will first go to the Local Boards, and as the Local Boards have no money, this additional expense will naturally have to be borne by the provincial exchequer. If hon, members mean that Local Boards will have to find funds, we have no grudge against this, but if from provincial revenue this is to be given, we have to study the case very carefully. Our funds are limited. And as soon as funds are available by retrenchment or by some other means it must be spent for other necessary things which cannot be stopped. It is only after these that increments to these teachers may be given.

I believe, Sir, if we make a survey of Assam we will find that this is not the most important thing for the provincial Government to take up. We know that every civilised Government of the present day specially in these days of provincial autonomy is trying its level best to raise the mass people. It is incumbent on every Government to uplift the mass people. Certain sections of people cannot be ignored by giving privileges to one section. If we make a survey, we will find that in Assam there are lakhs of people who are hill tribes and plains tribal. There is also a big population of the ex-garden community. All these people are steeped in ignorance and illiteracy. If we look at the figure we will see that literacy for the whole of Assam is 7.6 per cent., i.e., 92 per cent. of the people of Assam are illiterate.

Srijut MAHI CHANDRA BORA: On a point of order, Sir. I find that the Hon'ble Minister for Education is absent while an important discussion is going on.

The Hon ble the SPEAKER: No. He is not absent. He is occupying a back bench (lauhgter). Of course his face is not visible on account of

the glare.

The Hon'ble Maulavi MUNAWWAR ALI: I do not like to transgress the rule, Sir.

Mr. C. GOLDSMITH: Therefore, if this Legislature wants to uplift Assam, it cannot disregard the claims of the lakhs of people whose boys and girls have no facilities for any education whatsoever. There are thousands of children not having any facilities for education. It does not matter whether a teacher is drawing Rs 6 or Rs.12 not to speak of Rs.15. Now, if a country is going to advance and if this Legislative Body want to frame laws and pass or sanction funds, then should we like to help those teachers who have already a chance of getting employment or like to make provision for the number of boys and girls who have no chance of getting any education? It will be one-sided development in this country and Assam cannot say that we have developed keeping 92 per cent. of its population illiterate for many years to come. There is not only this class of children who have no chance of education but there are hundreds of Venture Schools already running and who have already beengiven hope that in time to come, their schools will be recognised by Govern ment and they will get enough fund to run their schools. The number

of such schools are 796 for boys and 106 for girls. Now these schools have been run for sometime and they have been given hope that they will be either paid by the Government or by the Local Board. Now if this resolution is passed then their hope will be frustrated. All these teachers who are all this time hoping to receive at least Rs.6, they will be debarred from getting any help from the Government or from the Local Board. Now apart from these Venture Schools, there are hundreds of villages where people would be willing to start schools even if they get Rs.6. There are many schools like this for which people can get teachers even on Rs.6. Now if this resolution is passed then what will happen to those schools? Will the Legislative Body disregard all their claims for many years to come?

Now as regards the efficiency of teachers, some great educationist have said that it is not good to employ a teacher to teach many boys and they have found that if a teacher is expected to teach properly then he should teach only four boys if the boys are all four years old. If boys are of five years old then a teacher can teach five boys, and if six years old then six boys; and so on. If efficiency is to be thought of, then we must say that our teachers are very handicapped. They have to teach 50 or 60 boys in a school. So the schools are understaffed and what will happen to those understaffed schools? We are giving an increment to those who receive pay of Rs.12 only. Now we must not forget the claims of those who are clamouring for education.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: The hon. member has almost exceeded

Mr. C. GOLDSMITH: I will require just a few minutes more, Sir. If this resolution is passed it will cut at the very root of mass education and compulsory primary education, and it will not uplift the backward people of Assam. Now, if we try to increase the pay of the teachers we must admit that thereby we spoil the case of the schools being started for the vast number of backward people whose case ought to be considered. Government be able to make provision for money to give them relief. Sir, the needs of Venture Schools. There are many Venture Schools in every Mr. Balaram Sarkar the other day said that unless and until provisions for resolution. At the same time, Sir, we cannot neglect the locality where there are very small number of schools. There are localities in this province, where there is no schools even. At this juncture when the question of compulsory primary education is engaging the attention of every public minded person we should think one thousand times before we proceed to make provision for the

teachers. Now what is the amount required if each teacher is given Rs.15 per mensem? The Quinquennial Report of the Education Department shows that there are 8,884 lower primary school teachers including 756 women teachers in this province. If the pay of each teacher is to be increased by Rs.3 per mensem, we shall perhaps require more than three lacs of rupees each year. Sir, if we compare the cost of education per pupil per year we find that more than Rs.243 (I speak subject to correction) is spent for higher education. In secondary education the figure is Rs.40 per scholar per annum. In middle schools the figure is about Rs.20. And what is the cost of a scholar in lower primary schools? The figure is only Rs.4-8-5. Analysis of these figures shows that the entire money provided for education is devoured by the higher and secondary education. If we go to increase the pay of primary school teacher, I think the whole question shall have to be considered.

Now, Sir, I come to the wordings of the resolution. I find that the resolution is defective. The resolution seems to me to be just like a resolution passed at a meeting of the lower primary teachers; it gives no mandate to the Government to make provisions for money to local bodies for making

payments to the lower primary teachers.

So, Sir, if this resolution is accepted it will serve no useful purpose. So far as I know, there are different scales of pay for lower primary teachers in different provinces. When Bengal paid Rs. 5 to Rs. 6 per mensem Assam could afford to pay Rs.12 per mensem. It is only recently that Bengal has raised their pay up to Rs.12. A Professor of the Calcutta University, so far as I remember, remarked in his presidential speech, presiding over a meeting of the lower primary school teachers, that so far as pay of lower primary teachers of Bengal was concerned there had been a marvellous improvement. However, it is thought in our province that there is need for more improvement in this respect. But the only question is that of money. I think the Hon'ble Minister will try his level best to find out money for this; at least the Retrenchment Committee can make this provision if they like. Otherwise I see no possibility, though we are all sympathetic towards the lower primary teachers, of increasing their pay as desired by my hon. friend Mr. Lalit Mohan Kar.

Srijut MAHI CHANDRA BORA: Mr. Speaker, Sir, I congratulate the mover of the resolution as he has afforded us an opportunity to discuss the miserable lot of primary school teachers of Assam. Sir, it is an undeniable fact and it has been admitted by some members of this House that the emoluments of a lower primary teacher serving in Assam are scandalous. Sir, it is really regrettable and shameful that the remuneration of primary school teachers—people who are entrusted with the responsibility and important task of educating our future citizens—is much less than what we pay to a domestic servant, to a peon or a chaprasi. The grievances of the primary school teachers are many and numerous; they have no prospect in their life; they have no security of tenure; they have no decent share in the amenities which are accorded to other services. There is no provision for their pension after retirement and there is no benefit of Provident Fund for them in some The blessing of free medical aid and advice of the Local Boards of Assam. is almost a decree of Heaven to them. Leave without pay even during their serious illness stands as a disgrace to the service to which they belong. yet they are described as the builders of the nation, the creators of future It is simply a ridicule, it is a mockery pure and simple.

Sir, it is desirable that sound system of education should be imparted to our children, especially in the formative period of their life, but the hard lot of primary school teachers and the healthy influence they are expected to exercise over the young impressive minds of the taught go very ill together. I think, Sir, this scandalous state of affairs should disappear immediately. Their grievances, their piteous cry for making provision for bread of their family, the amelioration of their condition in the matter of their pay and prospects have been sought to be hushed into silence by sweet words, unsubstantial promises and fine platitudes. I especially appeal to the Hon'ble Minister who wants to see a combination of pen and plough, of books and stools, in the system of elementary education of our children to be a bit sympathetic in the matter. At the same time I must remind him that the discontent teacher is likely to stand as a hindrance to any educational scheme of our children. Khan Bahadur Maulavi SAYIDUR RAHMAN: Mr. Speaker, Sir, I wiil not go over the arguments put forward by the previous speaker.

The subject-matter of this resolution has been discussed threadbare many a time on the floor of the House. It has been also said that similar resolutions were adopted in the old Council, but to no effect. So our first concern should be not to merely to pass a paper resolution like this, but to see whether the resolution is such which the Government can give effect to at once. Now, my hon, friend has pointed out the difficulty in the way of the acceptance of this resolution. acceptance of this resolution on account of the financial obligations involved, but I want to touch on one aspect of the question only. school teacher is Rs.150 in cash". On this point there has been some interpellation by my friend. The point is that in these hard days when the Govenment is faced with a deficit of several lakhs, when there is a demand for more and more schools and for expansion of primary education, when there is a demand for expansion of education among the children of the scheduled and tribal people, whether it will be advisable for us to commit ourselves to further expenditure of three lakhs in the present circumstances when there is no control whatever over the expenditure on primary education. My point is that I welcome the resolution, and I would support it very heartily had there been a Board of Education, as suggested in the Report, for the control of vernacular education. And unless this Board is formed it will be useless to merely increase the pay of the teachers and it will not bring in efficiency in any way. Then, there is another difficulty about the resolution being adopted in this House. Times have changed; while under the old form of Government a resolution was a mere recommendation to the Government which the Government might or might not give effect to, but under the present system of Government when a resolution is adopted it means that we ask the Government to give effect to it at once because we have a Ministry which is responsible to the Legislature. So we have to see that the resolution is very precise and accurate. But what we find here is that the resolution, as has already been pointed out by my hon. friend, is not happily worded, and there is a difficulty in the way of accepting it. It says that the increase must be given from the next financial year. Had it been, as my lady friend Miss Dunn suggested, possible for the hon mover to amend his resolution in this form, namely, that effect is to be given in two or three years, I would have been very glad to support it.

Statement by the Chief Minister regarding resignation of Ministry

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA: Mr. Speaker, Sir, before you take up the business that is on the agenda viz., the no-confidence motions against the present Ministry, with your permission, I want to make a statement.

For a few days past, the Ministry had noticed that some of their supporters had crossed the floor of the House and have been sitting with the Opposition. Even to-day I find that there have been additions to the strength of the Opposition. That clearly is an indication that the present Ministry no longer enjoy the confidence of the majority of the House (Applause). I, therefore, on behalf of the whole Cabinet have tendered our resignation to His Excellency the Governor. And, I think, I can now safely congratulate the Opposition to whom I wish the joy of the situation.

Under these circumstances it is for you to decide, Sir, whether there is any necessity for taking up the business that is before the House now.

Srijut GOPINATH BARDOLOI*: I consider it highly fair and constitutional on the part of the Hon'ble Chief Minister to say frankly and unequivocally that the Ministry does not enjoy the confidence of the House. Sir, this is a recognised principle of democracy that when a Ministry even by a bare majority have got to carry their programme and policy, they should think of resigning. I am glad to find that the Hon'ble Chief Minister has come to realise that the policy and the programme that they have been following have not received and the programme that they have been following have not received the acceptance of the majority of the members of the House. I take it the acceptance of the majority of the members of the House, I take it thereby also, of the country at large. Sir, I return the compliment which the Hon'ble Chief Minister—I mean the erstwhile Chief Minister made on the Chief Minister—I also Chief Minister made on the floor of the House congratulating me. I also congratulate him on the foir of the House congratulating up the attitude congratulate him on the fairness he has exhibited by taking up the attitude

Babu KAMINI KUMAR SEN: On a point of information, Sir. we know if the resignation of the Fxcellency? May we know if the resignation has been accepted by His Excellency?

The Hon'ble Maulavi Saiyid Sir MUHAMMAD SAADULLA:

No. I have not received any reply from His Excellency. Maulavi MUHAMMAD MAQBUL HUSSAIN CHOUDHURY: Sir, for the last few days, we had been apprehending that the Ministry and fall, and some four motions and been apprehending that the Ministry We know, Sir, would fall, and some four motions were tabled yesterday. We know, Sir, Windstry can continue were tabled yesterday. that no Ministry can continue to occupy office, unless they are backed by the majority. I remember that Maharaja Tilak once said, "there is room for only for many Mahatmas in the region of theology, but there is room for only one Mahatma in politics, and that is the Mahatma of majority". The Ministry had so long functioned as they had the backing of the majority. Now, as they have no majority with them they have resigned. We think that the man Saadulla was far greater than Minister Sir Muhammad tulla (Hear, hear). We, the market fall that had been leading that that the state of the state of the party, had been lending Saadum whole-hearted support in every measure, and we are ready to lend

him support to-day also. We thought that Sir, Muhammad Saadulla would face the motion just like a sportsman in the true sense of the term without giving the Opposition to score a cross goal, but I do not know why, without facing the motion, Sir Saadulla had to tender his resignation. By this I do not cast any aspersion upon him, but I simply want to know what led him to tender his resignation without facing the motion like a sportsman. We, as his supporters, perhaps, have a right to know the cause of his resignation. In conclusion, Sir, I beg to say that, by this, I do not mean to exibit any feeling against him, or to show any disrespect to his august personality.

Rai Bahadur PROMODE CHANDRA DUTT: Sir, I rise only to congratulate my friend, the Hon'ble the Chief Minister and his colleagues on the courage they have shown by tendering their resignation to His Excellency the Governor as they no longer enjoy the confidence of the House. The Hon'ble the Chief Minister has thereby created a precedent for which he will be remembered long in this province. Whatever Ministry may come into existence, the fact shall always be remembered that as soon as the Ministers forfeit the confidence of the House, they should tender their resignation.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: In view of the statement which the Hon'ble the Chief Minister has made just now, the hon, members have realised that the Hon'ble Chief Minister has examined his position and his strength in this House, and he has come to the conclusion that he has no longer the majority at his back to continue in office. The object of a no-confidence motion in a Ministry is to prove exactly the fact that the Ministry do not enjoy the confidence of the House. It is on this ground that he has submitted his resignation to His Excellency the Governor. And when there is this admission that the Ministry do not enjoy the confidence of the House, there is no doubt that the resignation of the Ministry would be accepted. In view of this fact, I do not see any use in moving the no-confidence motions to-day.

Y I really appreciate, the noble spirit that Sir Muhammad Saadulla has displayed on the floor of the House and the fairness that he has shown by taking the correct position that the Ministers ought to take in such circumstances. Certainly his example is one which would surely help us in the growth of constitutionalism in India.

I, therefore, adjourn the House till 11 a.m. day after to-morrow. Of course, I do not know whether, in the meantime, any Ministry would be formed or not; but when we shall meet on Thursday, we shall come to know what has taken place so far as the Ministry is concerned. If any Ministry is formed in the meantime, we shall then decide whether the House should be adjourned sine die, or His Excellency would prorogue this House.

So, I adjourn the House till 11 a.m. day after to-morrow.
