STARRED QUESTIONS

(To which oral answers were given)

(Starred Question No.17 standing in the name of Maulavi Dewan Abdur Rob Choudhury was not put and answered as the hon. Member was absent.)

Public Works Department Road Moharrirs

Maulavi MAKABBIR ALI MOZUMDAR asked :

*18. Will the Hon'ble Minister-in-charge of Public Works Department be pleased to state—

- (a) If the Public Works Department Road Moharrirs are permanent employees of the Department ?
- (b) Whether they are entitled to any pension ?
- (c) If not, whether the Hon'ble Minister proposes to consider the desirability of organising them as permanent employees of the Department ?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied :

18. (a)—No.

(b)—No.

(c)—The matter is under consideration of Government.

Professor NIBARAN CHANDRA LASKER: Will the Hon'ble Minister in-charge please state the reasons for not taking those Road Moharrirs in the permanent cadre.

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: It involves the question of finance and Government is considering that question.

Srijut DANDESWAR HAZARIKA: Is it not a fact, Sir, that the Road Moharrirs submitted a representation to Government a few months back ?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: Yes, Sir. Government received that representation from the Moharrirs and that question is being considered by Government.

UNSTARRED QUESTIONS

(To which answers were laid on the table)

Construction of bridges on the Sylhet-Sunamganj Road

Babu JATINDRANATH BHADRA asked :

52. Will Government be pleased to state—

- (a) Whether the eight bridges on the Sylhet-Sunamganj Road included in the interim works, are going to be completed within 1947 as was accepted by Government?
- (b) If not, what are the schedule dates for their completion and the reasons for the same?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied :

52. (a)—There is no likelihood of the bridges being completed within 1947.

(b)—The bridges may be completed by March 1948.

Babu JATINDRANATH BHADRA: With regard to Question No. 52 (a), will Government be pleased to state the reason why there is no likelihood of the bridges being completed in 1947?**The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY**: One reason is the difficulty in procuring materials for the bridges and the other is the question of getting skilled labour for construction of the bridges.**Babu JATINDRANATH BHADRA**: If materials are not available will Government be pleased to consider whether they can build wooden bridges.**The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY**: That will not be practicable Sir; wooden bridges will cost more in the long run.**Babu AKSHAY KUMAR DAS**: Is the Hon'ble Minister aware that it takes nearly 8 to 9 hours to go to Sunamganj from Sylhet—a distance of only 42 miles?**The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY**: Yes, Sir, I am aware of it.

Road communication in Shon Beel in Karimganj

Moulana MD. MUFAZZAL HUSSAIN asked :

53. (a) Are Government aware that the people of the eastern side of Shon Beel in Karimganj are suffering for want of a road connecting the subdivisional headquarters or any other prominent place of the locality?

52. Has Government received recently any suggestion to take up the construction of a road extending the Bhanga-Marjatkandi Road up to Anipur-Manacherra Road near Kalinagar and to enter it in the first priority list?

(c) If the answers to questions (a) & (b) above are in the affirmative, do Government propose to take up the construction of that road and to place the same in the first priority list?

(d) If not, why not?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied:

53. (a) - People must have been suffering inconveniences for want of good roads.

(b) - Yes.

(c) & (d) - Government will place the matter of fixing priority of the road which has been included in Post-War Reconstruction Scheme with a low priority before the next meeting of the Assam Road Communication Board to reconsider their previous decision.

Levy of Bengal Sales Tax on Assam Merchants

Maulavi MAKABBIR ALI MOZUMDAR asked:

54. Are Government aware that the Assam merchants who get their articles from Calcutta are required to pay Bengal Sales Tax once there?

The Hon'ble Srijut BISHNURAM MEDHI replied:

54. - No. Under the provisions of section 5(2) (v) of the Bengal Finance (Sales Tax) Act, 1941 reproduced below, it would seem that no tax is leviable on articles exported outside Bengal by dealers.—

"Section 5 (2). In this Act the expression 'taxable turnover' means that part of a dealer's gross turnover during any period which remains after deducting therefrom—

(v)(a) his turnover during that period on sales of goods which are shown to the satisfaction of the Commissioner to have been despatched by, or on behalf of, the dealer to an address outside Bengal".

Gun Licences in Habiganj Subdivision

Maulavi MD. ABDULLAH asked:

55. Will Government be pleased to state the names of persons in the Habiganj Subdivision who were granted gun licences in the year 1946 together with the date of issuing the licences?

The Hon'ble Mr. BASANTA KUMAR DAS replied :

Northbrook Gate of Gauhati

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR asked :

56. Will Government be pleased to refer to the replies given by them to unstarred questions Nos. 75 and 76 asked by the Questioner during the last September Session of the Assembly (page 1139 of the Assembly Debates) and state :

- (a) Whether Government have made enquiries as promised to ascertain the authority responsible for the upkeep and repair of the Northbrook Gate at Gauhati ?
- (b) If so, what is the result of the enquiry ?
- (c) If not, why not ?
- (d) Whether Government propose to take the responsibility themselves for the upkeep of the structure and protect the same from destruction ?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied :

56. (a)—Yes.

(b)—The Northbrook Gate at Gauhati, so far it is known, was constructed in 1878 with subscriptions realised from the public of the Assam Valley in order to receive His Excellency, the late Lord Northbrook, the then Viceroy of India.

Since then it is understood that it has been under the Gauhati Municipal Board and as such the responsibility for the upkeep and repair of the Gate rests with the Gauhati Municipal Board.

- (c) Does not arise.
- (d) This will be considered.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Will the Hon'ble Minister in-charge be pleased to state whether Government enquired as to whether the Municipal Board of Gauhati undertook the task of keeping the structure in good condition?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: We have already received information from the Municipal Board that they would require about Rs.5,000 in order to keep the gate in good repair and that they are not able to do that work for want of money.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Do Government recognise the urgent necessity of spending some money for the repairs of this Gate so that it can be preserved from destruction?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: The question of urgency, Sir, is a matter of opinion.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: But the structure is now in a dilapidated condition and it requires urgent attention of Government.

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: We know that, Sir. But some people are of the opinion that the Gate is not so necessary as would justify spending of a large sum of money for its up keep. So, Sir, this is a question of opinion.

Srijut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR: Do not Government recognise the fact that this Gate is a beautiful structure which is adorning the town of Gauhati and as such it requires to be preserved.

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: As I have already stated, it is a matter of opinion. Some think that it is valuable while others think that it is not so. Therefore we are considering that question.

Srijut MAHENDRAMOHAN CHOUDHURY: In view of the reply given by the Hon'ble Minister that the Gate does not serve any useful purpose, will Government be pleased to consider the desirability of demolishing the gate as it has become a danger to public safety?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: I have already stated that this is a matter of opinion. There are two opinions about this Gate. Some think that it does not serve any public utility while the others say that it should be preserved. So Government is considering this question.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: Order, order. The point made out by Srijut Mahendramohan Choudhury is that this Gate having constituted a danger to public safety, what does Government propose to do with it?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY: Well, Sir, that question of danger to public safety is also a question of opinion. I myself have visited the place on several occasions. Government will now consider whether this Gate really constitutes any danger to public safety. From my personal experience I can say that it does not constitute any danger to public safety.

Srjiut GAURI KANTA TALUKDAR : Do Government propose to come to a final decision as to whether they should demolish the Gate or preserve it ? In my own opinion, it has been a useful structure and as such I would request Government to decide without much loss of time as to whether they should preserve it or demolish it.

Post-War Reconstruction work under the Public Works Department

Maulavi MAYEENUD-DIN AHMED CHOWDRY asked :

✓ 57. Will Government be pleased to state—

- (a) The total value of the Post-War Reconstruction work to be done by the Public Works Department in the Province ?
- (b) How has the amount been distributed between the two Valleys ?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied :

57. (a)—The total value of Post-War Reconstruction works under Communications according to the programme drawn up and approved by the Government of India is Rs 5,00,00. Schemes for buildings and N. E. D., are being worked out, but they are not yet ready.

(b)—The money under Communications has not yet been finally divided but the proposal is to distribute the amount as given below :—

Restriction on movement of Maulana Abdul Hamid Khan

Maulavi ABUAL MAJID ZIAOSH SHAMS asked :

✓ 58. Will Government be pleased to state—

- (a) Whether it is a fact that Maulana Abdul Hamid Khan, the President of Assam Muslim League is an inhabitant of Dhubri Subdivision ?
- (b) Whether the said Maulana has not been in Assam from the month of October, 1946 up to January 1947 ?
- (c) What led the authorities to restrict the movement of Maulana Abdul Hamid Khan, and when was the order passed on him ?

✓ 59. Will Government be pleased to state—

- (a) What led the authorities to pass the orders under Section 144, Criminal Procedure Code, prohibiting meeting of more than 4 persons in the Dhubri Subdivision during the later part of 1946 ?
- (b) Is it a fact that the said orders were avowedly and solely passed so that the holding of Muslim League Conference at Bhashani be made impracticable which was to have had been held in November 1946 ?

The Hon'ble Mr. BASANTA KUMAR DAS replied:

58. (a) — Yes.

(b) — No. He has certainly been in Assam off and on during this period.

(c) — The fact that his speeches and the pamphlets issued over his name had created a widespread apprehension of communal conflict. The order was passed on the 9th November 1946.

59. (a) — The cause was the same as that which led to the restriction on Maulana Abdul Hamid Khan, ex-M.L.A.

(b) — No. The original orders controlling meetings and processions in Dhurri Subdivision had to be passed as early as the 30th August 1946.

Goalpara-Jogighopa Ferry

Srijut HARESWAR DAS asked:

60. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) What steps they have taken to run the Goalpara-Jogighopa Ferry by power driven vessel?

(b) Whether Mr. Fazlur Rahman, who was granted lease in 1945 succeeded to secure a launch fit to be put into service?

(c) If not, whether his lease has been cancelled?

(d) If not, why not?

(e) Whether it is a fact that one Marwari gentleman of Goalpara applied for lease to run the service by a power driven vessel from January, 1947?

(f) If so, whether his prayer has been granted?

(g) If not, why not?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied:

60. (a) — A lease for running a steam ferry has been issued.

(b) — Owing to difficulties to get a steamer according to the Public Works Department's specifications (Length—112 ft., width—17 ft. and depth—5 ft.), he has been allowed to run a smaller launch (Length—74·5 ft.) as a temporary measure for 3 years.

(c) & (d) — Do not arise.

(e) — Yes.

(f) — No.

(g) — His application was for running the ferry with a motor launch of 53 ft. long. This is too much below the specifications laid down.

Culverts in the Bengal-Assam Railway line between Badarpurghat and Karimganj

Moulana MD. MUFAZZAL HUSSAIN asked:

61. (a) Is it a fact that the narrow passages of a few small culverts in the Bengal-Assam Railway line between Badarpurghat and Karimganj are the main cause for the frequent over-night floods in that area?

(b) If so, do Government propose to move the proper authorities to enlarge them at least to double the present size to check over-night floods?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied :

61. (a)—Government are unable to say whether the frequent flooding of the locality is due to the supposed inadequacy of waterways across the Bradan embankment between Badarpur and Karimganj. No complaint about inadequacy of any particular waterway was brought to the notice of the Flood Enquiry Committee 1929.

(b) Government do not propose to approach the proper authorities without being in possession of details to prove their case. The Embankment and Drainage organisation has been ordered to look into the matter.

Non-availability of tickets from and to particular Railway Stations

Dr. EMRAN HUSAIN CHOWDHURY asked :

62. (a) Are Government aware that passengers travelling in the trains in Assam have long had to suffer much on account of the non-availability of tickets from and to particular stations?

(b) Do Government propose to move the Railway Authorities to take up the matter immediately and make tickets available at all Railway stations?

(c) Are Government aware that the lighting, water and cushion arrangements in many railway compartments are still bad?

(d) Do Government propose to move the Railway Authorities to take immediate and necessary steps in these respects?

The Hon'ble Rev. J. J. M. NICHOLS-ROY replied :

62. (a) to (d)—Government will bring the complaints to the notice of the Railway Authorities concerned for redress of the grievances.

Number of Muslim and non-Muslim Assistants of the Secretariat

Maulavi Dewan ABDUL BASITH asked :

63. Will Government be pleased to state—

(a) The number of Muslim and non-Muslim Assistants of the Secretariat in the (1) Establishment Branch (2) Agriculture Branch (3) Post-War Reconstruction Department (4) Textile Control Branch and (5) in the office of the Deputy Director of Supply Accounts?

(b) Whether Moslems have been given their proper quota in these offices?

(c) If not, why not?

The Hon'ble Srijut GOPINATH BARDOLOI replied :—

63. (a)—

(b)—The distribution by communities in the Secretariat is made for the whole office and not by Departments. The office of the Deputy Director of Supply (Accounts) is a separate office. In the latter the Muslim community has not the proportional number of appointments laid down.

(c)—As indicated in the last reply, the distribution in these particular Secretariat Branches is fortuitous. The reason in the case of the office of the Deputy Director of Supply (Accounts) is that sufficient Muslim candidates with qualifications or experience in Accounts were not forthcoming. Efforts were made to obtain the requisite number, but some refused and some left on getting more attractive prospects elsewhere.

Complaint re: non-receipt of answers to certain questions

Baba JATINDRANATH BHADRA: Sir, we are now getting replies to very few questions and at the end of this Session many question will remain unanswered.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: To which question does the hon. Member refer to?

Babu JATINDRANATH BHADRA: Questions in general, Sir. We are getting replies to a very few questions.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: I cannot take up the matter unless the hon. Member refers to particular questions because the pertinent question will be whether it was given in time.

Babu JATINDRANATH BHADRA: Questions are given in time but perhaps replies are not forthcoming.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: I can tell the hon. Member from my personal experience that questions are pouring in at a very late date although the Secretary gave timely reminders.

Babu JATINDRANATH BHADRA: Sir, I myself sent many questions just in time.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: All right, please give me copies of those questions and I will look into the matter.

The Assam Shop Assistant's Relief Bill, 1947

Srijut DANDESWAR HAZARIKA: Mr. Speaker, Sir, item No. 27, in the agenda of 10th and 11th March, "The Assam Shop Assistants' Relief Bill, 1947" was not introduced in the House. May I know, whether it would be introduced or not?

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: The Hon'ble Minister has taken note that it was not taken up that day.

Presentation of the Supplementary Statement of Expenditure for the year 1946-47

The Hon'ble Srijut BISHNURAM MEDHI: I beg, Sir, to present the *Supplementary Statement of Expenditure for 1946-47 and the Explanatory Note explains the necessity and the urgency of the Demand and I need not take the time of the hon. Members of this House by going into detail regarding each Demand.

Budget Discussion

Mr. W. R. FAULL: Sir, it was agreed originally that I would speak this afternoon and I would like to retain that privilege. I hope some speakers from the Government Benches will speak now.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: Of course the hon. Member will be accommodated but since the Opposition Benches are empty I wanted to call upon Mr. Faull to speak. All right, he may speak after lunch.

Babu JATINDRANATH BHADRA : মাননীয় Speaker মাসের, আমি আজ বক্তৃতা করবার জন্য প্রস্তুত ছিলাম না ; বোধ হয় opposition স্ল না আমার জন্মাট আমাকে ডাকা হয়েছে।

প্রথমেই আমার মনে পড়িতেছে এবার যে প্লাবন হবে গেল তার কথা। সমস্ত আমার প্রশ়্নার জুড়ে এই প্লাবন হয়েছে, অথচ সেই জল প্লাবন বোধ করবার ক্ষমতা মানুষের খাকা রয়েও গভৰ্ণমেণ্ট বছদিনের মধ্যেও তার কোন চেষ্টাই করেন নাই। এ বৎসর বাজেট বক্তৃতায় মাননীয় স্নানস্থ সচিব আশ্বাস দিয়েছেন যে এ সম্পর্কে কিছু ব্যবস্থা হবে, কিন্তু এপর্যাপ্ত কোন ব্যবস্থা হয় নাই। মহাশয় ! এই বৎসর জল প্লাবনের ফলে আমার প্রদেশের আধিক অবস্থা অস্তাপ শোচনীয় হয়ে উঠেছে। এই জল প্লাবন বক্ত করা যাবে না হলে এদেশের কৃষকের পক্ষে কোন প্রকার উন্নতি সহ্যবপ্ন নয়। তা ছাড়া এই নদীমাত্রক প্রদেশে নদী মরিয়া যাওয়ার যাতায়াতেরও ভয়ানক অস্ফুরিদ্ধি হইতেছে এবং সবেরাপরি ব্যবসা বাণিজ্যেও বহুপ্রকারে ক্ষতিপ্রস্ত হয়েছে। বাঢ়ায়াটে মোটর ট্রাক বা বাস সার্ভিস দিয়ে ব্যবসা বাণিজ্য জলপথের মত স্ববিধাজনক হয় না, তাহা ও আমাদের কিছুই নাই। আমি যদি স্বনামগঞ্জের কথা বলি, তাহলে বলা যে সুর্জানদী এবং অন্যান্য উপনদী গুলি হাজিয়া মরিয়া যাওয়াতেই এই প্লাবন হয়েছে। সুর্জানদী মরিয়া যাওয়ার স্বনামগঞ্জের এক জায়গা হতে অন্য জায়গায় কোনরকম ব্যবসা চালানো যাবে না—যাতায়াতও অস্তাপ কঢ়িকর হইতেছে। আংগুরি, ভৈরব এবং ঢাক ইত্যাদি যেগুলি ব্যবসায়ের সাধারণ কেন্দ্র, সুর্জানদী মরে যাওয়ার হেমস্তে সেইসব ব্যবসা কেন্দ্রে লোকের যাতায়াতের অস্ফুরিদ্ধি হইতেছে এবং ব্যবসা বাণিজ্য কিছুই করিতে পারিতেছে না। এমন কি কল্পট্রালের জিনিসপত্রও হেমস্তে স্বনামগঞ্জ হতে জগন্নাথপুর বা দিরাই থানায় পাঠানো যাবে নাই। স্বনামগঞ্জ হতে জয়কল্প ৮ মাইল ; কিন্তু কল্পট্রালের জিনিস নিয়ে যেতে হবে ময়মনসিং মুরে প্রায় ২৫০ মাইল পথ অতিক্রম করে— এই হইতেছে সেখানকার অবস্থা। যদি এই অবস্থা থেকে যায় তাহলে দেশের উন্নতি সহ্য না এবং আমার মনে হয় ক্রমে ক্রমে দেশের সর্বব্যাপ্তি হবে। স্বতোঁ আমার মতে গভৰ্ণমেণ্টের সর্বব্যাপ্তি কর্তব্য এই নদীগুলির সংস্কারের প্রতি মনোযোগ দেওয়া। সুর্জানদী এবং কুশিয়ারার

জনা সময় প্রস্তা উপর্যুক্ত বিষয়ে হয়ে পড়েছে। প্রায় গুরি বৎসর সেগোনে বন্যা বা পূর্ববন লেগেই আছে। এই ক্ষমতাগতিজ্ঞে না হয় শব্দবে, না হয় কাছাকাছি এভাবে পূর্ববন চলছে। ফলতবা: এই জন পূর্ববন রেখ করা আমাদের সববিষ্ণুবন কর্তব্য বলে মনে করি এবং তাহা রোধ করতে ঘোলে নশী, থাল প্রচুরি সংকোচ সাধন করা একান্ত প্রয়োজনীয়। আবি গভর্নমেণ্টের দৃষ্টি সববিষ্ণুবনে সেলিকে অকারণ করিতেছি।

আমার দ্বিতীয় কথা ইটতেছে যে অর্থনৈতিক অবাঞ্জিকতা দেশে আরম্ভ হয়েছে তাহা দূর করতে নাশকিলে দেশে পাও অন্মা অসম্ভব। টাকার দাম কর্ম গেছে এবং জিনিসের পরিমাণ অস্তান্ত কর। ফলতবা: চারিদিকে একটা তৈ তৈ আরম্ভ হয়েছে—সকলেরই অভাব, কিছুতেই অভাব মেচিন হচ্ছে না। খুখিবৌতে এই ৬ বৎসর যুক্তের ফলে সমস্ত জিনিসের উৎপাদন ও আমদানী একেবাবে কর্ম গেছে এবং সহজে সেটা পূর্ব হবে বলে মনে হচ্ছেন। জিনিসের উৎপাদন ও আমদানী দৃষ্টি সত্ত্বে নাহলে টাকার দাম বাঢ়বে না। জিনিসের আমদানী দলি বেড়ে যাব তাহলে টাকার দামও বাঢ়া সত্ত্ব। তা নাহলে এই যে চারিদিকে চিকির উঠেছে তাহা বল চলে পাবেন। এখন পাঠশালার শিক্ষক চলে আরম্ভ করে সরকারী ২৫০০১০০৮ টাকা বেতনধারী কর্মচারী পদার্থ শকলেট একস্থানে চিকির করিতেছেন— অভাব। কিছুতেই এ অভাব করিতেছে না। বাণিজ্যিক আমুর দেখতে পাইছি যে অব্যবহৃতনের কর্মচারীরা অতি কঠো জীবন মাপন করিতেছেন। আমাদের একান্ত উচিত তাদের সেই কষ্ট দূর করা। গভর্নমেণ্ট তার জন্য যত্নবান হউন। কিন্তু এদিকে তেবে দেখা দরকার যে গভর্নমেণ্ট যত্নবান হলেও শহলে এমি করতে পারবেন না। বেতন পূর্বের চাইতে কোন কোন স্থলে হয়তো দেড়গুণ হয়েছে—বেতন নাইটক মাঝগাঁৰ তাতা খবেও দেড়গুণ হয়েছে; কিন্তু তাতেও ত তাদের অভাব কিছুই কমচেন। কমবে কি করে? জিনিসের দাম যুক্তের পূর্ব হতে ৫/৬ গুণ পর্যাপ্ত বেড়েছে; কোন কোন জিনিসের দাম তার চাইতেও বেশী। এমতাবস্থায় কেবল বেতন বাড়িয়ে এই প্রশ্নের মীমাংসা সত্ত্বপূর্ব হতে পারেনা। যদি মীমাংসা করতে হয় তাহলে আমার মনে হয় একমাত্র জিনিস পত্রের উৎপাদন বাঢ়াতে পারলেই এই প্রশ্নের সমাধানের উপায় হতে পারে। সেজন্য আমার মনে হয় যে আমাদের Grow-More-Food Campaign বলে যে একটা Campaign চলছিল সেমাতে খুব বেশী মনোযোগ দেওয়া গভর্নমেণ্টের পক্ষে একান্ত কর্তব্য। এই অধিক খাদ্য স্বয়় উৎপাদনের আন্দোলনটা কানে শুনেছি কিন্তু কাজে কিছু হয়েছে কিনা তা জানবাব বা দেখবাব সুযোগ হয় নাই। আমার মনে হয় ১৯৪৪ ইং তে জেল হতে বেরিয়ে দেখেছিলাম যে শ্রীহট্টের ডিপুটি কমিশনারের অফিশের সামনে কর্তক গুলি করি খেত করা হয়েছিল। আমার ধারণা যে এরকম সামান্য সামান্য লোক দেখান কিছু কাজ হয়েছে, কিন্তু জিনিস বেশী প্রয়োজন মে বিষয়ে হয় গভর্নমেণ্ট দৃষ্টি দেন নাই—হয়ত বা দৃষ্টি দিয়েছেন, কিন্তু সেগুলি করা সত্ত্বপূর্ব হয় নাই। লক্ষলক্ষ টাকা এই কাজে খরচ হয়েছে, কিন্তু দেশের অভাব যেখানে ছিল সেখানেই আছে, কোন প্রকার উন্নতি হয় নাই। এমন কি আমাদের এই গভর্নমেণ্টের ওপর একবৎসরের কাজের কোন ফল আমাদের চোখে পড়েছেনা। আমি বলতে বাধ্য হইতেছি যে More-Food Campaign এর দ্বারাই আমাদের খাদ্য সমস্যার সমাধান হতে পারে—অন্য

किन्तु इसका इतने पारबोला। एই से चिकित्सा के लिये भाव समाधान अन्य केंद्र प्रकारे होना। तार जना प्राचीर चाट—तार जना काफ़ेर बाबूजा चाट। सर्विया एवं सर्वप्रकार डाल इत्यादि बीजेर आवश्यकी चाट, कि करे ऐसे फलाते हवे तार जना अचार चाट, उपयुक्त जागरी निर्बाचन करिया देवोया चाट, तबेह ना काज हवे। किंतु शेषकम यहाँ देखा याचेह ना। आमरा कि आशा करते पारि से एथन थेके गत्तर्मेन्ट तार जना विशेषज्ञावे यहाँ करवेन? सेटा यदि करेन, ताहले घासा समस्यार समाधान हवे एवं अर्थनीतिक समस्याका युग्म समाधान हवे। अबश्य अन्य रुकमें अर्थनीतिक समस्यार समाधान हते पारे, किंतु आमाक घासा से इहातेह अर्थनीतिक समस्यार डाल समाधान हवे। एवंहारा यदि आमरा जिन्हिय खाद्यक युग्म सम्पर्के युक्तेर पूर्वेर अवस्था फिरिये आनते पारि ताहले एट ये देहन बाटौनोक चिकित्सा एवं गत्तर्मेन्टेर अक्षमता, समस्तेरह युग्म समाधान हवे येते पारे। युक्तो योग्यिक याँच विशेषज्ञावे गत्तर्मेन्टेर दृष्टि आकर्षण करितेछि।

माननीय Speaker यहाँसर, आमि युनामगङ्गेर दु एकत्री घानीय शूल्क आपनामेव दृष्टि आकर्षण करितेछि। युनामगङ्गेर एकत्री छात्रव पूर्ण घान। सेषामेव दृष्टि युग्मान फलात। एट याओरेर यध्ये कोन कोन घाने युक्तन बाद सेवोया प्रयोजन एवं कोन कोन घाने थाल काटी अतास्त प्रयोजन। ता याहले इयतो यमाते जल या मराच फलात फलान सप्तव युग्मा अथवा असवये अस्वाभाविक जल येते यिये याओरेर फलात नहीं करे देय। तार जन्य आमि गत वर्षम अनेकगुलि बाधेव जना घानीय लोकेर दर्शास्त समर्थन करे दियेछिलाम, किंतु योग्यिक बाजेते विशेष कोन बाबूज देवि नाई। एक याटियार याओरेर बाद छाड़ा युनामगङ्गेर एवाव अन्य कोनउ बाधेव काज नाई। एदिके आमि गत्तर्मेन्टेर दृष्टि आकर्षण करितेछि। यियचि अतास्त प्रयोजनीय। यदि गत्तर्मेन्ट अनुग्रह करे एदिके यनोयोग देन, ताहले लोकेर यसस उपकार हवे। युनामगङ्गेर एकत्री पूर्व फलातेर जायगा। यदि बादगुलि ठिक हये याय, धान योग्यामेव पूर्ण बेशी हवे एवं ताते सेह जायगा छाड़ाउ अन्य जायगार अडाव यिचिवे एवं यदेह उत्तुति हते पारबो।

आमादेव युनामगङ्गेर यसदिके अडाव। बास्ताव अडाव भीन्दा। एट श्रीहट्ट-युनामगङ्गेर बास्ताव एत वर्षम दरे काज चलाते किस्त एट बास्ता दिवे आज पर्याप्त बाबूजाम यातागातेर डाल बन्दोबस्त हइलना। श्रीहट्ट हते युनामगङ्गेर मात्र ४२ माइल। एट बास्ताव यधो अनेकगुलि भाङ्गा आछे, ताते वर्षम वर्षम पूर्व दितेहय। आमरा पूर्वे बलेछिलाम ये यदि पाका bridge देवोया र जन्य याल यश्वा योगाड़ करा यस्तव नाहय, ताहले अस्ततः काट्टेर पूर्व दिलेउ आमरा सहजे यातायात करते पारि, तातेउ आमादेव उपकार हवे। युनामगङ्गेर थेके दुनियार ये कोन जायगाय येते हले श्रीहट्ट दियेह येते हवे। बास्ता मात्र एहिट्टि। तातेउ शुभ हेमस्ते योटिर चले। बर्धाय चलेना। किस्त एट ४२ माइल बास्तु योटिर अतिक्रम करिते कोन कोन दिन ५ घण्टारउ अधिक बेशी समय लागे एवं अस्ततः २०।२५ बाबू योटिर थेके नागते हय एवं उठते हय। थ्रत्योक पूर्वेर निकट एसे नामिये देय एवं पूर्व पार हये उठाय। ठिक एडावे एत वर्षम चलाते। अग्छ एथाने एकत्री गत्तर्मेन्ट आछे। ताँरा एकत्री समग्र महकुमार एत वड एकत्री असूरी धार प्रतिकारे तर्पत हइतेहेनना एटाह आचर्येर

বিষয়। নথন জনপ্রিয় পত্র মেচেটের হাতে শাসন কর্মসূলি আছে। মেজনা লোকে বিশেষ ভাবে আশা করে যে এখন খুব ভাড়াতাড়ি এই দাক্কন অসুবিধা দূর হবে। এখনও শ্রীহট থেকে মুনামগঞ্জে ভাক পেটে ২০ মিন লাগে। পুরিদীর মকল লোক ভাক পাওয়ার পরে মুনামগঞ্জে ভাক ঘাট। আমরা কাতৰাব চিকাব করেছি, কিন্তু এখন পর্যাপ্তও এই বাঞ্ছার উন্নতি সাধন সম্ভব্য হওয়া নাই ভাকের অসুবিধা দূর হয় নাই। ভাতক-গোবিল রাস্তায় যদি অস্ততঃ কাটের পুরান ভাড়াতাড়ি করে দেওয়া হয় তাহলেও যাতাযাতের কতক সুবিধা হবে এবং লোকের মহৎ উৎকাম হবে। আমি এলিটে পত্র মেচেটের বিশেষ দৃষ্টি আকর্ষণ করি।

আমি এখনেই আমার মন্তব্য শেয় করিতেছি।

(The hon. Member spoke in Bengali and drew the attention of the Government to the following among other things:

- (i) Grow-More Food Campaign;
- (ii) For construction of Bunds in the Sunamganj subdivision; and
- (iii) For better facilities of Road communications in the Sunamganj subdivision.)

Srijut BELIRAM DAS: Mr. Speaker, Sir, coming as I do from a minority community, I would like to bring some relevant facts to the notice of the Government for their kind and sympathetic consideration. My community, the scheduled castes, is a part and parcel of the great Hindu community of Indian nationalism and it will be admitted by all that my community is much more backward in point of education and economy though not much socially as in other provinces. It is the bounden duty, I consider, of my more fortunate brethren of other communities to raise them to their own level in order to fit them into the general march of events facing the country to-day, and with a view to better their lot I venture to make some special demands on the Government and that should not be interpreted as leading to separationists outlook.

My first demand on the Government is to make some special provisions for the spread of education amongst my people by way of granting more scholarships, free-studentships, starting of new educational institutions in their midst where need be, appointment of scheduled caste welfare officers and the like. Some of the Provincial Governments in India have already earmarked some decent sums for education and general welfare of the scheduled castes and I think it will be desirable for our Government to make some special provisions in this behalf.

It has come to my notice that most of the scholarships and free-studentships as at present awarded, have gone to the students belonging to the urban areas. I beg to submit that the case of the students of the rural areas deserve special consideration in the matter of distribution.

It is generally clamoured that the candidates for services from towns get larger share of employment than the candidates from the rural areas. It is also clamoured that in the Provincial Services, too, the scheduled castes people have not been properly represented. I would urge upon the Government to attend to their grievances as immediately as possible.

It has come to my notice that the distribution of Central Government scholarships has been unfair in many cases and I know cases where sons of big Mahajans of my community have been the recipients of such scholarships by depriving the most needy students. I urge upon the Government to move the Central Government to award these scholarships in consultation with the Provincial Government.

The sanitary and hygienic condition of my community is far from satisfactory. In order to improve their health and sanitation Government should provide sufficient funds and should spend the same in consultation with the representatives of the community.

Further, I beg to submit that the economic condition of my people is terribly worst. In order to improve the economic condition of my people Government should see that the proper shares of business under Government or semi-Government institutions such as Public Works Department, Forest Department, Motor Transport Department and the like, are given to these people. The traditional profession of fishing of the majority of the people of my community is going out of their hands due to several factors, such as coming of the caste Hindus and the Muslims to this profession, decrease in fishing areas owing to invasion of these areas by the turbulent immigrants, uncertainty of getting fishery settlement and presence of outside fishermen in the Province. So, it has become necessary for my people to take to other professions. Most of the Scheduled Caste people are landless and unless Government come to their rescue by way of giving lands free of premium, their lot will not improve. It has been found that the fisheries under the Government pass from hand to hand every year and the present policy of the Government has been to give fisheries to the highest bidders or speculators. This has ruined many of the old fishermen families for reasons known to the Government. It is argued from the side of the Government that if fishermen do not get much profit from the fisheries it is up to them to give up the same and had they suffered much losses, they would not have come to offer such higher bids. To this contention I beg to submit that there being no other profession to fall back upon immediately, the fishing community have no other way left than to take the fisheries at much higher bids to try their luck. If they wound up the business abruptly the Mahajans who are their financiers would pounce upon them and they will be turned into street beggars.

In saying all these, I certainly do not entertain any idea of causing any loss of revenue to the Government. For improving our own condition we require more money. But instead of leaving the settlement of fisheries to the whims of individual district or subdivisional officers Government can form boards for settlement of fisheries composed both of Officials and Non-officials like the Excise Department. Government should make some estimates of the value of each fishery every year like the Forest Department and bidding should be allowed to individuals and at certain stage the bidding should be stopped and settlement made with deserving persons at a reasonable rate. I suggest to the Government that long term settlement of fisheries should be encouraged in order to facilitate planned fishing and not to massacre the fishes.

Though I represent a minority community in this Assembly I have a duty towards the general welfare of the other people of my constituency as well. I admit that the resources of the Government are too meagre ; but the little that they have proposed to spend should have been spent most fairly and equitably. I mention here only one item of the Budget Memorandum under the Post-War Reconstruction schemes. I am glad that a good sum has been proposed to be spent in taking up new roads in the Kamrup district, but the fact remains that certain areas of the district are not the only places where people live. It has been found that within the radius of 12 miles in between Amingaon-Rangiya-Nalbari and Hajo about 25 lakhs of rupees have been proposed to be spent in new roads leaving aside the vast areas from the railway line up to the summits of the Bhutan Hills and the whole of the south bank of the Kamrup district. I do not grudge that my more fortunate brethren of some areas of North Kamrup will get their much needed roads, but it

looks very odd to leave aside two fifth of the Gauhati subdivision without any road in the Post-War Budget. I hope Government will do justice to the affected areas.

I beg to bring to the notice of the Government that the Nagarbera area of the Kamrup district is unconnected by roads with the headquarters of the district and this is the most backward area of my constituency. I think out of the budgeted amount a sum could have been easily spent for the construction of a road connecting this area. There is insistent demand for a road to Nagarbera. And if Government cannot alter their scheme in any way I have mandate from the people, to urge upon the Government to cut off this portion of my district and to add this portion to the Goalpara district. There is the necessity of other roads from Chaigaon to Gummi, Alikakh and Lotoria, the thickly populated areas of my constituency, but the claim of Nagarbera is far superior to other places in my opinion.

Sir, I like to draw the attention of the Hon'ble Minister of Public Works Department to certain facts for his careful consideration and necessary action. In the Public Works Department nearly 87 per cent. of the labourers are from outside the Province and thus the children of the soil are deprived of earning their bread. There is a history behind this extinction of Assamese labour in this Department. The tea planters who were the pioneers in the field of labour recruits in Assam, recruited and employed only the Assamese labour in opening out new gardens. But due to the privileged position which the planters commanded and still command in their gardens, they soon became like so many Dangorias of the Ahom Raj or Feudal Chiefs or landed aristocrats within their areas and gradually reduced the indigenous labourers to so many slaves. This was resented to by the then Chief Commissioner, General Jenkins and passed orders not to employ Assamese labour.

Public Works Department, as we know, was under the Military Department before and they brought with them all its paraphernalia, i.e., engineers, clerks, contractors and labourers from outside the Province. Though this Department has come under the civil administration from long before, its policy has remained the same. Much of the Public Works Department work then were of the nature of the earth works or of semi-permanent nature. So, those who could control labour, became the contractors. And it is for this reason that outside contractors and labourers are predominant in Assam.

It is not a fact that Assamese people are unfit for doing any hard work e.g. in road making, etc. The remnants of old Assamese roads, Gars, bunds, etc. that are to be found still now scattered all over the Province, go to prove that our people also did hard labour. The famous Momaikata Gor of near about nine crores of cubic feet of earth work was built overnight by Assamese labour to smash the imperial army of Aurangajeb. So, I urge upon the Government to give a serious consideration to this and to help the Assamese contractors and labourers to earn their livelihood by contract works.

I propose to give some suggestions to the Hon'ble Minister, Public Works Department, for proper action.

(1) There should be classification and registration of Public Works Department contractors and contractors who use technical hands should get preference over others.

(2) A new department like "Designing and Estimating Department" should be started forthwith. It is very often found that our Engineers cannot give

accurate estimates of works and they come with supplementary estimates in the course of working out the estimated works.

(3) Government should have standard measurement of annual repair works like the Railways, Military and Central Public Works Department and thus to save the time of the overseers.

(4) There should be separate Store Department under persons other than Subdivisional Officers or Overseers to save technical labour.

(5) There should be a uniform schedule of rates for all the divisions in Assam for co-ordination purposes.

(6) All payments of contract works should be made within one month of the completion of works to help the indigenous contractors. To facilitate this the overseers should be made to measure the works while in progress and send the measurement book to the office immediately. Due to the incompetency of this Department the payment to contractors for the works done within my constituency is remaining unpaid for over 3 years, thereby ruining our contractors. I hope Government will take immediate steps to make payment to the contractors.

(7) The Blue Print or plan of works prepared by the Department must not in any case be allowed to be altered at the sight of work. This alteration of Blue Prints shows the inefficiency and want of foresight of the Engineer concerned.

(8) The Department of Irrigation should be at once separated from the Public Works Department and Engineers skilled in Geology, Pedology (Science of soil) and Hydrology (Science of water) should be put in charge of this Department.

(9) The posts of Superintending Engineer should be abolished and Inspectors for supervising works should be appointed. At present the Superintending Engineers are doing the work of Post Offices.

(10) There should not be two Chief Engineers in the province of Assam and the next Chief Engineer should be recruited from amongst the best Engineers available in India to infuse new blood into the Department.

In order to facilitate the post-war plan the Government should at once start one overseer training school with the Jhalukbari Survey school as a nucleus.

Sir, I have only touched the points. If the Hon'ble Minister wants me to explain all the items then I am prepared to explain them when he desires me to do so. With these few words, I resume my seat.

Srijut DANDESWAR HAZARIKA : Mr. Speaker, Sir, I will deal with a few points regarding the supply position of the Province of which all the hon. Members are aware. Now, I am not going to criticise Government, nor am I going to find fault with them. What I want is to give them suggestions so that the supply position, whatever we are getting, might be slightly improved.

First of all, I want to appeal to Government to be more active in persuading the Central Government to give increased supply of foodstuffs, cloth and yarn to this Province. Regarding foodstuffs the scarcity of pulses, mustard oil and sugar is well known to all the hon. Members, but whatever we are getting for the Province has not been equitably distributed, and that is why many of the people are not getting mustard oil, cloth and yarn at all. I think it will not be surprising to the hon. Members of the House that many people of the villages are going without cloth for the last 6 or 7 months; they are not getting even one yard of cloth. They come with their ration cards to us and ask us why these cards are issued if they do not get any cloth. They ask us to take the cards back. Those clever people who remain near the dealers or are very much acquainted with the dealers know when the cloth is coming and immediately on arrival of stocks they get

their quota from the dealers. But the people living in the interior do not get information when the cloths are distributed. So, naturally when they go to the dealers they are told that all stocks have been sold out. That is why for the last six or seven months these people are not getting a piece of cloth and I may tell Government that some of these people have warned us that if no cloth is given to them they would send their naked women to us. Such is the position of cloth, Sir.

Regarding yarn, the supply is not so poor, but there is inequitable distribution due, probably, to the carelessness of the district officers. I will cite one example of my district, i.e., the district of Sibsagar where the population of the three subdivisions, i.e., Sibsagar, Jorhat and Golaghat, is almost equal; it is nearly 3,70,000 to 3,80,000 in each Subdivision. But the distribution is that in Jorhat they are getting approximately 125 bales of yarn per quarter, in Sibsagar they are getting about 75 bales while in Golaghat they are getting 52 or 53 bales only. I do not know who is responsible for this. So, I draw the attention of the Government to see that whatever we are getting is equitably distributed among the people.

Secondly, Sir, I would like to point out something regarding communications under the post-war development schemes. Some roads were taken up by Government—some village roads and some district roads—for the current year 1946-47 and the work began, I think, nearly two months back. But I am surprised to find that in some roads only two furlongs, in some three furlongs and in some only one furlong have been done in course of three months. When I asked the Executive Engineer or the Subdivisional Officer, Public Works Department they said that due to the low rate the contractors were not getting labourers for the work. Now, the rains are setting in in the plains, and I would therefore request the Hon'ble Minister of Communications and Post-War Development to see that some works are completed before the rains set in.

About education, I would like to point out something with regard to lower primary education. It is really a surprise that in my constituency which is the most backward constituency unfortunately not a single venture school has been taken up this year. I gave a list of schools to the Hon'ble Premier and to his Private Secretary but when the result was out I found that not a single school has been taken up this year. There are so many fit schools which were recommended by the authority, i.e., the Deputy Inspector of Schools but I do not know the reason why none has been taken up. Still I hope, the Government will be pleased to see that at least some schools are taken up immediately after the passing of the Budget.

Then about the Betel-nut tax. I do not say that the Government is sitting tight over this matter and doing nothing but again I would urge upon them to persuade the Interim Government to abolish this without any delay as this tax is creating havoc on the people of the Assam Valley particularly. It is a real grievance of the poor cultivators.

With these words, Sir, I resume my seat.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: Mr. Prabhudayal Himatsingka.

Mr. PRABHUDAYAL HIMATSINGKA: Mr. Speaker, Sir, I had no mind to take part in the general discussion but as you have called my name.....

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: But your name has been submitted by your Party.

Mr. PRABHUDAYAL HIMATSINGKA: Yes, I had agreed to speak but I had thought that I would reply to some of the criticisms that might be put forward by the Opposition. But, as a matter of fact, nothing has been said against

the Budget and there is nothing much for me to say. I will, Sir, speak a few words regarding the supply position. Mr. Hazarika has drawn attention of Government to some of the points and I would like to add something to what he has said. Assam, as you know, Sir, is a deficit Province for most of the commodities that we require except rice and tea. Rice is the only staple food that we have in excess and we send out.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER : Since when Assam has become a deficit Province?

Mr. PRABHUDAYAL HIMATSINGKA : Assam is a deficit Province not for rice but for everything else. Dal comes from outside, mustard oil comes from outside, mustard seeds come from outside. Once, Since recent years May be, but at the present moment it is a deficit Province. If the Ministers are being accused for anything, it is for short supply of food-stuffs and other necessaries and that is why the Ministry is coming in for a good deal of criticism. But little is realised about the difficulty standing in the way of the Province getting her supply. With regard to necessary things, most of the supplying provinces are creating difficulties in the way of things moving into Assam. "Gur" is to come either from the United Provinces or from Bihar, Dal pulses from Gwalior, Bhawalpur State, Rajputana, etc., cocoa-nut oil from Travancore and perhaps now from Ceylon. Most of the things that are to come to Assam have to move through Bengal and Bengal has restricted export from that province and even if the things are to move through Calcutta, Bengal Government create a lot of difficulty. I know of several instances, Sir, where the Government of India had allotted a lot of Dal, gram and other foodstuffs to Assam. After a good deal of correspondence things were arranged at Gwalior. But there was a heavy rain at Gwalior recently and the Gwalior state have said that they won't allow gram to move out of their state as the standing crop of wheat is said to have been affected and the people there might suffer. They do not care for the difficulties of the people of Assam but because some rain affected the wheat crop they have stopped export of gram which had been allotted to Assam. These are some of the instances of difficulties in the way of Assam getting her proper share. Here, I say, if the officers of the Supply Department be a little more active and instead of depending merely on correspondence which take a lot of time, if they sometimes go out and come in direct contact with the authorities in Delhi and other places, I feel, Sir, things will be better and our difficulty will be lesser. But so far as I know, none of the officers here takes the trouble of coming into personal contact with the officials in Delhi who can perhaps help Assam. Take for instance, cocoa-nut oil. Perhaps, you know, Sir, that Assam is supposed to get 5 per cent. of all arrivals in Bengal. But you will be surprised to know that the last quota Assam got was in the first of May 1946 and that was about 100 tons. Assam had nothing in June, July, August, September and right upto to December. When the attention of the officials was drawn to the fact by me, a telegram was sent to Calcutta asking for information and immediately came a reply that they were expecting some oil and 30 tons were allotted as Assam's quota. Assam got 30 tons. But when the matter was tackled by the Hon'ble Supply Minister in Delhi by personal contact with the officers in Delhi, Assam was allotted more than 900 tons separately to be brought by Assam direct from the provinces where oil was available. That is an instance which shows that if personal contact is established there is every chance that some of our difficulties may be lessened. Similarly, Sir, there are certain other things, e.g., iron, corrugated iron sheets, and so on. You know, Sir, great difficulty has been created in the way of Assam getting these things. Assam needs a very large quantity of these materials.

On account of strike in the factories very little has been allotted and whatever is allotted to Assam is to come from Calcutta. The dealers or stockists as they are called create a lot of difficulties and in fact nothing practically has moved to Assam. There again if the officials take some little personal interest, things might be better otherwise the position so far has been and I am afraid, will continue to be that nothing will move into Assam. Officials concerned should be a little more up and doing and try to make these things move. Similarly, Sir, the position of other supplies also, e.g., cloth has been affected on account of the strikes in the Mills and the reduction of the number of hours of work on account of labour legislation ; but all these indirectly affect the Province. In spite of these difficulties, I feel that if a little more energy be put by the Department concerned, things will be better.

Now, there is another matter to which I want to draw the attention of the Hon'ble Minister. I understand that plain sheets for making canisters are being allotted year after year to a person who is supposed to be receiving the quota on behalf of Assam. He happens to be a dealer or business man in Calcutta. He is receiving the quota for Assam year after year ; but not once has he supplied the requirements of Assam at controlled rates, or perhaps, at all. Either he evades reply, or he does not reply at all. Perhaps he feels he is outside the jurisdiction of the Province and he will not be caught. Government should look into the matter and if necessary write to the Government of India not to give him quota of tins for canisters required in Assam.

Another thing I suggest is the question of decontrolling. The best remedy is to decontrol. As you know, Sir, the moment control is introduced, things go out of control. It is our experience that the moment you introduce control, the thing controlled is not available. Take the case of warm clothing in Shillong. So long control was there it was not available. Now that the control has been removed, go to any shop, and you will get it and get it cheap. Previously a piece which was selling at Rs.23 per yard will be available now at about Rs.14 per yard. Whenever there is control, there is a sub-conscious feeling and everyone tries to get hold of as much as he can. The remedy is that we should try to remove control as much as possible, and as soon as possible so that the difficulties of the people may be lessened.

With these remarks, Sir, I beg to resume my seat.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER : Any other hon. Members desiring to speak ?

Srijut MOTIRAM BORA: On a point of information, Sir. What is the good of having general discussion of the Budget when we find that as many as six Hon'ble Ministers are absent in the House? My hon. Friend is discussing supply position but we find that the Supply Minister is absent, he is discussing educational matters, but the Education Minister is absent. So, Sir, what is the good of having this discussion in this way when the respective Ministers are absent in the House?

The Hon'ble Srijut BISHNURAM MEDHI: On a point of explanation Sir. The Hon'ble the Premier is now in the other House in connection with the business of that House. As regards the Hon'ble the Supply Minister, he is also conducting a meeting just now. I am just taking down notes of the points which I will try to place before them for their information.

Srijit HEM CHANDRA HAZARIKA: ৰাষ্ট্ৰাব্দট সম্পর্কেও সেই একে অসম। যি কেটো বাড়া Post-War Reconstruction Scheme যতে লোৱাৰ কথা আছিল তাৰ চিত্ৰত পুঁচাৰখন্ত: উদৰ লক্ষ্মীপুৰৰ থাই ১০ মাইল বাছাহে ১৯৪৭ চনৰ লব দুলি থৰৰ পৰিয়া গৈছে। ইয়াৰ নিমিত্তে লোকেন বোর্ডৰ চেয়াৰমেন আৰু গোটেই বাটিজ অৱাকি টেক পৰিবহণ। টেজপুৰৰ লৰা যিমো বাঞ্ছা উতৰলক্ষ্মীপুৰৰেদি গৈ ধৰেজি আৰু মোৰাবী পাঠৰ লাগাই দৈ, মেটাই, মোৰ যিবানদুৰ মনত আছে, মাননীয় শ্ৰীযুক্ত অমিয় কুমাৰ শাম আৰু যচ, national highway কৰিবৰ নিমিত্তে পুনৰাবৃত দিছিলো। সেইটো কি হৈছে কৰ মোটাৰ। উতৰলক্ষ্মীপুৰৰ লৰা ফিলাৰ head-quarters ডিক্ষণ্ডলৈ বাৰিয়া যাতোৱাতৰ কিমান আগবংশ। কমলাৰাবীয়েছিল যাৰ নোৱাৰে। এতিয়া যি এটা বাঞ্ছা কৰিছে সেইটো ইটোৰ বাৰিয়া পাঠকৰ ন নোৱাকে তাৰ টিক নাই, কৰিব এতিয়া সৌভৰ্য্যুৰত বালি দিছেহে যাবাবন। খৰচেন্দু চৰকুচি বিভিন্নৰ বিহীন কষ্টেকে report কৰিছিল যে এই বাঞ্ছা দিয়া থানে পৰম্পৰামুকিৰ উকা পানী উপোস্থিতি দিয়া, তাকে পুনৰাবৃত কৰিবৰ কাৰণেই ইবলা এই বাঞ্ছাত বালি দিয়া দৈছে। এই বাঞ্ছা চৰকুচিলে ডিক্ষণ্ডলৈ যাৰলৈ হলৈ বদতিয়েদি বা টেজপুৰৰেদি ঘূৰি শৰি লাগিব। দৰ্শকৰা দুৰ্বত্তি আৰকি পেলাই দোঁও হৈছে বহুমিনৰে পৰা। চকুৱা থানাৰ কালৈল যদি আপোনামোকে কেতিয়াৰা যাব তেনেহলে আপোনামোকে আশ্চৰ্য হব যে সেই টাই কোনো সত্তা বাঞ্ছাত আছেনে নাই—আপোনামোকে ভাবি চাৰ লাগিব যে এইখন বজ্য ইয়ান দিনৰ সুবাদা কোনো সত্তা অস্তি আছেনে যাই। ধৰেজিলৈ যাৰলৈ কিমান কৰ! এই বিলাক সোচ ঘূৰি আহিয়া। সেই বিলাক টাইৰ অৱশ্য দেখিলৈ চকুৱা পানী নোলাই নোৱাৰে। এমি মৌজাৰ লৰা যচেন এমি মৌজালৈ যাৰলৈ বাঞ্ছা নাই—পদ্মলি নাই। এনেকুৱাই হৈছে মকলোকে গত অৱহেলিত ভাবে নাখাকে।

শিশমলক শোভণশিৰি, বাজীন, চকুৱাখানা আৰু কাকৈ আদি নৈয়ে যি কইটা মৌজাক বাবে নাৰে পানী উন্বাটিচে সেই কেটো মৌজাৰ অৱশ্য সম্পর্কে মাননীয় যেধি ডাঙৰীয়া যেতিয়া গৈচিল, তেবেতৰ দুটি আৰম্ভণ কৰা হৈছিল। মাননীয় প্ৰধান যঙ্গী যেতিয়া গৈছিল, তেতিয়া তেবেতৰো দুটি আৰম্ভণ কৰা হৈছিল। আনকি Parliamentary Secretary মহোদয়ৰো দুটি আৰম্ভণ কৰা হৈছিল। কাকৈ আৰু বজ্জনিয়ে তেলাহি, কমলাৰাবীয়া আৰু নাওবৈচা মৌজাৰ খেতি নাই কৰে। সেই একে সময়তে নকাৰী মৌজাৰ বাইজৰো খেতি নাই হয় আৰু তেওঁমোকেও বাঞ্ছানা ধাফ কৰিবলৈ দৰখণ্ডি দিছিল। অন্যান্য যিবিলাক মৌজা ক্ষতিগ্ৰস্ত হৈছিল সেইবিলাকৰ বিষয়ে অনুসন্ধান হৈছিল। কিন্তু নকাৰী মৌজাৰ কথা তল পৰি গল। কাৰণ, নকাৰী মৌজাৰ বাইজে কোনো তদন্ত হোৱাৰ কথা গুনানাই। যই মহকুমাধিপতিৰ দুটি আৰম্ভণ কৰাত তেবেতে কৰে যে Cabinet-ৰ অনুমতি নোহোৱাকৈ যই নতুন জাগত অনুসন্ধান দগ্ধাস্তৰ দ্বাৰা মহোদয়ক জনাইছিল, কিন্তু আজিলোকে কোনো প্ৰতীকাৰ হোৱা নাই। সিফালে পৰে। সেই মৌজাৰ বাইজ বাবে বাবে চকুৱাখানা নৈৰ বানপাণীত প্ৰপীড়িত। সিফালে সোৰণ নিষিক্তে তাত ১২,০০০ টিকা দিয়া হওক বুলি কোৱা যাব তাকো অসমৰ বুলি ভাৰিৰ লাগিবনো?

(The hon. Member spoke in Assamese about the grievances of the North Lakhimpur subdivision regarding inadequate composition of the Town Committee, educational facilities of the students, distribution of cloth, mustard oil, salt and as regards communication facilities, etc.)

*Mr. MANIRAM MARAK: Mr. Speaker, Sir, I beg to take liberty to stand on the floor of this House and I am glad to point out of my poor Garo community, who are, as you know backward, with the hope that they will surely be sympathised and will receive due consideration. That in the last Budget Session I spoke on the lack of education amongst my Garo people. Even primary schools are few and neglected. There are only 6 Government Aided Middle English Schools, 5 of them are getting Rs 25 and one Rs 50 per month as grant from the Government, which is quite inadequate to maintain the Schools. And there has been a Venture Middle English School at Silkgiri running for about 15 years. The Government has been turning a deaf ear to their prayer for grant. There is no Government Middle English School in the whole district. I solicited the present Government to take one or two Government Aided Middle English Schools and increase the grants to others but I was informed by the present Government that none of the Aided Schools can be taken in this year on account of the shortage of fund but promised to increase the grants. But I come to understand that no grant has been increased up to date. Only non-recurring grant for 2 Aided Middle English schools and one Venture School at Rs.100 each was sanctioned. I therefore earnestly request the present Government to open more Lower Primary Schools in the Garo Hills and the Baghmara and Resu Government Aided Middle English Schools be taken by Government as feeders to the Tura Government High English School and increase the grants to other Aided Middle English Schools.

Moreover, I beg to add that almost all the school buildings in the Garo Hills either in town or outside the town and even the High English School building at Tura are in wretched condition. I am sorry to point out that since many years the Government has not allotted any grant for school buildings in the Garo Hills. So every school either in town or outside the town has held classes in open places. In my personal knowledge I found in other districts that there are schools having nice buildings which are allotted annually grants for improvement of their school buildings but none in Garo Hills only. If the popular Government be pleased to visit Garo Hills once they will feel sympathy and tears will surely come down from their eyes on seeing the wretched conditions of the poor boys and girls. I therefore pray that a Member of the popular Government may kindly visit Garo Hills once and see the matters. And also with reference to one of my Questions in the Assembly I beg to say that the Hon'ble Minister-in-charge of Public Works Department, Rev. J. J. M. Nichols-Roy, in his last visit to Tura saw personally the wretched condition of the cottages in which five high classes are sitting. In 1941-42 the then Government sanctioned Rs.8,000 for the extension of the High School building which was originally intended for the then Middle English School. Now it is a full-fledged High School with sections. It was meant for 4 or 5 classes only but now the school has 10 or 12 classes. You can thus imagine the conditions and see how 5 or 6 boys or girls are sitting on a bench. For the said extension of the building contractors even were called for. But for want of iron materials the plan was postponed and indefinitely it seems. Will the Government be pleased to state whether that sanction had altogether been abandoned never to be renewed or do they contemplate of taking any action for the most needed extension of the said building?

*Speech not corrected.

From time immemorial we the bona fide Garos in the Garo Hills have a right to use reserve and unreserve trees from outside the Forest Reserve for our own home consumption without taking any permit and paying any tax to the Forest Department. The Forest law and Regulation also say that the bona fide Garos in the Garo Hills are allowed free of royalty to use Reserve and unreserve trees and other forest products from outside the Government Reserves. No alteration has even been made up to now. But now, Sir, we are completely disallowed to use any of the reserve trees and other forest products, by the Forest Department since some years back. Also there are some areas inside some Forest Reserves suitable for wet cultivation such as Datugiri, Natinggiri, Bangsi Chima, Angratully, Baghmara Reserves and others. Some small areas in the Reserve are cultivated by Forest villagers who are considered to be men of the Forest Department and practically the cultivators are sub-tenants who are at the mercy and pleasure of the Department. As such there are no certainty, permanency or security. I therefore beg the Government with the request that the areas suitable for wet cultivation in the Garo Hills may be surveyed by an agricultural expert and deforested and handed over to the people for cultivation.

The right of the Garo Nokmas is gradually disappearing. Formerly the Garo Nokmas were entitled to get Nokma fees of anna one per rupee and it was realised by the Forest Department. But at present this system seems to have been abolished. No fees are given to the Nokmas. I therefore earnestly request the popular Government to see and take necessary steps immediately.

Sir, at present the Forest Department are arranging for the sale of Sal trees by public auction in coup system realising monopoly fees. Such system is quite detrimental to the Garos. You know, Sir, Garo Hills is a deficient area and the people of Garo Hills are very poor, the poorest of all communities. We could not compete by any means with the plains people by whom they are surrounded. They are moneyed men. In the last auction sale (i.e., on 16th December 1946) some 3 or 4 coups of Sal trees were sold away and there were some 4 or 5 Garo bidders including myself, but they were superseded by the foreigners except in one coup retained by myself with a high bid. I therefore earnestly request the popular Government to stop such coup system and sell the Sal trees by issuing permits so that the native Garos also can share in the business and that they may also live in these hard days.

Sir, in the last Budget Session I pressed for more dispensaries in the Garo Hills. At present there are only 6 dispensaries including Kala-azar Hospitals which are quite insufficient for the whole of the Garo Hills. I therefore press again for opening at least 2 more dispensaries, one either at Kaparipara or Ghosgaon hat and another at Garobadha hat. Garobadha has a big hat and a Forest office and a police station and is surrounded by many villages which are all thickly populated. Sir, moreover, I beg to add that in the last Budget Session I requested the present Government to provide more accommodation in Kala-azar Hospitals at Bajengdobe, Kalaichar and Fulbari but this has not yet been done upto now. I therefore earnestly request the present Government to provide accommodation for the patients at an early date.

Sir, in the last Budget Session I pressed the Government to open at least two weaving and other technical institutions. The Hon'ble Minister-in-charge of Industries himself consented to open one at Tura by this year, but nothing has been done up to now. Even the site has not yet been selected. I therefore request the Hon'ble Minister-in-charge of Industries to take immediate steps in the matter.

Sir, there is a lack of communication. We are glad to hear that a main road from Tura to Bajendoba direct to Gauhati and Dalu to Baghmara will be constructed, but we request the Government to start the same

very early. Moreover, I beg to suggest that one new road via Rongkongiri Mouza II diverting from the 8th mile on the Tura Mankachar Road through Okapara Gildinggiri direct to Mohendraganj Police Station be constructed which is quite essential and urgently needed for the poor Garos. Therefore, Sir, I request the popular Government to open the same immediately.

Sir, the supply of sugar for Garo Hills is quite insufficient. It does not come even to the normal requirement. It comes to my notice that the distribution of sugar is not properly done as I learnt from the stockist at Tura when I left for Shillong. Some 700 or 800 maunds of sugar are still lying in the stock. What is the necessity of keeping such big amount in stock when the locality demands much more?

Sir, the supply of cloth is quite insufficient. The quota of cloth may kindly be increased. The supply of yarn is only 4 bales for whole of the Garo Hills which is quite insufficient. These 4 bales are not adequate to cover the need of Tura town even. Therefore, I request the Government to increase the yarn bales immediately.

Sir, you know that none of the Garos has been selected in the jobs for the Senior and Junior Civil Services upto date though 8 young Garo boys and girls have graduated and are trying for the jobs. The Government promised in their Appointment Department letter No. AAA5/45/4, dated Shillong, the 21st June 1946, that the qualified Garo candidates will receive full consideration at the hands of the Assam Public Service Commission.

I therefore strongly demand this time that the present Government would give first consideration to the case of Garo candidates in the next time of recruitment.

This much, Sir, and I would like to conclude my speech.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: May I know if any other hon. Member wants to take part in the budget discussion to-day? (No response).

I should then like to come to the end of the agenda for to-day and I adjourn the House till 2 p.m. to-morrow. Mr. Faull may take part in the discussion early to-morrow.

Mr. W. R. FAULL: Mr. Speaker, Sir, am I to understand that there will be no sitting this afternoon?

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: No, there will be no sitting this afternoon, as I find there is none to take part in the discussion for today and the list of those who wanted to speak today has been exhausted.

Mr. W. R. FAULL: Mr. Speaker, Sir, to meet the convenience of the House I am prepared to speak this morning.

The Hon'ble the SPEAKER: No, there will be no inconvenience if the hon. Member wants to speak to-morrow.

Adjournment

The Assembly was then adjourned till 2 p.m. on Friday, the 14th March 1947.

respect of the Barpeta Sub-Registry Office building for the year 1946-47. No provision in the current year's budget could be made as the arrangement was made after the framing of the budget estimates, and Rs.218 which represents the difference between the amount of Rs.2,000 only sanctioned against the amount of Rs.2,218 as originally estimated for 1946-47 budget. This amount is necessary as rent of certain Sub-Registry Office buildings was raised temporarily.

(d) Due to (1) increase in the rate of dearness allowance of the contingency menials with retrospective effect, (2) increase in correspondence due to the opening of three additional Sub-Registry Offices and (3) increase in price of materials.

(e) This additional amount is necessary in connection with the repairs to the Katigora Sub-Registry Office building which was badly damaged by the last flood.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

A—Works.—The work "Training the Noa Dihing River" was undertaken at an estimated cost of Rs. 59,871 as a measure for preventing floods in the Dibrugarh Subdivision by diverting the course of the Noa Dihing River. A sum of Rs. 38,000 is required for expenditure during the current financial year. Of this, a sum of Rs. 37,999 will be met from savings within the budget grant. The Assembly is, therefore, asked to vote a supplementary grant of Re. 1 to meet the balance.

The work "Protecting the Barali near Rupahimukh with three Rows Leets fencing in Sibsagar Embankment and Drainage Subdivision" is proposed to be undertaken at an estimated cost of Rs. 32,340 as a measure for eliminating the danger of a marginal embankment bursting and causing unexpected misery to the rayots of the locality.

A sum of Rs. 4,000 is required for expenditure during the current financial year.

D—Grants-in-aid.—The demand under this head represents the contribution of Rs. 10,000 made by this Government to the villagers of Kuruabahi and Mariahola in the Golaghat Subdivision who of their own accord started constructing a very useful bund designed to save crops of a considerable area but who on account of financial inability could not complete the work.

A sum of Rs. 10,000 is required on this account. Of this, a sum of Rs. 9,999 will be met from savings within the budget grant. The Assembly is, therefore, asked to vote a supplementary grant of Re. 1 to meet the balance.

68-B.—N. E. D.—Productive work :—The works "constructing the Brahmaputra Bund near Desangmukh" is likely to be completed during the current financial year. The provision made for the work in the current year's budget proved inadequate on account of breaches caused by floods during the year. EXPLANATORY NOTE

A. Superintendence

(1) *Pay of Establishment.*—The excess is due to the unexpected leave of the head clerk and consequent arrangement made. Entertainment of orderlies for a temporary post of Additional Assistant Inspector General of Police to clear up arrears and grant of interim relief.

(2) *Allowances and honoraria.*—Excess is principally due to the drawal during the year of war and dearness allowance at the higher rate with retrospective effect.

(3) *Contingencies.*—Excess is due to the purchase of a type-writer.

B. D.E.F—District Police

(1) *Pay of Establishment.*—Excess is mainly due to the grant of interim relief and inadequate provision in the original budget estimate and entertainment of additional drivers at an estimated cost of Rs.33,218 per annum.

(2) *Allowances and honoraria.*—Excess is due to the payment during the year of war and dearness allowance at the enhanced rates and inadequate provision in the original budget estimate.

(3) *Contingencies.*—The excess is due to the purchase of equipment and transport including wireless equipment at a cost of about Trs.1,00 and 20 trucks at Trs. 1,00 to make the Police efficient which could not be secured during the war, and to the high cost of clothing. At the instance of the Central Government it was decided to provide the force with a wireless establishment and with 20 mobile trucks, which have both proved of very great value in actual working. Subsidiary causes were hiring of boats owing to flood and grant of dearness allowance at the enhanced rates, the cost of stationery articles which had to be purchased locally and the high prices ruling for other contingency articles.

Deduct—*Recovery from the Defence Department.*—The excess is due to the fact that the minus provision of Rs. 14,50,937 made in the original budget on account of the Government of India's share for the Rail Force will not be adjusted upto 1st September 1946 and Rs. 8,50,000 on account of their share has been shown on the receipt side of the budget for next year.

Hospital Charges—

- (1) *Pay of Establishment.*—Excess is due to the grant of interim relief.
- (2) *Allowances and honoraria.*—Excess is due to the grant of dearness allowance at the enhanced rates.
- (3) *Contingencies.*—Excess is due to increase in the cost of diet, the high cost of medicines and medical stores and also to inadequate provision in the original budget estimate, grant of interim relief and dearness allowance to contingencies menials and the high prices of other contingent articles.

River Police—

The provision made for the purpose through a schedule fell short of actual requirement due to under-estimation as the accurate number of teachers under Local Bodies was not available at that time.

F. (a) A sum of Rs. 30,000 is required for granting dearness allowance to teachers of aided secondary schools as the provision made in the budget fell short of actual requirement.

(b) Provision was made for organising six Training Centres—two for male and one for female teachers in each valley for training of 50 Primary School teachers in each centre. These centres were to be attached to six selected Government High Schools where there were B. T. teachers on the staff.

It is now proposed to organise the six training centres on aided basis in six selected Government Aided High Schools. As there is provision in the current year's budget for organising the six Training Centres in six selected Government Schools made through a budget schedule and included in the list of supplementary grants, a supplementary grant of Rs. 100 (One hundred) only is sought for. The proposed change will involve no additional expenditure but merely a transfer of provision from one head to the other.

I. A sum of Rs. 16,000 is required for granting arrear dearness allowance to teachers of Government primary schools.

J. An additional amount of Rs. 2,51,695 is needed to meet the cost of dearness allowance granted to Lower Primary School teachers under Boards and also to meet the cost of arrear dearness allowance of such teachers under some Boards. The provision made in the budget proved inadequate of actual requirement.

K. A sum of Rs. 51,500 is required to meet the cost of dearness allowance granted to non-Government primary schools as inadequate provision was made in the budget due to under-estimation at lower rates.

M. The additional amount of Rs. 300, Rs. 800 and Rs. 200 are needed to meet the costs of interim relief and arrear dearness allowance granted to the staff of the Sylhet Sanskrit College including its contingency menials and also to meet partly the cost of travelling allowance for the Assistant Director of Public Instruction for Sanskrit Education for his journey in connection with the development of Guruvedic classes at Gauhati.

N. A sum of Rs. 13,400 is required for granting dearness allowance to teachers of new Madrassas brought on to the aided list and for granting increased rate of dearness allowance to Pandits of aided Tols as in the case of Primary School teachers.

Q. 1. A sum of Rs. 6,285 is required due to leave granted to Mr. A. Lai and appointment of a special officer for primary education, for which no provision exists in the budget.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

A-1.—In connection with the contract undertaken by the Director of Industries, Assam as an agent of the Provincial Government for supply of hats, Government sanctioned continuance of the Hat Factory at Sylhet with a staff of one Manager, one Factory Assistant, one Chowkidar and a peon for the month of March 1946 with a view to continue the Factory under the Planning and Development Schemes. Also owing to difficulties in winding up the war supply accounts Government sanctioned retention of the Upper Division Assistant in connection with War Supply work till February 1947. As no provision exists in the budget a supplementary grant of Rs. 2,960 is required for the pay of this staff including interim relief sanctioned by Government.

2. Owing to need of certain unavoidable contingent expenditure and also on account of contingent expenditure required in connection with the war supply staff, the provision under contingencies has fallen short by Rs. 3,364 which may be provided by a supplementary grant.

3. Government sanctioned an annual contribution of Rs.1,500 to the Indian Institute of Art in Industry and a grant-in aid of Rs. 8,459 to the Karmi Bhavan, Kulaura for introduction of spinning and weaving in the tornado affected areas of the Sunamganj Subdivision. No provision exists in the budget for these purposes. It is therefore proposed to provide funds for these purposes by a supplementary grant of Rs. 9,959.

(ii) On account of grant of arrear dearness and war allowances and also on account of the fact that the provision made in the budget for travelling allowance of officers proved inadequate, an additional sum of Rs.1,960 is required for dearness and may be provided by a supplementary grant.

(iii) Government sanctioned as a temporary measure a house rent of Rs.100 per mensem for a girls' hostel attached to the Weaving Institute, Gauhati. As no provision exists in the budget for the purpose, a supplementary grant of Rs.380 is necessary.

b. (1) 2 and (3) Certain unavoidable extra expenditure is required to be incurred on account of grant of interim relief and arrear dearness allowances. Besides due to shifting of the Weaving Institutes workshops many looms and accessories got damaged. Certain contingent expenditure is found unavoidable on this account also. Supplementary grant of Rs. 1,455, Rs. 4,047 and Rs. 1,430 against Pay of Establishment, Allowances and Contingencies respectively are therefore necessary.

(d) As sum of Rs. 13,000 is required for re-installation of the machineries and tools and plants of the Jorhat Technical School which have been received back from the military. The amount may be provided by a supplementary grant as there is no provision in the budget for the purpose. The balance will be met from savings.

G—(a) (i) A supplementary grant of Rs. 902 is necessary to meet increased expenditure due to grant of interim relief.

(ii) Due to increased expenditure on account of grant of arrear dearness and war allowances and also partly due to inadequacy of existing provision in the budget as supplementary grant of Rs. 2,584 is found necessary.

(iii) As the buildings for extension of the mulberry plantation at Gaurisagar could not be constructed during 1945-46, Government sanctioned construction of the buildings during the current financial year at an expenditure of Rs. 11,482. Besides the existing provision is found to be inadequate. A supplementary grant of Rs. 18,891 is therefore necessary.

D—To keep the buildings of the Sericultural stations in order an additional sum of Rs. 2,600 over the budget provision is essentially necessary. A sum of Rs. 11,363 is also necessary for maintenance of the buildings of the Jorhat Technical School received back from the military. A total supplementary grant of Rs. 14,463 is therefore necessary for these purposes.

G—No provision exists in the budget for contribution to Government of India sanctioned by Government for training Assam Students in the Inland Fisheries Training course held at Calcutta. A sum of Rs. 3,230 is required for the purpose during the current financial year which is proposed to be provided by a supplementary grant.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

A. The appointment of two Junior Inspectors to strengthen this inadequately staffed department, which it was impracticable to recruit a qualified Inspector from the province, of one statistical clerk to cope with increasing statistical work resulting from orders of the Central Government, the sanction of additional pay to the Chief Inspector of Factories for additional work on account of vacancy of the post of Inspector in addition to his duties were mainly responsible for the increase. Drawal of arrear war allowance and dearness allowance by the staff as well as travelling allowance drawn by the Junior Inspectors contributed towards the increase.

B. The increase under this head is due to the following reasons —

(a) The appointments of one Statistical Inspector and a clerk in connection with enforcement of the Industrial Statistics Act in 1945-46, drawal of arrear war allowance and dearness allowance by officers and staff, passage and travelling allowance and outfit allowance of an officer deputed to the United Kingdom for training in Labour Welfare duties mainly account for the increase. Fees and Travelling Allowance of the adjudicator appointed in connection with a dispute between the Assam-Bengal Cement Company, Limited and its employees, the Travelling Allowance of the Conciliator appointed in connection with a dispute between the Shillong Municipal Board and its conservancy staff and also Travelling Allowance of the members of the Plantation Labour Advisory Committees contributed towards the increase.

(b) The question of allocation of expenditure on family budget enquiries (initiated in connection with the All India Cost of Living Index Scheme with effect from 1st April 1944) between the Central and the Provincial Government on 50 : 50 basis was not decided till September 1946 and consequently no provision was made in the budget for 1946-47. A total expenditure of Rs. 9,502-9-0 was incurred in connection with the administration of the scheme in Assam by the Central Government. They have now raised a debit of Rs. 4,751-4-6 equivalent to 50 per cent. of the expenditure against the Government of Assam for acceptance in the accounts for 1945-46.

(3) (c). The increase is due mainly to the reversion of an Inspector from special duty, the appointment of a temporary Inspector to clear up heavy arrears and extra travelling for the same reason and to the cost of two temporary drivers and one handyman for two Departmental trucks which had to be obtained in order to enable the Inspecting staff to get round their areas. The cost of the trucks and also drawal of arrear war allowance and dearness allowances by officers and staff also involved increase under this head.

E. The amount was required for purchase of raingauges. During the war period the apparatus was not available. Hence these were to be purchased during the current year to meet the demands.

H. (a) The amount was required to install the raingauges purchased newly.

(b) The original grant was inadequate due to high price of materials and labour.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

General Administration

(a) The accommodation in the Kutchery building at Mangaldoi was inadequate and it has become necessary in the interest of public service to extend the building at a cost of Rs. 10,937. A sum of Rs. 6,500 is required for expenditure during the current financial year. Of this a sum of Rs. 6,499 will be met from the savings within the budget grant. The Assembly is, therefore, asked to vote a supplementary grant of Re. 1 to meet the balance.

(b) The "Brightwell" bungalow has recently been allotted to the Hon'ble Prime Minister of Assam by Government which is an unfurnished one. It is proposed to furnish the bungalow at an estimated cost of Rs. 11,436. A sum of Rs. 10,100 is required for expenditure during the current financial year. Of this a sum of Rs. 10,099 will be met from the savings within the budget grant. The Assembly is, therefore, asked to vote a supplementary grant of Re. 1 to meet the balance.

Education other than Europeans

Due to the revision of estimate which was originally prepared at a time when prices of materials and labour were low, the work "water supply in the Government High School at Goalpara" has become a major work in the course of execution. The work is now estimated to cost Rs 7,487 and a sum of Rs 2,410 is required for expenditure during the current year. Of this, a sum of Rs 2,409 will be met from savings within the budget grant. The Assembly is, therefore, asked to vote a supplementary grant of Re 1 to meet the balance.

MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTS

Due to extreme scarcity of house accommodation in Shillong it has become essentially necessary to construct 17 clerks' quarters at Kechi's Trace, Shillong, at an estimated cost of Rs.1,35,021. A sum of Rs 1,35,000 is required for expenditure during the current financial year. Of this, a sum of Rs 1,30,000 will be met from savings within the budget grant. The Assembly is, therefore, asked to vote a supplementary grant of Rs.5,000 to meet the balance.

(b) Communication:

Petrol Tax Projects—Ordinary

None of the new Petrol Tax Projects having been approved by the Government of India at the time the budget was framed a lump provision of Trs 3,00 was made in the current year's budget. During the course of the year, however, some projects have been approved by the Government of India and the following two projects have been taken up for execution during the year.

- (1) Improvement of the Roha-Borpujia-Matigaon Road
- (2) Tinali-Bhaman-Rajgarh Road.

Rupee one each for these projects may be voted by the Assembly, the balance being met from the savings in the current year's budget.

An additional sum of Rs. 25,13,000 is required to meet demands for repairs as the original budget provision has proved inadequate.

The heavy programme undertaken during preceding year of reconditioning the roads and buildings unmattered during war years and damaged by army movements and army occupation could not be completed on account of difficulty in procuring labour and materials and want of necessary staff and equipments. The balance of the work is being done during the current year in addition to the heavy normal annual repairs programme. Moreover, the anticipated reduction of rates and fall of prices has not materialised during the present post-war period, and again, the unprecedented floods during the year have entailed a heavy F. D. R. programme. As such, the requirement for a supplementary grant of Rs. 25,13,000 has become an imperative necessity for the purpose of keeping the roads and buildings in proper condition.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

C.—(i) The expenditure under this head is of uncertain nature and is dependent among other things on the number of dead paupers in the Police cases.

(ii) Government lent support to the plan of the Assam Women's Voluntary Services for establishing a Home called the "Assam Aram Ghat" in Shillong for totally disabled Indian Sailors, Soldiers, Airmen and men of the Indian Mercantile Marine. The Institution is founded on humanitarian grounds and will provide for the unfortunate class of disabled service men preferential treatment to men of Assam being allowed. The last Ministry provisionally agreed to make a grant of Rs.5,000 per annum. The present Ministry reduced the sum to 2/3rd in view of the fact that part of 1946-47 had passed, and paid Rs.3,333 this year to the institution in anticipation of approval of the Legislature. The Assembly is therefore asked to vote a grant of Rs.3,333.

E.—(a) Mainly due to the grant of interim relief and arrear dearness allowance which are admissible to contingency menials also and to rise in prices of articles.

F.—It has been found necessary to remit some old agricultural loans in different districts. A supplementary grant for Rs.26,300 is therefore asked for.

I.—(a) The additional amount is required for grants of Rs.1,500 to the Nalbari Town Committee and Rs.1,000 to each of the Palasbari and Gauripur Town Committees for general purposes, as these Town Committees did not receive any grant for this purpose.

K(a).—This supplementary grant represents the additional expenditure incurred in connection with the Cotton Cloth and Yarn Control Administration in the Province. This is required to meet the pay, travelling allowance, etc., of the second Assistant Provincial Textile Commissioner and his peons appointed after the Budget estimates for the current year was submitted to Finance and one additional Inspector and his peon appointed in July 1946; and to meet certain unforeseen and unavoidable expenditure necessitated by the increase of staff, transfer of officers, printing of ration cards in connection with the rationing, payment of arrear cost of living and dearness allowances of the officers and staff and cost of price and date stamps paid during the year.

K2.—The total expenditure under the head was estimated at Rs. 37,500. Recoveries under this head are estimated at Rs. 500 against Rs. 3,000 anticipated in the original Budget. There will, therefore, be a net expenditure of Rs. 37,000 as against Rs. 34,500 provided for in the original budget necessitating an excess expenditure of Rs. 2,500 at the end of the current year for which a supplementary grant is necessary.

K3.—It is anticipated that the total expenditure during the current year on account of issue of Free Ration to Government servants will come to Rs. 20,56,000 of which Rs. 15,000 will be recovered from Central Government and others and Rs. 1,92,700 will be met from savings leaving a net balance of Rs. 18,48,300 as against the net original provision of Rs. 17,50,000 and as such a supplementary grant for Rs. 98,300 is necessary.

K.—The expenditure for the current year on refugees from East Bengal has been estimated to be Rs. 30,000 which is recoverable from the Government of Bengal. There is, however, no likelihood of getting this contribution from the Government of Bengal before the close of the current year. It is therefore proposed to meet this expenditure for the current year by obtaining a supplementary grant.

It is also necessary to provide for Rs. 700 on account of the share of this Government on the grant of financial assistance to the Indian evacuee orphans. This expenditure is shared equally between the Provincial and Central Governments.

The balance of Rs. 100 is required to meet increased expenditure on rewards for destruction of wild animals.

L.—A total expenditure of Rs. 4,10,000 will be required during the current year for supply of food-stuffs at concessional prices to Government servants, sweepers of Municipalities and Medical Establishment under local bodies of which Rs. 30,000 is expected to be recovered from the Central Government and others, leaving a balance of Rs. 3,80,000 as against the net original provision of Rs. 3,68,000. Therefore a supplementary grant for Rs. 12,000 is necessary.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

A.—Additional grant of Rs. 1,50,000 is necessary as the original grant has proved short. An accurate estimate is not possible under this head.

B.(a)—The financial condition of the Dewan Manikchand—Mr. Gopika Raman Roy's Estate, which is under the management of the Court of Wards, Assam, has not yet improved. The budget of the Estate for the current year (1353 B. S.) is a deficit one by about Tis. 68. There are some immediate and obligatory demands to be met by the Estate during the year. As the whole Estate is already mortgaged against a Debenture Loan, there is no other way out for raising funds for the Estate to enable it to meet the demands mentioned above. Government have therefore granted a loan of Tis. 50 to the Estate for the purpose, and this sum of Rs. 50,000 is required under the head "Loans to land-holders and other Notabilities" under which there was no provision in the original budget.

(b)—The excess of Rs. 8,76,342 under "Advance to cultivators" is due to the grant of agricultural loans to the distressed cultivators in the flood-affected areas of the Province. A total expenditure of Rs. 10,96,342 has been incurred for this purpose against the ordinary budget grant of Rs. 1,00,000 and the balance of Rs. 1,20,000 will be met from the anticipated savings under the sub-head concerned.

(c) Government approved a scheme for the grant of relief to the tornado affected people of the Sunamganj Subdivision by introducing Spinning and Weaving as a subsidiary occupation of the people. A special loan of Rs. 21,756 has been granted in that connection to the Secretary Karmi Bharan, Kulaura. This loan is to bear no interest. As no provision exists in the budget for the purpose, a supplementary grant Rs. 14,556 representing the excess expenditure over budget provision, is necessary.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

In the Introduction to the Post-War Reconstruction and Development Budget for 1947-48, which has been printed as an Appendix to the Provincial Budget and already presented to the House, mention was made of certain schemes taken up in 1945-46 and 1946-47, preparatory to the formal commencement of the Five-Year Plan with effect from 1947-48. The expenditure incurred in 1945-46 was covered by an *ex-post facto* sanction by the Government of India. The present demand is in respect of the expenditure incurred in 1946-47 and it is being presented in fulfilment of the promise made by me in concluding the statement I made on the subject of Post-War Reconstruction and Development at the September 1946 Session of the House. The schemes in question were an outcome of the situation created by the cessation of hostilities earlier than expected and were, generally speaking, designed to fulfil the following objectives:

- (i) to bring about a smooth restoration of the war economy to a peace-time basis;
- (ii) to cope with unemployment and ancillary problems arising from the winding up of the large-scale war-time activities; and
- (iii) to prepare the ground for the introduction of system of planned economic development by bringing into existence the necessary supply of (a) administrative and technical personnel, (b) institutions and organisations, and (c) material equipment.

The amount spent will be entirely met from advance grants to be made by the Central Government out of the overall grant promised by them towards the Provincial Five-Year Plan. The Government of India have up to date actually sanctioned a total grant of 2·07 crores for schemes finally approved by them though schemes costing a total amount of 3·08 crores were submitted to them.

10.—Forests

A—Conservancy and Works (Schemes Nos. 1 to 8)

The schemes are more or less an expansion of the existing departmental activities and are intended mainly to increase the capacity of the department to undertake a larger amount of work under the Plan so as to increase the forest wealth of the Province in the long run. They will provide office and residential accommodation for the increased staff, more roads for the working of the forests, better conditions of living in the forest villages, increased tramway facilities and certain stores needed for further work.

B—Establishment—Scheme No. 9

The provision made under this scheme is for purchasing certain materials necessary for a Foresters' Training School which it is proposed to establish.

B—Establishment—Scheme No. 10

This is to meet the cost of clerical staff sanctioned for Planning and Development work.

25.—General Administration

M.(a)—Civil Secretariat Headquarters Establishment

This is to meet the cost of the Planning and Development Department of the Secretariat, whose function is to examine, co-ordinate, sanction and supervise generally Reconstruction and Development schemes. Besides a Secretary and other secretarial officers the Department has a number of Special Officers to deal with various aspects of the work.

M. (b) — Publicity and Rural Welfare

The expenditure relates to the travelling allowance of the members of the Rural Development Advisory Board which has been recently set up and of an Honorary Provincial Organiser recently appointed.

37.—Education*Q.—Direction.—I. Special Staff*

The provision is required to meet the cost of an Adviser to Government for Basic Education with his clerical staff and an additional clerical staff appointed in the office of the Director of Public Instruction.

M.—Government Special Schools and Colleges (Scheme No. 3)

This is to meet the cost of 24 teachers deputed to Wardha and Jamia Millia for training in Basic Education and the cost of purchasing a military building at Silchar for a Basic School.

3. Further Education of Ex-service Personnel

The provision is to meet the cost of 5 Ex-service medical licentiates deputed for a condensed M. B. Course. In the case of this scheme, 50 per cent. of the cost will be met by the Central Government outside the development grant and the balance by the Provincial Government.

T.—Miscellaneous (Scheme No. 4)

With a view to inspecting certain Basic Education Centres in India, a committee of Experts was set up to make recommendations to Government on Basic Education and text books required therefor. The committee have finished their tour and their recommendations are under examination. The provision is meant for their travelling allowances.

38.—Medical*D.—Medical Schools and Colleges.—I. Medical College*

An Advisory Committee was appointed by Government to prepare a scheme for the establishment of a Medical College, and the Committee's report is now under consideration. Pending sanction of the scheme, it became necessary to purchase certain Military buildings and hospital equipment and to appoint a staff for the purpose. The scheme is in category "B" now; but a reference has been made to the Government of India to allow the cost to be met from their advance grants.

B.—Hospitals and Dispensaries (Scheme No. 2)

Government have decided to provincialise five Local Board Hospitals—at Dhubri, Tezpur, Nowgong, Jorhat and Silchar. In the meantime, Government have sanctioned the purchase of certain Red Cross, Civil Porter Corps and Police Hospital articles necessary for the purpose. The provision is to meet their cost.

A.—Medical Establishment—Superintendence (Scheme No. 3)

The provision is for a Special Officer and clerical staff sanctioned for the department for planning and development work.

39.—Public Health***A.—Public Health Establishment (Scheme No. 1)***

Some years ago there was a Public Health Engineer to advise Local Bodies and Government in matters regarding sanitary engineering, drainage, town improvement schemes, water supplies and other similar subjects. The post was abolished due to stringency. Under the present scheme the post has been revived.

(*Scheme No. 2*)

With a view to giving effect to recommendations made in this behalf by the Advisory Committee and Central Advisory Board of Health, the post of a Nutrition Officer has been sanctioned. Pending the appointment of the Officer, it is proposed to purchase certain furniture and equipment during the current year.

(*Scheme No. 3*)

This is to meet the cost of a Special Officer and clerical staff sanctioned for P. W. R. work.

C—Epidemic Diseases (Scheme No. 4)

The provision is required for the purpose of setting up a malaria section under the Public Health Department, to begin with, which will co-ordinate all anti-malaria measures in the province.

(*Scheme No. 5*)

This is for the post of an Anti-T.B. Officer with his staff and necessary equipment.

40.—Agriculture***C—Experimental Farms (Scheme No. 1)***

Unlike the Upper Assam Valley and the Surma Valley, there is no experimental farm in the Lower Assam Valley, the necessity for which has been keenly felt. To remove this want, such a farm has been established at Golakganj. The contingency expenditure of Rs.1,38,000 includes cost of land, fencing and reclamation, quarters and buildings, water-supply, survey and layout and furniture and office equipment.

A—Direction (Scheme No. 2)

This represents the cost of clerical staff sanctioned for Post-War Reconstruction work.

F—Agricultural Education (Scheme No. 3)

This is to meet a contribution made towards the cost of a Pre-Release Agricultural Training Centre at the Assam Regiment Headquarters at Shillong.

41.—Veterinary***B—Subordinate establishment (Scheme No. 1)***

It has been decided to establish 4 Veterinary Hospitals for the present and negotiations for lands are going. Pending actual construction of buildings, it is proposed to purchase the necessary materials and equipment during the current year.

C—Veterinary Education and Research (Schemes Nos. 2 and 3)

With a view to strengthening the department with trained personnel, five students have been sent to the Bombay Veterinary College for Veterinary Graduate Courses and a batch of 100 Veterinary Field Assistants have been trained inside the Province. The provision is required to meet the cost of their training.

42.—Co-operation**A—Direction (Scheme No. 1)**

This is to meet the cost of a Special Officer and clerical staff sanctioned to deal with Post-War Reconstruction work.

F—Other Charges (Scheme No. 2)

The provision is required for the purpose of starting certain farms on a co-operative basis, particularly for the cultivation of special crops like sugarcane, mustard and pulses.

43—Industries**Industrial Development (Scheme No. 1)**

The hat factory at Sylhet, which came into existence during the war, has been given a further lease of life and it is also proposed to purchase available materials for certain similar cottage industries establishments to be started later.

(Scheme No. 2)

It is proposed to start 5 Handloom Cloth Marketing Centres at Sibsagar, Nowgong, Shillong, Maulvibazar and Silchar. The provision is required to start construction at 4 of the centres and for the collection of materials.

(Scheme No. 3)

As part of a scheme for a rapid industrial survey of the Province, Government have recently obtained a report on the economic mineral resources of Assam from Sir Cyril Fox, ex-Director of the Geological Survey of India. The provision is required for the payment of an honorarium to him. The provi-

(Scheme No. 4)

This is to meet the cost of a Special Officer and clerical staff sanctioned to deal with Post-War Reconstruction work.

(Scheme No. 5)

The Government of India initiated a scheme for the Technical and Vocational Training of ex-service personnel. As such Training is a provincial concern, this Government along with other Provincial Governments have accepted

liability, with respect to the training of ~~service~~ men belonging to this Province, to the extent of 40 per cent. of the cost. Accordingly the estimated share of this Government for 1946-47 comes to Rs. 65,500 (Rupees sixty-five thousand and five hundred). The Central Government's share will be outside their overall development grant.

Civil Works

Civil works and Ordinary Roads — The provision of Rs. 1,05,000 made under " Ordinary Roads — Post-War Planning " in the current year's Budget has proved inadequate as the " Interim Scheme " which were taken up after the budget had been framed could not be provided for in the budget. The actual requirement for each of the projects during the current year both under " Civil Works " and " Ordinary Roads " is noted against each below.

K.—Purchase of Military Lands, Buildings and Stores (Scheme No.1)

With a view to taking advantage of the large quantity of Military stores lying in the Province, funds were allotted to Heads of Departments to purchase such stores for their Post-War Schemes. The Interim Scheme on the subject was classified as a "C" category scheme by the Government of India with the direction that purchases made for approved "A" category schemes would be debited to such schemes and that in respect of purchases made for other schemes the Government of India's sanction should be obtained to meet the amount from their advance grants. The following purchases have been made by the Departments:—

Public Works Department :—Orders have been placed with the Military for stores, the value of which is estimated to be Rs.4,00,000 (Rupees four lakhs). The Government of India will be approached to make this available from advance grants.

Agriculture :—The materials at the Barapani Camp have been purchased by the Department. The price of the stores has not yet been fixed, but their removal to store them is absolutely necessary which will cost Rs. 14,000 (Rupees fourteen thousand). The Government of India will be approached to make advance grants available for this.

Forest :—Stores worth Rs.1,81,000 have been purchased by the Department at Lekhapani. The Government of India will be approached to make advance grants available for this.

This represents the cost of travelling of students sent abroad up to the port of embarkation and of their passage to the countries where they will be trained.
